Free Pesticide Disposal for Farmers and Landscapers

NYSDEC's CleanSweepNY pesticide collection will be in Lockport on **Tuesday, May 10**. Pre-registration is required. Email info@cleansweepny.org or phone 518-225-8146 for a registration packet. The collection does not apply to homeowners. CleanSweepNY services are provided to farmers and owners of former farms, all categories of NYS certified pesticide applicators, cemeteries, golf courses, marinas, schools, landscapers and lawncare providers, nurseries, greenhouses, and other entities possessing unwanted or unusable pesticides and other waste chemicals. Each participant is responsible for transporting their materials to the collection site.

NY Safe Boating Course

Board game for birders takes flight during pandemic

Birding became a hobby for many during the pandemic. For those without a backyard or binoculars to spot rare jays and finches, game creator Elizabeth Hargrave offered an alternative in the form of a bird-inspired board game. "Wingspan" allows players to try their hand as an ornithologist, who stewards forest, grassland and wetland habitats. The goal: entice the widest variety of birds to your nature reserve using a variety of tools, including food tokens and pastel eggs. During each turn, players draw from the 170-card deck — complete with hand-painted bird illustrations and trivia from sources like the Audubon field guides and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology's eBird database. As the game continues, the amateur ornithologists will grow their bird populations, while learning more about the importance of protecting each species' habitat.

How To Reduce Synthetic Fertilizer Use

The National Center for Appropriate Technology (NCAT) has <u>released a new toolkit</u> with trusted and practical resources for farmers who want to transition away from the use of synthetic fertilizers. Transitioning to a production method that is not reliant on synthetic fertilizers can be accomplished strategically over three to five years. NCAT's collection of publications, tipsheets, and videos offers a good place to start learning how things like cover crops, green manures, and alternative soil amendments can result in reduced input costs and increased self-reliance.

Household Hazardous Waste Dropoff

Erie County residents have the option of using the County's "Voucher Drop-off program" which enables residents to bring up to 50lbs. of eligible hazardous waste to the Hazman facility in Tonawanda at no cost. Funding for Eligible Private Forest Landowners to Establish and Renew New York Forests

In honor of Arbor Day, \$750,000 in funding has been allocated for the second round of the State's 'Regenerate NY' Forestry Cost Share Grant Program. The grant program is designed to assist private landowners in growing the next generation of forests, which are crucial for mitigating climate change, providing wildlife habitat, protecting air and water quality, and supplying an important renewable resource. A third of the total available funds (\$250,000) is specifically earmarked for tree planting projects that will establish new forests or supplement the regeneration of existing ones. With nearly 75 percent of New York's 18.7 million acres of forestland being privately owned, the grants help support landowners in growing healthy forests. Regenerate NY is funded by New York State's Environmental Protection Fund (EPF) and managed by DEC's Division of Lands and Forests. Private landowners who own between 10 and 1,000 acres of forest land in New York State may apply for grant awards ranging from a minimum of \$10,000 to a maximum of \$50,000, with a required 25 percent match. Eligible projects include, but are not limited to, planting trees, soil scarification, removing competing vegetation that would interfere with seedling establishment and growth, and installation of deer fencing. Applicants must work with a private forester to develop their project. Up to two applications may be submitted per applicant, provided the applications are for separate properties. Applications may be submitted through the New York State Grants Gateway and will be accepted until 3 p.m. on Oct. 7, 2022, or until funds are depleted, whichever comes first. DEC is holding a webinar for interested applicants on Friday, May 6, at 10 a.m. For instructions on how to access the webinar via phone or computer, or for details about the grant opportunity including application criteria, visit DEC's website.

Beekeeping Apprenticeships

Masterson's is excited to continue our Beekeeping Apprenticeship program for the 2022 season. Our goal is to help both new beekeepers and those thinking of becoming beekeepers to develop a deeper understanding of hive management. We believe that while classroom instruction is an important part of understanding the working of a hive, the hands on experience that our program can provide is essential. The program will include an introduction to beekeeping, but will focus on time spent outdoors in our apiary. During the sessions, each participant will work in a small group with one of our experienced beekeepers and then have the responsibility of caring for several of our hives. Because participants will be inspecting the same hives each time, they will have the opportunity to see how the colony of honeybees changes over the course of the program. We'll be there every step of the way, and we think you'll be surprised how much you can learn during the three month session! In addition to proper hive inspection techniques, you'll learn how to deal with any issues that might arise such as swarm control, re-queening, varroa mite counts & treatment, making splits, combining weak hives, dealing with laying workers and much more. The Plan sets out a vision for effectively managing invasive species through collaborative conservation to protect our nation's environment; natural and cultural resources; economy and infrastructure; and public health. It both reflects ongoing work by the Interior and its partners and leverages opportunities to respond to emerging issues. Stakeholder input received at the onset of the Plan's development, and again during the formal public comment period on the draft Plan, significantly influenced the content of the Plan. The insulating material could provide a new solution for food and beverage packaging that is cheap, recyclable, and sustainable, researchers say in a paper published in the journal *Nature Sustainability*. Take your Bird Feeders Down: Reduce Avian Disease

Highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) is a serious, fatal disease of poultry. Since the beginning of the year, it's been identified in over 350 wild birds in 20 states, including New York. New York has also had 3 cases of HPAI to date in backyard poultry flocks, which resulted in the death of 268 birds. It is up to us as good friends and neighbors to help protect domestic poultry flocks. One of the ways that we can do this is to take down our wild bird feeders for a little while. While this disease is mostly carried by wild waterfowl, research has shown that other wild bird populations can carry it too, especially if they share nesting and feeding grounds with wild waterfowl. Concerns about dead or sick wild birds can be directed to your local Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) office. Unusual whole-flock illnesses or deaths in poultry can be directed to NYS Department of Agriculture & Markets: 518-457-3502; the USDA (United States Department of Agriculture): 866-536-7593; or your local Cornell Cooperative Extension Office.

American Farmland Trust: Solar Siting

The American Farmland Trust has published a new report, <u>Smart Solar siting on Farmland: Achieving Climate Goals While Strengthening the Future for Farming in New York.</u> Solar siting presents both opportunities and challenges for protecting farmland and supporting New York's farmers and farm economy as New York strives to meet the renewable energy goals established in the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act, including generating 100% clean energy by 2040. New York needs a plan to attain critical climate goals while strengthening the future for farming and growing food.

NY PRISM Report

New York Partnership for Invasive Species Management has released their <u>annual report</u>. Highlights from the report include: collaborative efforts to pilot optimal search strategies for spotted lanternfly using detection dogs, update on prioritization tool that will help inform invasive species management decisions for PRISM regions, a case study for success from several decades of biocontrol for purple loosestrife across New York State and ecological soundscapes - how bioacoustics research could help inform management from a case study on native vs. introduced Phragmites.

Nonnative Tree Population Increase - USDA Forest Service Report

Nonnative tree species, while generally viewed as detriments to ecosystems, may provide important ecosystem services, such as carbon storage. A recent <u>USDA Forest Service Report</u> documents an increase in nonnative tree species in forests in the conterminous U.S. and on Pacific and Caribbean islands. The report can aid managers in assessing the impacts of nonnative trees and human interference on forest composition.

Managing Great Lakes Invaders - Video Series

The <u>five-part short video series</u>, Managing Great Lakes Invaders, was developed by Michigan Sea Grant and the Great Lakes Aquatic Nonindigenous Species Information System (GLANSIS). Each short video focuses on a different Great Lakes invasion story, including ballast water, sea lamprey, dreissenid mussels, and invasive carp, along with a capstone video that unites them. This project demonstrates how cooperation between researchers, legislators, industry, and other stakeholders can make a powerful difference in protecting the Great Lakes.

2022 Online Exams for Licensed Guides Announced

Examinations are scheduled for individuals seeking to become licensed guides in New York State for camping; fishing; hiking; hunting; whitewater; rock climbing; ice climbing; and certified skilled with boats and canoes. A guide is a person at least 18 years of age who offers services for hire, part or all of which include directing, instructing, or aiding another individual in fishing, hunting, camping, hiking, whitewater rafting/canoeing/kayaking, or rock and ice climbing. Applicants need not be a resident of New York State to receive a guide's license. Exams in 2022 will be online. The registration deadline for exams is seven days before the examination. The Erie County Office of Agriculture launched the <u>Erie Grown website</u> to promote local produce and encourage residents to purchase food from area farmers. The office formed with the mission to address loss of farmland and improve the agricultural economy. The website includes a site locator map and a produce finder with 145 producers. Users can search for a specific type of produce to find a location where they can make a purchase from a local grower.

'Greater Niagara' Birding Trail Includes 36 Locations in Five Western New York Counties

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) announced the opening of the Greater Niagara segment of the New York State Birding Trail. The Greater Niagara segment includes 36 locations throughout Erie, Genesee, Niagara, Orleans, and Wyoming counties, providing a variety of quality birding experiences for New Yorkers and visitors to enjoy. Birdwatching has quickly become one of New York's fastest-growing recreation and tourism activities. The statewide trail includes a network of promoted birding locations that can be accessed by car or public transportation, providing an inclusive experience for all visitors to enjoy birds amid beautiful natural settings with little or no cost or investment in equipment. The diversity of trail locations makes it so that everyone from Downtown Buffalo to the Lake Ontario shoreline to rural Wyoming county can easily find a great birding location nearest to them! The New York State Birding Trail map is available at the New York State Birding webpage and provides valuable information on each site such as location, available amenities, species likely to be seen, directions, and more. Additional information on birding, educational and interpretive information, is also available. Digital information on the Birding Trail will be updated periodically, so budding outdoor enthusiasts are encouraged to check back often.

Have a Mascara Wand to Toss?

For all mascara users out there, there may be a better destination for your old, dried-out mascara wands than a stinking landfill—the nearest wildlife rehabilitation center! When tiny animals (like cute baby birds or squirrels) are rescued, their fur or skin can sometimes be infested with fly eggs, larvae, and other pests that are difficult to remove safely. However, wildlife rescuers have discovered that clean, repurposed mascara wands make this painstaking grooming process easier for them and more comfortable for the animals, all while giving new life to waste that would have ended up in a landfill. Nonprofit organization Wands for Wildlife collects and redistributes mascara wands and has so far donated 500,000 used and 930,000 unused wands over the past five years. If you'd like to send in your used wands, soak them first in hot, soapy water, and then use an old toothbrush to remove any leftover mascara gunk. Dry them completely before packaging them and enclose a wand donation form.

Farmland Protection Grants Available

The NYS Department of Agriculture is pleased to announce the availability of funds for the Round 18 Farmland Protection Implementation Grants (FPIG) Program – Conservation Easement Projects. Applications for funding must conform to the format provided in the Grants Gateway. The intent is to fund the implementation of certain farmland protection activities intended to maintain the economic viability of the State's agricultural industry and its supporting land base and to protect the environmental and landscape preservation values associated with agriculture. Grant applications will be accepted on a continuous basis. The RFA will remain open and awards will be made until such time as available funds are fully committed, or the RFA is closed.

Marvel Superhero Tackles Climate Change and Social Injustice

There's a new Marvel superhero in town, and she's a Puerto Rican heroine pumped to tackle climate change, political corruption, and all the intertwined social injustices. In an upcoming installment of the graphic novel series <u>La</u> <u>Boriqueña</u>, the superhero Marisol Rios de la Luz and her team, the Nitainos, will be a vessel for discussing the impacts of climate change, especially on the Caribbean islands. The new volume will be released with the help of superstar Rosario Dawson and in collaboration with NRDC, its <u>La Boriqueña Grants Program</u>, and in partnership with local organizations with the goal of expanding solar energy and preparing the island for future extreme weather events. <u>More.</u>

Funding for EV Charging Stations

Through Charge Ready NY, NYSERDA provides rebates of \$4,000 per charging port for Level 2 charging stations installed at public, workplace, and multi-unit dwelling parking lots. This could add up to a savings of 30% to 80%, depending on station and installation costs. Additional incentives of \$500 per port may be awarded for installations within disadvantaged communities. Most utilities now offer incentives for installing charging stations that can cover most of the installation costs and can be used in tandem with New York State and federal tax credits.

Make Our Enclosure a Reality so We Can Help More Wildlife

WNY Raptor and Wildlife Care, Inc. is fundraising for a new multi-unit enclosure to house injured and orphaned wildlife. Make Cigarette Butts Part of Your Cleanups

Littered cigarette butts: besides ugly to look at, they are hazardous to our kids, pets, wildlife and gardens. Locally, data from the Great Lakes Watershed Cleanup conducted by Ocean Conservancy indicates that more than 300,000 cigarette butts (35.3% of all items recovered) were collected from the Great Lakes in 2019. When left in the environment, littered cigarette butts leach toxic chemicals, such as arsenic (used to kill rats) and lead, that may be carried as runoff to drains and end up polluting our rivers and lakes right here in Western New York. Because cigarette butts are primarily made of plastic filters that don't biodegrade, the butts that aren't eaten by wildlife simply pile up on shorelines or at the bottom of bodies of water. New Remote Sensing Research for Water Chestnut in Erie Canal

Drone remote sensing is rapidly becoming a useful tool for collecting data and monitoring changes of geographic features with high spatial and temporal resolutions. The major objectives of this research are 1) to apply unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) technology to perform rapid detection and coverage estimation of water chestnut (*Trapa natans*) invasive species along the lower reach of the Erie Canal; and 2) to assess the effectiveness of the physical removal by US Fishery and Wildlife Services. New Invasive Species: Map Shows you What to Watch

Making sure the lands and waters you love to hunt and fish stay healthy is one of the best ways we can support wildlife. Invasive species are plants and animals that not only harm our forests and waterways, but they can also harm New York's fish and wildlife. Hunters, anglers, and wildlife watchers like you can be a first line of defense, and there's an easy way for you to know what to look for: DEC's #OnesToWatch interactive map! Click on your region of the map to see the species DEC is tracking in your neck of the woods. Then follow the link for each species to find more detailed information, including info on how to easily report sightings.

New Portable Desalination Unit

MIT researchers have developed a portable desalination unit, weighing less than 10 kilograms, that can remove particles and salts to generate drinking water. The suitcase-sized device, which requires less power to operate than a cell phone charger, can also be driven by a small, portable solar panel, which can be purchased online for around \$50. It automatically generates drinking water that exceeds World Health Organization quality standards. The technology is packaged into a user-friendly device that runs with the push of one button. Unlike other portable desalination units that require water to pass through filters, this device utilizes electrical power to remove particles from drinking water. Eliminating the need for replacement filters greatly reduces the long-term maintenance requirements. This could enable the unit to be deployed in remote and severely resource-limited areas, such as communities on small islands or aboard seafaring cargo ships. It could also be used to aid refugees fleeing natural disasters or by soldiers carrying out long-term military operations. Info.

Plastic-eating Enzymes can Breakdown Garbage in Days

Of the 10 billion metric tons of plastic that humans have produced so far, only a small fraction has been recycled. Most of it sits in landfills or in the environment, where it could take centuries to degrade. But new plastic-eating enzymes could help begin to clean it up—and make recycling greener. University of Texas at Austin researchers created a new enzyme that can efficiently break down PET (a type of plastic commonly used in packaging and in materials like polyester) in days, even hours. The researchers started with an enzyme called PETase, which naturally evolved to make bacteria degrade PET plastic. Then they used machine learning to discover which mutations would make it possible for the process to happen faster and at relatively low temperatures. They tested the mutated enzyme on dozens of single-use plastic containers and several different polyester fabrics to demonstrate that it worked. In some cases, the enzymes fully degraded the plastic down to the monomer level—the basic building blocks of plastic—in less than a day. Info.

Sustainable Leather Alternative from Fungus

Researchers from the University of Boras in Sweden have created a sustainable leather alternative using the spores of a fungus *Rhizopus delemar*, which have been fed with stale bread. As the fungus fed on the bread, it produced microscopic natural fibers made of chitin and chitosan that accumulated in its cell walls. The suspension of fungal cells was then laid out flat and dried to make a leather-like material. The fungal leather has properties similar to real leather. More

Buffalo Food Waste Diversion is Available Year-Round

Buffalo has tested and is launching year-round collection of food waste in an outdoor collection bin at Elmwood Avenue and Bidwell Parkway. Food scraps will be transported by Natural Upcycling to Buffalo River Compost. Since June 2019, over 1000 people have participated in the "Scrap it" program with six summer locations available for drop-off. Acceptable materials are fruits and vegetable scraps, coffee grounds and filters, egg shells, tea bags and nuts. For more info, visit www.buffalorecycles.org.

Each short video focuses on a different Great Lakes invasion story, including ballast water, sea lamprey, dreissenid mussels, and invasive carp, along with a capstone video that unites them. This project demonstrates how cooperation between researchers, legislators, industry, and other stakeholders can make a powerful difference in protecting the Great Lakes.

Good Neighbors Compost Starts Subscription Service for Food Scrap Dropoffs

Good Neighbors Compost has locked bins to collect food scraps at 500 Seneca and Buffalo River Landing. Starting May 3, there will also be a bin at Elm Street Bakery in East Aurora. Food scraps can be dropped off and they are picked up each week and taken to Buffalo River Compost. As full list of accepted foods is on her website. When people sign up, they get the code to one of the bins. Business pricing varies depending on the bin size and how often she needs to pick up the waste. To sign up or put a new bin somewhere, people can contact her directly through her website or Instagram.

Global Oceanic Plastic Waste: Reckoning with the U.S. Role

An estimated 8 million metric tons (MMT) of plastic waste enters the world's ocean each year - the equivalent of dumping a garbage truck of plastic waste into the ocean every minute. Plastic waste is now found in almost every marine habitat, from the ocean surface to deep sea sediments to the ocean's vast mid-water region, as well as the Great Lakes. The National Academies of Sciences has published a report that responds to a request in the bipartisan Save Our Seas 2.0 Act for a scientific synthesis of the role of the United States both in contributing to and responding to global ocean plastic waste. Help Track Spotted Lanternfly

Spotted lanternfly (SLF) is an invasive pest from Asia that feeds on a variety of plants including grapes, hops, and maple trees, posing a severe threat to NY forests and agriculture. SLF has been found in several locations in NY but has not yet spread to much of the state. One potential pathway for the spread of SLF is its preferred host plant, tree of heaven (TOH), which is already found in many locations across NY. Learn more about the insect here. Hemlock Wooly Adelgid Management

Hemlock woolly adelgid (HWA, *Adelges tsugae*) is an aphidlike, soft-bodied insect, almost too small to see with the naked eye. Native to Asia, HWA was first reported in the eastern United States in the 1950s. It has since spread to 20 states and two Canadian provinces. HWA feed on tree sap by inserting their mouthparts at the base of the needles and removing plant fluids. Their feeding causes the needles to turn gray, die, and drop from the tree. Branch dieback progresses from the lower branches to the top of the tree. Severe infestations may bring about premature needle drop, reduced twig growth, dieback, and tree death. <u>Info and resources</u>.

Plus, with rebates and tax credits, you can save even more. Learn about all the benefits today! A study examined the life cycle greenhouse gas emissions from electric cars and combustion engine cars globally. Their analysis showed that only battery electric and hydrogen fuel cell electric vehicles have the potential to achieve the magnitude of life-cycle GHG emissions reductions needed to meet Paris Agreement goals.

Farm Energy Audits

NYSERDA offers free energy audits to identify energy efficiency measures for eligible farms and on-farm producers, including but not limited to: dairies, orchards, greenhouses, vegetables, vineyards, grain dryers, and poultry/egg. In addition, greenhouse facilities can receive a free benchmarking report that describes their energy use intensity and benchmarks their facility against an anonymous aggregate of peer facilities. Farms must be customers of a New York State investor-owned utility and contribute to the System Benefits Charge (SBC). Check your current electricity bills. Farms can request an energy audit or a greenhouse benchmark report through the <u>Agriculture Energy Audit Program</u>.

Understanding Your Carbon Footprint: A How-to Guide for Businesses

What is your carbon footprint? It is a measure of your climate impact. Almost every activity in your day-to-day life causes greenhouse gas emissions. These emissions can be quite obvious, like when you drive a car, or less clear, like those produced to provide a financial service. Holistic here refers to the attempt to explore and address sustainability issues from multiple perspectives in an integrated and relational way. Systemic refers to considering key aspects of the education system simultaneously (curriculum, pedagogy and learning, professional development, school-community relationships, school practices, ethos, vision and leadership). Co-creative refers to the inclusion of multiple voices and multiple stakeholders in the development of the approach within a given context. Tips for the Environment:

No Mow Option- Most cities and municipalities have some form of weed ordinance that dictates the height and sometimes even the types of plants a homeowner is allowed to grow. Unfortunately, many of these ordinances are out of touch with the modern movement towards creating yards that support wildlife in urban settings. So: **maintain a mowed buffer** (keeping a mowed edge in front of or around a natural planting of a foot or two may be all that's needed to define "lawn" from "garden" and keep you in step with local ordinances or Homeowner Association guidelines. Maintaining a tidy mowed edge also makes a busy natural planting look less overwhelming, and makes these spaces look intentional rather than neglectful).

Egg Carton Uses- Other than cardboard egg cartons, most are not easily recyclable. So use your cartons as a seed starter tray, for crafts as a painter's palette, storage for jewelry or thumbtacks.

Change your Laundry Habit- Not only do tumble dryers use energy and contribute to air pollution, but they also contribute to microfiber pollution. Both washing machines and dryers cause the release of many microfibers into the air and water. For synthetic clothes, these are a microplastics problem for the environment. Options include air drying, purchasing clothes from natural materials and washing less frequently.
