If you have old oil-based paint, fertilizer or pesticides lying around in your basement, garage or shed, 2019 is your lucky year. Erie County is increasing the number of free opportunities for county residents to get rid of potentially dangerous chemicals as part of its yearly household hazardous waste collection. The Department of Environment and Planning will hold five collection events throughout the county: **May 11** in Clarence; June 15 at Erie Community College South Campus in Orchard Park; Aug. 10 at ECC South Campus; Sept. 14 in Concord; and Oct. 5 in Buffalo. **Residents will have to preregister online or by phone to participate in the collection. Frog and Toad Crossings: Watch Out and Help Collect Data

With the arrival of spring temperatures, <u>amphibians</u> have begun their annual migrations to <u>woodland pools</u> to breed. Often, they must cross roads to reach these pools. In New York, this migration usually occurs on rainy nights in late March and early April, when the night air temperature is above 40°F. When these conditions exist there can be explosive, "big night" migrations, with hundreds of amphibians on the move. <u>Volunteers can help document these</u> <u>locations and help amphibians</u> like wood frogs, spotted salamanders, American toads, or spring peepers safely cross the road. We encourage drivers on the roads to proceed with caution or avoid travel on the first warm, rainy evenings of the season. "Why and How to Measure Food Loss and Waste: A Practical Guide" is an easy-to-use tool for businesses to apply in measuring the quantity of food wasted in their process activities. This new tool has the power to alter an organization's practices, reducing operational costs while also helping to reduce the environmental impacts of our food production system. The technical report, "Quantifying Food Loss and Waste and Its Impacts," that was released along with the guide, provides methods to quantify food loss and waste and food surplus across the supply chain, as well as tools to estimate the environmental, financial and social impacts of food loss and waste. Beekeeping Apprenticeships

Masterson's Garden Center in East Aurora is excited to continue our Beekeeping Apprenticeship program for the 2019 season. We piloted the program in 2015 and have greatly enjoyed the opportunity to work closely with new beekeepers. Our goal is to help both new beekeepers and those thinking of becoming beekeepers to develop a deeper understanding of hive management. We believe that while classroom instruction is an important part of understanding the working of a hive, the hands-on experience that our program can provide is essential.

The program will include an introduction to beekeeping, but will focus on time spent outdoors in our apiary. During the sessions, each participant will work in a small group with one of our experienced beekeepers and then have the responsibility of caring for several of our hives. Because participants will be inspecting the same hives each time, they will have the opportunity to see how the colony of honeybees changes over the course of the program. We'll be there every step of the way, and we think you'll be surprised how much you can learn during the three month session! In addition to proper hive inspection techniques, you'll learn how to deal with any issues that might arise such as swarm control, re-queening, varroa mite counts & treatment, making splits, combining weak hives, dealing with laying workers and much more. <u>Apply.</u> A Junior Apprenticeship program is also being offered in July. Search Engine Uses Ad Revenue to Plant Trees

Looking for an easy way to fight climate change? Here's a simple one: the next time you need to search for something on the internet, use Ecosia (<u>https://www.ecosia.org/</u>) – a search engine company that uses at least 80 percent of its adgenerated profits to plant millions of trees around the world. The small environmentally-minded company has recently brought in enough revenues to enable it to plant 50 million trees, which equates to the removal of 2.5 million tons of CO2 from the atmosphere. The startup partners with various projects globally to plant trees in locations where they can benefit the local economy and therefore positively contribute to communities. The non-profit's ambition is to potentially plant 1 trillion trees to help prevent a climate change catastrophe. That's a big number, but just by simply using Ecosia as their main search engine, people could help make that goal a reality.

Converting biosolids into building materials could keep a lot of leftovers of the waste process out of landfills, and provide other environmental benefits. A civil engineer at Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology University in Australia is designing a way to use the disinfected leftovers from the water treatment process to make bricks. This would allow for locally produced building materials that could reduce landfill waste and save energy and methane release. Shellworks: Recyclable Bioplastics

Four design students from The Royal College of Art and Imperial College have created a biodegradable and recyclable <u>bioplastic</u> using lobster shell waste. In an initiative dubbed <u>Shellworks</u>, the team has developed new manufacturing machines to produce what they believe is a sustainable replacement for single-use plastics. The malleable bioplastic is extremely versatile and can be adjusted in thickness, transparency, flexibility and stiffness to create a variety of biodegradable objects.

Food Donation and Scrap Laws and Regulations

In partnership with Harvard Food Law & Policy and Center for EcoTechnology, four legal facts sheets have been created to address common legal questions about food donation and food scraps diversion in New York State. These fact sheets should dispel some concerns about liability related to food donations and encourage more businesses to share surplus goods. Food waste is a major environmental issue, so keeping it out of landfills is important. These fact sheets explain both federal and New York State laws and regulations including: <u>Tax incentives for food donation</u>, <u>Liability protections for food donors</u>, <u>Date labeling requirements for food packaging</u>, Feeding food scraps to animals.

National Sword - What does it mean to Recycling?

The NYS DEC has compiled a summary of information on how the recycling market has been impacted by China's National Sword policy- reported as an initiative by China to clean up pollution in the environment. Almost a third of the recyclable materials collected in the U.S. were being exported. As of January 2018, China determined that many of the recyclables coming from the U.S. were too contaminated with non-recyclable material, decreasing the value of recyclables and contributing to pollution. To address changes in recycling markets head on, DEC has held a series of stakeholder meetings across the state with representatives from industry, local government, state and federal agencies, and the public to develop innovative and sustainable solutions for recycling in New York and identify open markets to utilize recyclables. As a result of the stakeholder meetings, a new recycling education campaign has also been launched in partnership with recycling stakeholders from across the State under the hashtag #RecycleRightNY on social media. Residents can help by not "wish cycling"- when well-meaning people put something in their recycling bin without knowing if it belongs there and hoping it gets recycled. Nationally, an estimated one in four items people place in household recycling bins are not recyclable, contributing to contamination, slowing down sorting, creating hazards, and decreasing the value of recyclables. The most important thing residents can do right now is follow the rules provided by your recycling hauler or municipality about what is accepted and what is not accepted in your local recycling program. By being diligent and placing only acceptable recyclables in your recycling bin, you can do your part in maintaining quality recyclables currently and for future markets. Residents across New York State are also encouraged to watch for the #RecycleRightNY campaign and share the information with friends, family and neighbors to learn about how we can all support recycling programs by empowering ourselves and others with recycling knowledge.

Adopt-a-Horse: Support the Solar-Powered Heritage Carousel

A solar-powered historic carousel is planned for Canalside in 2018. The Buffalo Heritage Carousel, Inc. is currently restoring the 1924 Spillman carousel which features 34 hand carved and painted animals and 3 chariots, with most currently needing restoration. Farms must be customers of a New York State investor-owned utility and contribute to the System Benefits Charge (SBC). Please check your farm's current electricity bills to determine if you pay SBC. Farms can request an energy audit through the Agriculture Energy Audit Program. NYSERDA will assign a Flexible Technical Assistance (FlexTech) Consultant to perform an energy audit.

Business Membership Program to Encourage Greener Commuting

Go Buffalo Niagara, a Transportation Management Association serving Erie and Niagara Counties, has launched a <u>business membership program</u> which encourages people to commute without a car. Once a business is signed up, its employees who choose to walk, carpool, bike, or take public transit to work will have access to myriad alternative transportation incentives, such as: discounted transit passes and preferred parking for carpools, guaranteed ride home which provides those who don't drive alone with a free ride home in case of emergencies, discounted memberships to <u>GObike Buffalo</u> and <u>Reddy Bikeshare</u> and monthly raffles for commuters who log their commute trips.

Batteries: What do I do with them when they no longer charge?

Different battery sizes and materials make recycling and/or recharging problematic. For batteries that are marked as rechargeable, they can be recycled at most retail locations that sell them, and retailers are required to provide signage and collection containers in easily accessible locations. Consumers are encouraged to utilize these take-back programs. Types of rechargeable batteries covered by the NYS Rechargeable Battery Law include Ni-Cd, sealed lead, Li-ion, Ni-MH, any other such dry cell battery capable of being recharged and battery packs containing any of the previously mentioned batteries. You can also check with your municipality or local recycling coordinator to see if any special programs are being offered in your area. Organizations and businesses can purchase a box to collect used batteries and then the box can be mailed back to the company for recycling. For non-rechargeable batteries, there is not currently a mandated take-back recycling program. Consumers can inquire with their local municipality or local recycling coordinator to see if any special programs are being offered in their area. Otherwise, non-rechargeable, single-use batteries may be put in your regular household trash and should **not** be taken to drop-off events.

Communities Benefit from Collaborative Projects to Restore New York's Great Lakes Resources

The 2016-2018 Great Lakes Report details how DEC and its partners are restoring environmental quality, conserving natural resources, promoting resilient communities, and supporting sustainable development. Key projects include Lake Ontario flood mapping, municipal sewage system upgrades, projects that help prevent beach closures, restore habitat, and wetlands, and projects that use native plants to stabilize shorelines at Sodus Bay, Sacketts Harbor, and Irondequoit Bay. Report highlights include: DEC, New York State Department of Health, and other partners developed green infrastructure design plans for the Lake Erie beach in the town of Evans and the Point Gratiot Park beach in the city of Dunkirk to capture runoff, restore beach quality, and reduce closures; the completion of nine habitat restoration projects along the Buffalo River shoreline and five Niagara River habitat and wetland restoration project designs. Water Sterilization with Carbon Dioxide

Australian researchers have successfully tested a new method for sterilizing water using hot bubbles of carbon dioxide, which uses less energy and is less harmful than chlorine or other chemical methods. In the new method, CO2 gas is first heated to a set temperature, then piped into a tank of wastewater. The hot bubbles transfer heat to the water around them, and the hot surface layer of the bubbles is enough to kill bacteria and viruses in the liquid.
