#### Exercise your Civic Duty: Complete the Census and Vote in the Election

If you haven't already, make sure that your family completes the census form before the end of October. The numbers in Western New York determine access to funding and representation. For voting, you can you can request an absentee ballot by completing the application at <a href="https://elections.erie.gov/Default">https://elections.erie.gov/Default</a> by October 27. It is recommended that you complete it and mail it back as soon as possible to avoid delays. The deadline to register to vote is October 9, so don't delay. Early voting will take place from October 24-November 1 and you can find polling stations at <a href="https://elections.erie.gov/Early-Voting">https://elections.erie.gov/Early-Voting</a>. #### **Electronics Recycling**

Sunnking will hold a collection event on **November 7** in Niagara Falls and **Nov. 21** at Eastern Hills Mall. Residents must pre-register at <u>Sunnking.com/Events</u> and find a full list of recyclable devices. Brockport-based electronics recycler, Sunnking, filled its first event since the COVID-19 shutdown, so register early. New health and safety procedures will be in place to ensure a safe environment, including timed appointments, no-contact device removal, and dedicated drive-through lanes. Sunnking collects an average of 100 tons of electronics per event.

#### 2020 Erie County Household Hazardous Waste Collection and Dropoff Vouchers

Future Household Hazardous Waste Collection events will be posted at <u>erie.gov/recycling</u>. An October 31 dropoff in the town of Boston is the last collection for the year. Residents are required to pre-register to attend a collection event to receive a time block and location. **Pre-registration** can be made beginning **one month prior to each event**, <u>on-line</u> or by phone at 858-6800. A limited voucher program for residents to use to dispose of your HHW at your convenience is now available. Erie County has contracted with Hazman to provide vouchers that allow residents to bring up to 50 pounds of HHW to Hazman at no cost to you. The voucher program will also require a reservation which you can make via the Hazman website or the HHW hotline. Visit for <u>info</u>.

#### DEC Announces Enforcement of New York's Plastic Bag Ban to Start Oct. 19, 2020

DEC will begin enforcement of the State's ban on single-use plastic carryout bags on **Oct. 19, 2020**. The plastic bag ban, which went into effect on March 1, was not enforced per an agreement between the parties in a lawsuit brought by Poly-Pak Industries, Inc., et al, in New York State Supreme Court. DEC continues to encourage New Yorkers to use reusable bags wherever and whenever they shop with the #BYOBagNY campaign, launched earlier this year. Additional information about exemptions to the plastic bag ban, frequently asked questions, and posters, flyers, and tip strips to download, as well as tips for keeping reusable bags clean are available on <u>DEC's website</u>. New Yorkers use an estimated 23 billion plastic bags annually—each for about 12 minutes—and approximately 85 percent of this staggering total ends up in landfills, recycling machines, waterways, and streets.

#### **Proposed Part 496: Statewide Emissions Limits**

DEC is proposing a new <u>6 NYCRR Part 496, Statewide Greenhouse Gas Emission Limits</u>. The proposed rule adopts limits on the emission of greenhouse gases in 2030 and 2050, as a percentage of 1990 emissions, per the requirements of the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act. It applies to all emission sources in the State, but the rule does not itself impose compliance obligations. <u>A public comment hearing webinar for the proposed rule will be held October</u> <u>20, 2020.</u>

#### **Buffalo Outer Harbor BioBlitz**

The Pollinator Conservation Association is conducting a fall 2020 BioBlitz on the Outer Harbor. Led by Jay Burney, the group is using <u>inaturalist.org</u> as the citizen science platform which you can use to post pictures and observations. Any posted observations that take place within the borders of the project which includes Times Beach, Tifft Nature Preserve, the Union Ship Canal, and all of the ECHDC and State Park lands on the outer harbor, will automatically be included in the project. You can also specifically join the project as a member which would be ideal. The idea is to create an inventory of flora and fauna on the outer harbor using citizen science." #### NYSERDA Green Jobs Green New York Energy Studies

Small businesses and not-for-profit organizations can now receive an energy study **AT NO COST** to help them identify opportunities to make their buildings more energy efficient. The energy study is a valuable tool to understand how to reduce energy usage and costs in your facility, and it provides a "road map" to plan for improvements that can be made as budgets permit. *NYSERDA is waiving the fee for a limited time*. Small businesses with 100 or fewer Full-Time Equivalent Employees (FTEs) company-wide or not-for-profit organizations of any size are eligible for the program. The energy study includes: A comprehensive walk through of the facility; site staff interviews; utility bill analysis; fuel-neutral, unbiased evaluation of potential low-cost/no-cost and capital improvement energy efficiency upgrades; and a report that outlines potential energy and cost savings opportunities for your facility. Once the study is complete, you receive assistance in identifying potential utility incentives and low-cost financing options to help take the next steps toward implementing energy saving projects. Note: A small business or not-for-profit who had a prior NYSERDA energy study is eligible for the program if their study was performed at least three years ago. #### **Creating Warm Floors with Modular Recycled Rubber Panels**

Launched by entrepreneur Gary Hydock more than six years ago, the floating modularly designed panels not only provide a moisture barrier but can be installed over an undulating surface such as concrete without any mechanical attachment. From idea to finished product, the six-year journey included testing, certification, patent applications, and contractor-approved demonstration projects to bring the panels to market. Today, Hydock's Salamanca, NY-based company Seneca Radiant Technology (SRT) and its products are Green Spec® listed, qualify for LEED points and are sourced by contractors, residential home owners and commercial developers for new build, remodeling and restoration projects. In 2017, the company established Seneca Radiant UK, expanding its recycled rubber modular radiant heat panels internationally, Hydock said. Seneca Radiant heat panels are designed to be installed over an existing concrete slab on grade, suspended high rise slab, over existing standard framing or under the sub-floor. The panel is made from 100 percent recycled tire rubber crumb. Individual panels are  $\frac{34}{4}$  inches thick and weigh less than four pounds each. The rubber modular panel is one square foot in dimension with an engineered tube routing channel in the underside to house the radiant tube. The panels are shaped so that they interlock like a jigsaw, in both directions, without the need for fixing to the sub-floor. This attachment system allows for ease of connection for each individual panel and the modular system as a whole, creating an overall heating system characterized by quick and easy installation for both DIY installers and professionals, the company said. #### **Online Course on Organic Farming Offered**

<u>Basics of Organic Farming</u> is a self-directed online course for beginning orchard and vegetable-crop farmers, existing organic farmers, and farmers in transition to organic production. This course is a joint effort of the Organic Farming Research Foundation (OFRF) and others. It consists of six modules: 1) soil health; 2) weed management; 3) irrigation and water management; 4) insect pest management; 5) disease management; and 6) economics and marketing. The first two modules are online, and OFRF is asking for farmer feedback to help develop the remaining modules.

#### National Young Farmers Coalition Introduces Racial Equity Toolkit

The National Young Farmers Coalition has created a <u>Racial Equity Toolkit</u> designed to orient and guide members toward preliminary consciousness-raising and direct action. According to the National Young Farmers Coalition, it is an initial resource for people who are overwhelmed by the breadth and depth of the problem, and need help determining how to start dismantling racism in their communities.

#### Paint Product Stewardship to Begin in 2021

<u>New York Paint Stewardship Act</u> recently became the fifth product stewardship program established in NYS, after more than five years of persistent education and advocacy. In 2019, NYPSC worked in tandem with PSI, the American Coatings Association (ACA), and Citizens Campaign for the Environment (CCE) to lead a coalition of 43 local governments, municipal and industry associations, and other environmental groups urging the <u>passage of paint</u> <u>stewardship legislation</u>. The program, which will be managed by industry-run nonprofit <u>PaintCare</u>, is expected to launch in early 2021 and will offer hundreds of conveniently located drop-off locations throughout the state. New York is the 11th state (in addition to the District of Columbia) to adopt this program.

#### 'Carbon Cowboys' Documentary Series Highlights Regenerative Grazers

<u>Carbon Cowboys</u>, a 10-part documentary of short films by director Peter Byck, was released online by environmental nonprofit Carbon Nation in collaboration with Arizona State University. The 8- to 23-minute films highlight profitable regenerative grazers across the United States and in Canada. Byck says, "The film shows farmers working with nature, rather than against it. You see them caring for their animals and for their land. You see farmers making more money and creating an alternative to industrial farming."

#### **Slow Roll Introduces Social Distance Rides**

While community events like Slow Roll Buffalo are currently suspended due to the state of emergency over the spread of COVID-19, yet parks are open to enjoy outdoor activity at safe social distance, Slow Roll is helping fill the void in communal gathering by posting the routes of our 2016 rides from five Buffalo parks and encouraging the public to ride individually for the benefit of our collective mental and physical health. The five public parks are part of the Buffalo Olmsted Parks system - Cazenovia, Delaware, Front, MLK and Riverside. Route maps are <u>online</u>.

#### NYFOA Joins Audubon's Harvests for Habitat Project

New York Forest Owners Association has agreed to help Audubon New York promote its <u>Harvests for Habitat Project</u> in the Upper Delaware Watershed. Harvests for Habitat is a collaborative partnership between Audubon, <u>Watershed</u> <u>Agricultural Council</u>, and <u>New York Tree Farm Program</u> that enables bird habitat improvements through active forest management and financial incentives. The program encourages timber harvests that would create or renew habitat for atrisk bird species, such as the Wood Thrush, Cerulean Warbler, and others. The program seeks to work with professional foresters, loggers, and forest landowners interested in improving forest habitat through a harvest before November 2020. Your fishing observations can help shape future fisheries management actions. DEC is seeking angler observations as it begins its angler diary program on the Genesee River in Allegany and Wyoming counties. The diarist program aims to record data for trout and bass fishing trips on the Genesee River from the Pennsylvania line downstream through Letchworth State Park between **March 1 and October 31, 2020**. #### Funding Available for Job Training in Energy Efficiency and Clean Technology

NYSERDA's On-the-Job Training (OJT) for Energy Efficiency and Clean Technology program provides wage subsidies to eligible businesses to reduce the financial risk of hiring and training new workers, while developing job skills for new workers in energy efficiency and clean technology businesses. NYSERDA is working closely with the New York State Department of Labor (NYSDOL) to deliver this OJT program. NYSDOL will assist eligible businesses with developing OJT training plans as well as assessing necessary skills and available workers that match those skills. Incentives will be provided to businesses that hire workers for OJT enabling new workers to obtain clean energy field experience that cannot be gained by classroom training alone. All incentives, maximum funding amounts (i.e., caps), and COVID-19 specific provisions are subject to change on 12/31/20. #### Fabric Coating Created that Prevents Viral Adhesion

University of Pittsburgh researchers have created a washable textile coating that repels liquids, such as blood and saliva, and also prevents viruses from adhering to its surface. The liquid- and virus-repellent coating is made with polytetrafluoroethylene (PTFE, the same polymer that makes Teflon nonstick) and polypropylene microfibers. #### Buffalo Food Waste Diversion is Available Year-Round

The City has tested and is launching year-round collection of food waste in an outdoor collection bin at Elmwood Avenue and Bidwell Parkway. Food scraps will be transported by Natural Upcycling to Buffalo River Compost. Since June 2019, over 1000 people have participated in the "Scrap it" program with six summer locations available for drop-off. #### **Oil Companies Misled Public about Plastics Recycling**

A National Public Radio <u>podcast</u> discusses the volume of plastic trash that has been buried and not recycled. This story is part of a joint investigation with the PBS series *Frontline* that includes the documentary *Plastic Wars*, which aired March 31 on PBS. <u>Watch it online now</u>. NPR and PBS *Frontline* reviewed internal industry documents and interviewed top former officials. Though industry indicated that majority of plastic could be and would be recycled, the majority was not and companies profited from making new plastic.

#### **Enzyme to Rapidly Breakdown Plastics**

A team of scientists at the University of Portsmouth in England have developed a new enzyme with the ability to break down plastics up to six times faster than standard enzymes. The researchers, who previously engineered an enzyme found within bacteria of plastic bottles, combined it with a second enzyme to accelerate the breakdown of plastics. The first altered enzyme was called PETase, which will now be connected with MHETase to create the University's new enzyme protein. Between these two enzymes connecting, PET chains in plastic were found to break down twice as fast as PETase alone. For more, read <u>here.</u>

If you do not want to vote in person, you can request an absentee ballot by completing the application at <a href="https://elections.erie.gov/AbsenteeInfo">https://elections.erie.gov/AbsenteeInfo</a> by October 27. It is recommended that you complete it and mail it back as soon as possible to avoid delays. The deadline to register to vote is October 9, so don't delay. Early voting will take place from October 24-November 1 and you can find polling stations at <a href="https://elections.erie.gov/Early-Voting">https://elections.erie.gov/Early-Voting</a>. **Fall Into Good Recycling Habits-** Keep single-use cups, lids, and straws out of recycling bins unless they are listed as accepted in <u>your recycling program</u>- many recyclers do not accept these items. Skip a lid, straw or stirrer by letting your server know if you don't need these items. You can sustainably use fallen leaves a number of ways: add nutrients to your lawn by mulching the fallen leaves into the grass with a lawn mower, or you can collect them for your home compost pile.
