Check Your Pool Filter for Asian Longhorned Beetle

Asian longhorned beetle (ALB) is active from now through Labor Day. DEC invites pool owners to check filters for the invasive insect regularly and submit a report if any are found. ALB attacks and kills maples, birches, willows, and other hardwoods. They emerge from infested trees in the late summer to find a new host. The beetles are 1.5 inches long, have long black-and-white antennae, and have black and white spots on their body. They should not be confused with the native white-spotted pine sawyer, which has a distinctive white spot on their back, below their head. No pool? You can still help! Be on the lookout for ALB exit holes, sawdust accumulating at the base of trees, oozing sap or pits in bark. Public Encouraged to Report Potential Beech Leaf Disease Infections

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) has announced that Beech Leaf Disease (BLD), which affects all species of beech trees, was identified in 35 counties in New York State to date. Fourteen of the counties with BLD were confirmed in 2022, and more are likely to be identified. Much is still unknown about BLD, including how it spreads, but it can kill mature beech trees in six to 10 years and saplings in as little as two years. BLD symptoms are associated with the nematode *Litylenchus crenatae mccannii*. It is unknown whether the nematode causes all of the damage, or if it is in association with another pathogen such as a virus, bacteria, or fungus. DEC is asking the public to submit reports through [NYimapInvasives](#) if they encounter a beech tree showing signs of BLD, especially for counties where BLD has not yet been confirmed. The main symptom to look for on beech foliage is darkened striping between the veins, which is best seen when looking up through the canopy. Leaves with severe symptoms can be heavily banded and crinkled, with a thickened leathery texture. At this time there are no specific recommendations for managing trees that are infected with BLD, however, DEC encourages the public to report potential BLD infections using iMapInvasives to help track the disease while research is ongoing. New Remote Sensing Research for Water Chestnut in Erie Canal

Drone remote sensing is rapidly becoming a useful tool for collecting data and monitoring changes of geographic features with high spatial and temporal resolutions. The major objectives of this research are 1) to apply unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) technology to perform rapid detection and coverage estimation of water chestnut (*Trapa natans*) invasive species along the lower reach of the Erie Canal; and 2) to assess the effectiveness of the physical removal by US Fishery and Wildlife Services. Nonnative Tree Population Increase - USDA Forest Service Report

Nonnative tree species, while generally viewed as detriments to ecosystems, may provide important ecosystem services, such as carbon storage. A recent [USDA Forest Service Report](#) documents an increase in nonnative tree species in forests in the conterminous U.S. and on Pacific and Caribbean islands. The report can aid managers in assessing the impacts of nonnative trees and human interference on forest composition.

2022 Online Exams for Licensed Guides Announced

Examinations are scheduled for individuals seeking to become licensed guides in New York State for camping; fishing; hiking; hunting; whitewater; rock climbing; ice climbing; and certified skilled with boats and canoes. A guide is a person at least 18 years of age who offers services for hire, part or all of which include directing, instructing, or aiding another individual in fishing, hunting, camping, hiking, whitewater rafting/canoeing/kayaking, or rock and ice climbing. Applicants need not be a resident of New York State to receive a guide's license. Exams in 2022 will be online. The registration deadline for exams is seven days before the examination. The Greater Niagara segment includes 36 locations throughout Erie, Genesee, Niagara, Orleans, and Wyoming counties, providing a variety of quality birding experiences for New Yorkers and visitors to enjoy. The New York State Birding Trail map is available at the [New York State Birding webpage](#) and provides valuable information on each site such as location, available amenities, species likely to be seen, directions, and more.

Farmland Protection Grants Available

The NYS Department of Agriculture is pleased to announce the availability of funds for the [Round 18 Farmland Protection Implementation Grants \(FPIG\) Program – Conservation Easement Projects](#). The intent is to fund the implementation of certain farmland protection activities intended to maintain the economic viability of the State's agricultural industry and its supporting land base and to protect the environmental and landscape preservation values associated with agriculture. Grant applications will be accepted on a continuous basis. The [RFA](#) will remain open and awards will be made until such time as available funds are fully committed, or the RFA is closed.

Soil Health Tool

Funding for EV Charging Stations

Through [Charge Ready NY](#), NYSERDA provides rebates of \$4,000 per charging port for Level 2 charging stations installed at public, workplace, and multi-unit dwelling parking lots. This could add up to a savings of 30% to 80%, depending on station and installation costs. Additional incentives of \$500 per port may be awarded for installations within [disadvantaged communities](#). Most utilities now offer [incentives for installing charging stations](#) that can cover most of the installation costs and can be used in tandem with [New York State](#) and [federal](#) tax credits.

Nourish New York

The Nourish New York initiative reroutes New York's surplus agricultural products to the populations who need them most through the state's food banks. The program also provides much-needed support for the food producers and farmers who have lost markets as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic because the state's food banks are buying agricultural products from New York farmers and food processors. Make Cigarette Butts Part of Your Cleanups

Littered cigarette butts: besides ugly to look at, they are hazardous to our kids, pets, wildlife and gardens. Locally, data from the Great Lakes Watershed Cleanup conducted by Ocean Conservancy indicates that more than 300,000 cigarette butts (35.3% of all items recovered) were collected from the Great Lakes in 2019. When left in the environment, littered cigarette butts leach toxic chemicals, such as arsenic (used to kill rats) and lead, that may be carried as runoff to drains and end up polluting our rivers and lakes right here in Western New York. Because cigarette butts are primarily made of plastic filters that don't biodegrade, the butts that aren't eaten by wildlife simply pile up on shorelines or at the bottom of bodies of water. New Remote Sensing Research for Water Chestnut in Erie Canal

Drone remote sensing is rapidly becoming a useful tool for collecting data and monitoring changes of geographic features with high spatial and temporal resolutions. The major objectives of this research are 1) to apply unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) technology to perform rapid detection and coverage estimation of water chestnut (*Trapa natans*) invasive species along the lower reach of the Erie Canal; and 2) to assess the effectiveness of the physical removal by US Fishery and Wildlife Services. Farm to School Program in New York Awards Local Districts

New York's Farm-to-School program promotes the purchase and use of New York State grown food in meals served in cafeterias of K-12 schools. With over 700 school districts in New York State, there is great opportunity to see the many benefits of farm to school programs expand across the State, including preparing children to learn; improving student health and well-being; strengthening the local economy; and building healthy communities. Additionally, the program helps schools and farms address the challenges that make procuring, storing, and serving local food difficult. Projects awarded locally include the Kenmore Town of Tonawanda Unified School District (\$36,070) and West Seneca Central School District (\$99,924) to increase the volume of New York State food products and develop the Western New York Taste Test Project which brings together a diverse cohort of school districts with a shared goal of increasing the volume and variety of local foods served and consumed in their cafeterias, and developing farm-to-school sustainability plans.

Bike-Friendly Business Certification

Bike Friendly New York (BFNY) is a certification program that recognizes businesses and establishments that accommodate bicycles and the people that ride them. To get certified, review requirements at www.ptny.org/bikefriendly, fulfill required criteria, and apply for review. Certified businesses can promote on their website and display on windows and other promotional materials.

Buffalo Food Waste Diversion is Available Year-Round

Buffalo has tested and is launching year-round collection of food waste in an outdoor collection bin at Elmwood Avenue and Bidwell Parkway. Food scraps will be transported by Natural Upcycling to Buffalo River Compost. Since June 2019, over 1000 people have participated in the "Scrap it" program with six summer locations available for drop-off. Acceptable materials are fruits and vegetable scraps, coffee grounds and filters, egg shells, tea bags and nuts. For more info, visit www.buffalorecycles.org.

Plant-Based Food Wrap and Containers

A Rutgers University scientist has developed a biodegradable, plant-based coating that can be sprayed on foods, guarding against pathogenic and spoilage microorganisms and transportation damage. This would allow us to get rid of fossil fuel-based food packaging and replace it with biodegradable, nontoxic materials. The material uses polysaccharide/biopolymer-based fibers that are shrink-wrapped over foods to protect against bruising and fight pathogenic organism that can spoil the food. NYSERDA Green Jobs Green New York Energy Studies

Small businesses and not-for-profit organizations can receive an energy study to help them identify opportunities to make their buildings more energy efficient. The energy study is a valuable tool to understand how to reduce energy usage and costs in your facility, and it provides a “road map” to plan for improvements that can be made as budgets permit. It includes: a comprehensive walk through of the facility; site staff interviews; utility bill analysis; fuel neutral, unbiased evaluation of potential low-cost/no-cost and capital improvement energy efficiency upgrades; and a report that outlines potential energy and cost savings opportunities for your facility. Once the study is complete, you receive assistance in identifying potential utility incentives and low-cost financing options to help take the next steps toward implementing energy saving projects. Small businesses with 100 or fewer Full-Time Equivalent Employees (FTEs) company-wide or not-for-profit organizations of any size are eligible for the program. Global Oceanic Plastic Waste: Reckoning with the U.S. Role

An estimated 8 million metric tons (MMT) of plastic waste enters the world's ocean each year - the equivalent of dumping a garbage truck of plastic waste into the ocean every minute. Plastic waste is now found in almost every marine habitat, from the ocean surface to deep sea sediments to the ocean's vast mid-water region, as well as the Great Lakes. The National Academies of Sciences has published a report that responds to a request in the bipartisan Save Our Seas 2.0 Act for a scientific synthesis of the role of the United States both in contributing to and responding to global ocean plastic waste. 2022 New York Harmful Algal Blooms Notification and Reporting System

DEC has announced the start of the 2022 online Harmful Algal Blooms (HABs) map and reporting system to inform the public about HABs locations in New York. Most algae blooms are harmless. However, exposure to toxins and other substances from certain HABs can make people and animals sick. DEC is asking the public and trained algal bloom samplers to send reports of HABs with photos electronically via a [simple, mobile phone-friendly form](#). ZEV Funding for Municipalities Adding Electric Vehicles and Installing Related Charging Infrastructure

Funding is now available through the [ZEV Rebate and ZEV Infrastructure Grant programs](#) to help municipalities purchase or lease zero-emission vehicles for fleet use and to install public electric vehicle charging and hydrogen fuel filling stations. Of the total \$5.75 million made available for this round of rebates and grants, 40 percent of the funds will be prioritized for projects in Disadvantaged Communities as identified by the [Climate Justice Working Group's draft criteria](#). A total of \$750,000 is available to municipalities for eligible all-electric, plug-in hybrid, or hydrogen fuel cell vehicles purchased (or leased for a minimum of 36 months) from dealerships in New York State and placed into municipal service on or after August 1, 2020. A total of \$5 million is available to municipalities to install hydrogen filling station components or electric vehicle charging equipment that is Level 2 or direct current fast charge primarily for public use. DEC is accepting applications on a rolling basis now through 4:00 p.m. on **September 30, 2022**, or until funding is exhausted, whichever occurs first.

Help Track Spotted Lanternfly

[Spotted lanternfly \(SLF\)](#) is an invasive pest from Asia that feeds on a variety of plants including grapes, hops, and maple trees, posing a severe threat to NY forests and agriculture. SLF has been found in several locations in NY but has not yet spread to much of the state. One potential pathway for the spread of SLF is its preferred host plant, tree of heaven (TOH), which is already found in many locations across NY. Learn more about the insect [here](#). Hemlock Woolly Adelgid Management

Hemlock woolly adelgid (HWA, *Adelges tsugae*) is an aphidlike, soft-bodied insect, almost too small to see with the naked eye. Native to Asia, HWA was first reported in the eastern United States in the 1950s. It has since spread to 20 states and two Canadian provinces. HWA feed on tree sap by inserting their mouthparts at the base of the needles and removing plant fluids. Their feeding causes the needles to turn gray, die, and drop from the tree. Branch dieback progresses from the lower branches to the top of the tree. Severe infestations may bring about premature needle drop, reduced twig growth, dieback, and tree death. Meet the Earthworms of New York

There are only a few native earthworms in New York State, which are all found in undisturbed habitats. Invasive earthworms transform soil and can have negative impacts on other organisms, including groundnesting birds, salamanders, millipedes, trees, and forest plant species. There are many knowledge gaps about these earthworms, making all sightings important. Farm Energy Audits

NYSERDA offers free energy audits to identify energy efficiency measures for eligible farms and on-farm producers, including but not limited to: dairies, orchards, greenhouses, vegetables, vineyards, grain dryers, and poultry/egg. In addition, greenhouse facilities can receive a free benchmarking report that describes their energy use intensity and benchmarks their facility against an anonymous aggregate of peer facilities. Farms must be customers of a New York State investor-owned utility and contribute to the System Benefits Charge (SBC). Check your current electricity bills. Farms can request an energy audit or a greenhouse benchmark report through the [Agriculture Energy Audit Program](#).

EPA's Clean School Bus Program will provide \$5 billion over the next five years to replace existing school buses with low- and zero-emission school buses. The 2022 round of the Clean School Bus Program has \$500 million in Clean School Bus rebates available for eligible entities such as state governments, local governments, non-profits, for-profits, tribes, tribal organizations, and tribal schools to replace existing diesel school buses with qualifying low- and zero-emission models powered by battery-electric, CNG, and/or propane drivetrains. Funding can also be used for the purchase of qualifying electric school bus charging infrastructure. Rebate applications are being accepted now through **August 19, 2022**. New York Truck Voucher Incentive Program

The New York Truck Voucher Incentive Program (NYTVIP), administered by the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA), provides vouchers (discounts) to commercial fleets, non-profit agencies, and public fleet entities across New York State for the purchase or lease of qualifying medium- and heavy-duty zero-emission battery-electric or hydrogen fuel cell electric vehicles, including trucks, school buses, cargo handling equipment, and transit buses.
