DEC Adopts New Freshwater Fishing Regulations

New freshwater fishing regulations go into effect April 1, 2017. The modifications to the sport fishing regulations are a result of a two-year process that included biological assessment, discussions with anglers, and a formal 45-day public comment period. Highlights of the new regulations include: Adjustments to existing walleye regulations in various waters throughout the state, including measures to protect spawning walleye and conservative minimum harvest size and creel limits in waters where managers are trying to establish self-sustaining populations of this popular sport fish; Allowing ice fishing in some waters and restricting the number or use of devices used for fishing through the ice in other waters to protect self-sustaining populations or limit fishing pressure; and Simplification of the black bass regulations in Lake Erie by compressing the three existing seasons into two while expanding opportunities to use live bait and harvest one large bass per day during a special season. DEC Announces New State Recreation Trail Supporter Patch

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation announced release of the newly designed Trail Supporter Patch. The updated design is the first in a three-color series of patches and resembles the trail markers used by DEC to mark north-south directional trails, a blue round disc with white lettering. The Trail Supporter Patch is available for \$5.00 at all sporting license outlets or on-line at the DECALS website for current New York State sporting license holders and will officially be available for purchase on March 1. Patch sale proceeds help maintain and enhance non-motorized recreation trails throughout the state. All monies raised from patch purchases will be deposited in the Conservation Fund's Outdoor Recreation, Trail Maintenance, and Development Account.

NY-Sun Solar Guidebook and Technical Assistance for Local Governments

The Guidebook includes updates to the NYS Unified Solar Permit and guidance on the New York State fire code, along with other practical information to aid local officials. DEC Programs Encourage Pharmacies to 'Take Back' Medicines

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) announced two new initiatives to encourage the proper management and disposal of products potentially harmful to public health and the environment. The Pharmaceutical Take-back Program is a \$1 million pilot program promoting the proper disposal of unwanted or unused prescription medicines that covers the costs of consumer drug collection boxes and disposal for two years. The State's second initiative, the Environmental Audit Incentive Program, offers incentives to pharmacies to better identify, manage, and properly dispose of certain materials currently regulated under the federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA), including some medicines, batteries, ignitable liquids, and lamps containing mercury. Pharmacies that would like to participate in this program are encouraged to apply on-line at the <u>Pilot Pharmaceutical Take-back Program</u> web page on DEC's website. The deadline for applications is **May 1, 2017**.

Funding for Foam Recycling Programs

The Foam Recycling Coalition, part of the Foodservice Packaging Institute, seeks applicants looking to start or strengthen a post-consumer foam polystyrene recycling program. Both public and private organizations involved in managing residential curbside recycling programs or material recovery facilities are eligible to apply for funding. This initiative helps fund infrastructure for the collection, processing and marketing of products made from foam polystyrene. It targets post-consumer foam polystyrene products, which includes foodservice packaging (i.e., cups, plates, bowls, clamshells, cafeteria trays) and other types of packaging, such as egg cartons; meat trays; and protective packaging (used when shipping electronics and other fragile items). The FRC distributes up to \$50,000 for each grant. Grant amounts are determined on a case-by-case basis dependent upon equipment needs. Although no cash match is required, additional costs may be incurred by the grantee for related items such as site preparation, provision of conveying system, electrical infrastructure, freight and other installation costs. **Applications must be submitted by April 17, 2017 for priority consideration.** The FRC will announce grant recipients throughout the year. Microgrid for the Medical Campus

Black & Veatch is partnering with the Buffalo Niagara Medical Campus to design and assess the financial and energy efficiency impacts of a <u>microgrid</u> in Buffalo, N.Y. The microgrid will provide resilient, clean energy for the 120-acre campus, long-term cost-savings and potential monetization opportunities for member institutions. A new microgrid would enable the medical campus to continue providing critical services during a potential power outage. Microgrid benefits would also include improved performance of the electric grid by better power consumption management during peak demand, increasing energy efficiency and reliability. Microgrids are integrated systems of multiple power generation sources and electric loads. When operated under a consolidated control and energy management system, microgrids can produce and distribute electricity and operate independently from the larger power grid.

APHIS Comment Period: Interstate Movement of Plant Pests, Biocontrol Agents, and Soil

APHIS proposes to revise the regulations that govern the movement into and within the United States of plant pests, biological control agents, and soil, and is soliciting public comments until **April 19, 2017**. Regarding the regulation of plant pests, this proposed rule would clarify the risk-based criteria APHIS uses to determine if an organism is a plant pest and to evaluate and issue permits, revise the definition of a plant pest to include organisms of unknown risk if those organisms are similar to known plant pests and put in place a notice-based process to establish and maintain a list of pests exempted from standard permit requirements. The exempted list would include plant pests that are established throughout their geographical range in the United States; low risk; or commercially available and under purview of another Federal agency, such as the Environmental Protection Agency. As it relates to the regulation of biological control organisms, this proposed rule would establish criteria regarding the movement and release of certain biological control agents in the continental United States, and establish exemptions for certain biological control organisms similar to what is being proposed for widely prevalent, low-risk plant pests. Protecting your Trees from Oak Wilt

Oak wilt, a deadly fungal disease for oak trees was discovered in six new locations in New York last year. This disease can be spread by beetles that are attracted to freshly cut or injured trees. Pruning in winter protects oaks from becoming infected. Trees pruned in winter respond more vigorously in the spring, putting out new growth. The oak wilt fungus clogs the trees' transport vessels, cutting off water and food from leaves and the rest of the tree. One way oak wilt spreads is when fungal spores hitch rides on insects. Sap beetles, one of the main culprits, are extremely attracted to fresh tree wounds. Pruning oaks during the growing season greatly increases the chances of insects infecting them with oak wilt.

The 4 R's – Reduce, Reuse, Recycle and Repair By Lesley Haynes

In the United States, and many other countries around the world, Earth Day has been observed on April 22nd since 1970. A great way to make the celebration your own is to volunteer with one of the many organizations working to safeguard the environment. Or you might decide to set yourself a goal, such as refraining from driving on Sundays, make a generous donation to an environmental charity, plant a tree with the family, start a vegetarian diet, or begin any other major commitment you have been considering.

I was born and raised in London, England. City living never really put me in contact with the earth, and I didn't think I had to count on the land; I expected it to provide for me. I assumed that I'd turn on the faucet and water that was clean enough to drink would come out and that I'd always have air that was safe to breathe. I did take public transportation, but that was for convenience, not because it was good for the environment. My carbon footprint and how I disposed of my garbage weren't issues on my mind.

Later in life I learned that garbage doesn't disappear but lies on top of the earth, seeping into the groundwater, and realized that everything one uses has an afterlife of hundreds, or even thousands, when it comes to plastic. It's quite simple: Find out how to reuse and locate places to recycle everything from metal to computers, sneakers, plastics, paper. If you think you don't have the time or money to join the green movement, you might be surprised that you already have some eco-friendly habits. There are so many things you can do every day to reduce, reuse and recycle. This includes recycling the water bottles that you drink out of to reusing old scrap paper for notes. Whether it's recycling, trying an alternative energy source, or just saying no to those styrofoam cups in the break room, every little bit matters.

There are many slogans related to recycling. During the Great Depression in 1930's the slogan was "use it up, wear it out, and make it do or do without". The good news: Americans already recycle about a third of their trash (double what was recycled in 1990). The not-so-good news: We need to do more and save more energy. Do your part: If every American recycled just one newspaper a week, about 36 million trees a year would be spared. Making recycled newspaper takes half as much energy as producing virgin newsprint. Is your mailbox constantly stuffed with junk? Call your credit providers and tell them you don't want your information sold; it will cut down on the amount of unwanted mail you receive and toss.

If you smoke, never drop CIGARETTE BUTTS outside. They can take ten years to degrade. Also: many land and marine animals die from eating them, and lighted cigarette butts are a common cause of forest and grassland fires.

Products manufactured with care for the environment are becoming more readily available. Go a step further by buying from companies that also help fund green nonprofits. Here are three among many: Newman's Own Organics (www.newmansownorganics.com), Ben & Jerry's (www.benjerry.com, and The Body Shop (www.thebodyshop.com).
