Erie County Parks Master Plan- Public Meeting and Comments Welcome

The Eric County Department of Parks, Recreation and Forestry in conjunction with the Eric County Department of Environment and Planning invite you to provide public input on the updated Eric County Parks Master Plan ("the Plan"). The Plan is intended to create a framework for preservation, enhancement and improvement of existing Parks assets and landscape settings over the next 15-20 years. The Plan development was guided by extensive public outreach which included a park user survey of 5,000 random county residents and seven stakeholder meetings with 65 stakeholder groups providing input. The Plan provides recommendations to improve each Park along with system-wide recommendations and guidance concerning partnerships to improve park maintenance and operations, improve public communications around park features and events, and preservation and restoration of natural systems and heritage features. The full plan can be reviewed here, with online public comment on the Plan accepted through December 17, 2018.

Land Conservancy Kicks Off International Design Competition

The Western New York Land Conservancy is excited to announce the start of new international Design Ideas Competition for the DL&W corridor. Professional and student designers, architects, landscape architects, urban planners, and artists are invited to submit their visionary concepts to transform the abandoned 1.5-mile elevated DL&W rail corridor connecting Buffalo's downtown with its waterfront through three distinct and historic neighborhoods.

The competition is the next step in reimagining this former industrial space as a multi-use urban nature trail and greenway. It follows the work of community leaders, residents, planners, and advocates who have championed the potential of this site for years. And it also follows on the heels of a year-long community visioning process that resulted in a published community vision plan that will guide the future of the DL&W corridor. The corridor is owned by the Niagara Frontier Transportation Authority (NFTA).

Competition winners will be selected by a jury of community leaders and local, national, and international experts in planning, design, community development, public art, architecture, and urban trail projects like New York City's High Line and Toronto's Bentway. The proposals will be revealed on the Land Conservancy's website and at several public exhibitions this spring. In addition to three winners selected by the jury, the community will also be able to select their favorite proposal. The winners will receive monetary awards ranging from \$1,000 to \$7,500.

Volunteer-Wildlife Rehabilitator Training

AWARE (Association for Wild Animal Rehabilitation and Education Inc.) will offer classes for wildlife rehabilitation on Saturdays from **February 9, 2019 to March 9, 2019** at Starpoint Central School, 4363 Mapleton Road, Lockport, NY 14094. Hours are from 10:00 until 1:00. The first session (February 9, 16) is designed to prepare future rehabilitators or volunteers for beginning rehabilitation of wildlife. The focus will be on mammals to obtain a NYS DEC wildlife rehabilitator license. The second session (February 23, March 9) focuses on the rehabilitation of wild birds. Following each session, all students are given a certificate of completion that can be used when applying for their NYS license application and US F&W application permit. The cost will be \$100.00. Confirmed Spotted Lanternfly in NY

The New York State Departments of Environmental Conservation (DEC) and Agriculture and Markets (DAM) confirmed that spotted lanternfly (SLF), an invasive pest from Asia, has been found in Albany and Yates counties. A single adult insect was discovered in a vehicle in the Capital District. In addition, a single adult insect was reported on a private Keuka Lake property in Penn Yan, Yates County. At this time, no additional insects have been found. DEC and DAM urge New Yorkers to report potential sightings to spottedlanternfly@dec.ny.gov. This insect is a destructive pest that feeds on more than 70 plant species including tree-of-heaven (*Ailanthus altissima*), maples, apple trees, grapevine, and hops. A Smartphone application is also available to help citizens and conservation professionals quickly and easily report new invasive species sightings directly to New York's invasive species database from their phones. Food Donation and Scrap Laws and Regulations

In partnership with Harvard Food Law & Policy and Center for EcoTechnology, four legal facts sheets have been created to address common legal questions about food donation and food scraps diversion in New York State. These fact sheets should dispel some concerns about liability related to food donations and encourage more businesses to share surplus goods. Food waste is a major environmental issue, so keeping it out of landfills is important. These fact sheets explain both federal and New York State laws and regulations including: Tax incentives for food donation, Liability protections for food donors, Date labeling requirements for food packaging, Feeding food scraps to animals.

DEC Announces Fourth Round of E-Waste Recycling Grants for Municipalities

A fourth round of grant funding from the Environmental Protection Fund (EPF) is being made available to help municipalities across the State address costs associated with the collection and recycling of eligible electronic wastes (e-waste). DEC will accept applications for these grants in January 2019. Approximately \$900,000 is available for the 2018 funding period (January 1, 2018 - December 31, 2018). DEC will accept applications for this funding opportunity beginning January 1, 2019, and no later than February 28, 2019. New York's Electronic Equipment Recycling and Reuse Act, requires electronic equipment manufacturers to offer consumers programs to collect and recycle e-waste such as computers, laptops, printers, monitors, keyboards, video game consoles, keyboards, televisions, and other small electronic equipment and has diverted more than 520 million pounds of e-waste from landfills for reuse and recycling between 2011 and 2016. As technology advances, the amount of e-waste consumers generate continues to grow. These grants will help mitigate financial pressures some local governments face in collecting and properly managing e-waste. DEC's Household Hazardous Waste Assistance Program will continue to administer the grant application process. Municipalities may receive reimbursement of up to 50 percent of eligible expenses incurred for recycling of e-waste between January 1, 2018, through December 31, 2018. NYSERDA Farm Energy Audits

NYSERDA offers free energy audits to identify energy efficiency measures for eligible farms and on-farm producers, including but not limited to: dairies, orchards, greenhouses, vegetable growers, vineyards, grain dryers, and poultry/egg. Farms must be customers of a New York State investor-owned utility and contribute to the System Benefits Charge (SBC). Please check your farm's current electricity bills to determine if you pay SBC. Farms can request an energy audit through the Agriculture Energy Audit Program. NYSERDA will assign a Flexible Technical Assistance (FlexTech) Consultant to perform an energy audit.

Rechargeable Batteries: What do I do with them when they no longer charge?

Different battery sizes and materials make recycling and/or recharging problematic. For batteries that are marked as rechargeable, they can be recycled at most retail locations that sell them, and retailers are required to provide signage and collection containers in easily accessible locations. Consumers are encouraged to utilize these take-back programs. Types of rechargeable batteries covered by the NYS Rechargeable Battery Law include Ni-Cd, sealed lead, Li-ion, Ni-MH, any other such dry cell battery capable of being recharged and battery packs containing any of the previously mentioned batteries. You can also check with your municipality or local recycling coordinator to see if any special programs are being offered in your area. Organizations and businesses can purchase a box to collect used batteries and then the box can be mailed back to the company for recycling. For non-rechargeable batteries, there is not currently a mandated take-back recycling program. Consumers can inquire with their local municipality or local recycling coordinator to see if any special programs are being offered in their area. Otherwise, non-rechargeable, single-use batteries may be put in your regular household trash and should **not** be taken to drop-off events.

Business Membership Program to Encourage Greener Commuting

Go Buffalo Niagara, a Transportation Management Association serving Erie and Niagara Counties, has launched a <u>business membership program</u> which encourages people to commute without a car. Once a business is signed up, its employees who choose to walk, carpool, bike, or take public transit to work will have access to myriad alternative transportation incentives, such as: discounted transit passes and preferred parking for carpools, guaranteed ride home which provides those who don't drive alone with a free ride home in case of emergencies, discounted memberships to GObike Buffalo and Reddy Bikeshare and monthly raffles for commuters who log their commute trips.

GroundUp: Geothermal Alliance of Western New York is leading the charge to bring Geothermal Heating and Cooling into every home in Western New York with its new \$128/month and \$0 money down financing option. This offer is for any qualifying homeowner looking to build a new home or replace their existing heating and cooling system in their current home, and usually covers houses up to 4,000 sqf with good insulation. The New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) has up to \$15 million available through June 2019 for the installation of ground source heat pump systems for residences, businesses and institutions. Rebates are available to qualified installers for two years or until all funds have been exhausted. The rebate will be deducted from the total cost of the system, thereby passing the savings along directly to consumers. DEC Announces \$2,24 Million in Urban Forestry Grants Awarded to Projects Statewide

Grants refund field trip costs including transportation, program fees, entry fees, and/or pavilion fees, but cannot reimburse chaperones who travel separately. Students can explore New York's natural and historic heritage by planning now and booking your field trip to a state park, state park nature center, state historic site or DEC environmental education center, fish hatchery, or other DEC lands! This program is available to any public school in a district *with* a Title 1 school (grades pre-K through 12 including school-sponsored clubs). Teacher's Resources

<u>World Climate Simulation</u> is a NSF-funded, research-based program gives educators a way to provide learners with an enjoyable meaningful experience and to make a difference in the real world.

<u>Orangutan Gang</u>-Lesson includes an introductory video, PowerPoint presentation, discussion, informative article and corresponding short-answer questions, and homework including online research and an activity with the goal of helping students realize just how much palm oil they use in their everyday lives.

<u>New GPS-STEM Lessons-</u>Engage formal and informal students in real-world applications of STEM concepts inspired by GPS.

<u>Soil Story Curriculum</u>-Kiss the Ground's middle school curriculum aims to foster a deeper understanding of the vital role soil plays for the planet and to inspire a new generation of people to better engage with the environment and their communities.

The Blossoms, the Birds and the Bees: a pollination investigation for Pre-K - Grade 2-This playful lesson plan includes three hands-on activities designed to grow young learners' understanding of the relationships between plants and pollinators, and spark their interest in these important living things. Students will play a matching game to discover why hummingbirds, bees, and butterflies choose the flowers they do, "fly" pollinators around the classroom in search of nectar, and use their senses to explore diversity in nature. This lesson plan is made to be adapted, and includes suggestions for extensions and additions to fit the needs of every classroom.

<u>Animals and Plants Can Live in a City</u> for Grades K-2. Students learn that animals need air, food, water, and shelter, while plants need air, sunlight, and water. Students watch videos and engage with drawing and sorting activities to reinforce their learning.

<u>How Disruptions Affect Animal Populations</u> for Grades 6-9. Students explore the effects that ecosystem disruptions can have on animal populations and the impacts that a shift in the population of one animal can have on others in an ecosystem.

<u>Deciding Your City's Energy Future</u> for Grades 9-12. Students watch videos adapted from NOVA: Treasures of the Earth: Power and analyze data provided in graphs and maps concerning the availability, cost, reliability, and environmental impact of different energy sources.

<u>The Frogs of Panama</u>- Engage students in authentic science research or explore biodiversity and conservation issues in the classroom with outreach materials developed by scientists/educators studying frogs at the Smithsonian Tropical Research Institute in Panama.

<u>Climate Change Timeline</u> describe early science leading up to the discovery of climate change.

<u>Climate Change Interactives</u> allows users to enter their location and see some of the direct local effects likely with climate change.

<u>Educator's Guide to Marine Debris</u>- also available in Spanish, easy-to-use guide is designed to provide maximum flexibility for educators in both form and informal settings.

<u>Project GRACE</u>- To prepare youth in economically disadvantaged communities for the prospect of careers in science, technology, engineering, or mathematics (STEM) through Geographic Information Systems (GIS).

<u>FoodSpan</u> is a free, downloadable curriculum that provides high school students with a deep understanding of critical food system issues, empowers them to make healthy and responsible food choices, and encourages them to become advocates for food system change.

<u>Climate Change and the Water Cycle: Four Big Questions Answered</u>-Free e-book. Dramatic changes to our planet like glaciers calving into the sea and record-setting temperatures make front page headlines around the world. But while other disruptions caused by the climate crisis – such as the transformation of our planet's water cycle – are a little less immediately striking, they can be even more profound and far-reaching. The consequences can also seem confusing and contradictory. How is it even possible that climate change increases our risk of both heavy rains and extreme droughts?

<u>PollinatorLIVE: A Distance Learning Adventure</u>- resource that aims to meet national science education standards and promoting conservation action through education. Using the Coloring Sheets, students will colour in a chosen flower, then use the facts written underneath to match their flower up with its pollinator.

<u>Design a Flower</u> teaches students about what pollination is and how it happens. Using what they learned, students will then receive a card with a specific pollinator on it and will be asked to design the perfect flower for them.

<u>Seeing Red</u> teaches students about frequencies of light and how different colored light is absorbed or transmitted by colored filters. They will also discover how some animals use bioluminescence and color perception to outsmart prey.

<u>Materials Science and the Problem of Garbage</u>-Equip students to make informed choices about materials use and disposal with a series of lessons in which they investigate the technological and engineering ingenuity involved in making materials—and also the environmental ramifications.

<u>Water Agriculture Sustainability</u>-InTeGrate provides this three to five-week module that provides a framework for students to learn about how people interact with water, peer into our water future, and consider ways we might foster more sustainability in water management. After assessing our major water challenges, the module has students learn about the concepts of water sustainability, virtual water trade, and water footprints. The focus then turns to the interplay between agriculture and water resources, as agriculture has the greatest impact on freshwater consumption and quality.

Contests and Awards

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announces the release of the 16th Annual P3 Awards: A National Student Design Competition Focusing on People, Prosperity and the Planet (P3)-EPA announces its Phase I Request for Applications (RFA). This collegiate design competition promotes the use of scientific and engineering principles in creating innovative projects to address environmental challenges and develop real-world solutions. This RFA is seeking applications in the research areas of Air Quality, Safe and Sustainable Water Resources, Sustainable and Healthy Communities, and Chemical Safety. Deadline: December 11.

<u>Transforming our Tomorrow: A New Clean Energy Vision Competition</u>-For students or student groups in New York to present their passion in creating a sustainable world through clean energy. Cash prizes. Competition is April 30, 2019. Application Deadline: **December 14**.

<u>"We All Live in a Watershed" poster contest</u> is open to all middle school students. Fourteen winners will have the honor of having their artwork in a calendar that will be distributed across New York State. The deadline for submitting posters is **January 11, 2019**.

<u>President's Environmental Youth Award</u> recognizes outstanding environmental stewardship projects by K-12 youth, promoting awareness of our nation's natural resources and encouraging positive community involvement. Winners of this year's awards will be invited to a ceremony in Washington, D.C. in mid-2019, and have their project mentioned on EPA's website. EPA will select up to two winners in each of EPA's 10 Regions – one regional winner for Grades K-5 and one regional winner for Grades 6-12. All student projects must be sponsored by at least one adult over the age of 21. Applications are due **February 1, 2019.**

<u>Toshiba/NSTA ExploraVision Science Competition</u> encourages K-12 students to imagine what technology might be like in the future while experiencing scientific process and discovery in an engaging, hands-on way. Let's empower the next generation of inventors, scientists and leaders. Deadline: **February 6, 2019**.

Grant and Scholarship Opportunities

<u>Farm to School Grants</u>-USDA Food and Nutrition Service is accepting applications from eligible schools, state and local agencies, Indian tribal organizations, agricultural producers or groups of producers, and nonprofit entities. USDA anticipates awarding approximately \$7.5 million in grant funding to support efforts that improve access to local foods in schools. Planning and training grant awards range from \$20,000 to \$50,000, and implementation grants range from \$50,000 to \$100,000. Grants require a 25% match. Deadline: **December 4, 2018.**

Specialty Crop Research Initiative requests pre-applications for fiscal year (FY) 2019 to solve critical United States specialty crop issues, priorities, or problems through the integration of research and extension activities that use systems-based, trans-disciplinary approaches. The intent of the SCRI program is to address the needs of the various specialty crop industries through the promotion of collaboration, open communication, the exchange of information, and the development of resources that accelerate application of scientific discovery and technology. Approximately \$80 million is available through this program in FY 2019. Pre-applications may be submitted by Federal agencies, national laboratories, colleges and universities, research institutions and organizations, private organizations or corporations, State Agricultural Experiment Stations, Cooperative Extension Services, individuals, or groups consisting of two or more of these entities. Deadline: **December 10, 2018**.

Municipal Grants for Emerging Contaminants- New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation (NYS EFC) has up to \$1 million in grant funding to municipalities to help pay for the planning and development of eligible drinking water infrastructure projects that protect public health by removing or otherwise addressing emerging contaminants such as perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA), perfluorooctane sulfonate (PFOS) and 1,4-dioxane (an Emerging Contaminants Project). Deadline: **December 14, 2018**.

<u>Cultivating Change</u> is a grant program that gives local farms funds to upgrade operations, invest in food safety, implement sustainable technology, and continue doing what they do best: grow. The program is funded by Greener Fields Together's network of fresh produce distributors throughout North America who want to invest in the farms that have been the backbone of their communities for generations. Greener Fields Together local farm partners are automatically eligible to participate in both the popular vote contest and panel review process. Local farms that are not part of Greener Fields Together are able to apply and win via the popular vote contest. The popular vote contest makes \$25,000 available, with \$10,000 going to the first-place vote-getter and smaller amounts awarded down to sixth place. Deadline: **December 15, 2018**.

<u>2019 Youth Garden Grant</u> - supports school and youth educational garden projects that enhance the quality of life for students and their communities. 5 programs will receive awards valued at \$2100 and 20 programs will receive award valued at \$500. Deadline: **December 17**

<u>Food and Farm Communications Fund Core Grants</u> awards targeted communications support to community-based nonprofit organizations and grassroots networks working to advance systemic and cultural change across our food and farm systems. The program prioritizes work led by communities of color, indigenous communities, farmers, farmworkers, fishermen, and food workers. Non-profits with average annual revenue of less than \$2 million and a commitment to equity and racial, social, and/or economic justice are eligible to apply for grants ranging from \$15,000 to \$40,000 over a 12-month term. Letters of interest are due by **December 28, 2018.**

<u>2018 Keep America Beautiful/Coca-Cola Public Spaces Recycling Bin Grant Program</u> is designed to increase access to recycling in community public spaces across America. Eligible recipients for the 2018 Public Spaces Recycling Bin Grant Program include municipal and government agencies, colleges and universities, civic organizations, and local nonprofit groups. Keep America Beautiful will award the grants in mid-January 2019 and make arrangements with suppliers to deliver recycling bins directly to the recipients in the first quarter of 2019. Deadline: **December 30**.

<u>Solid Waste Management Grant Program Drug Disposal Priority</u> will award additional priority points to Solid Waste Management Grant Program applications proposing innovative projects to promote the <u>safe disposal of prescription drugs</u> in rural communities. Deadline: **December 31, 2018.**

Enhancing Agricultural Opportunities for Military Veterans Program provides grants to non-profits to increase the number of military veterans gaining knowledge and skills through comprehensive, hands-on, and immersive model farm and ranch programs offered regionally that lead to successful careers in the food and agricultural sector. The program encourages the development of training opportunities specifically designed for military veterans. Applications are due by **January 10, 2019**.

<u>S.J. & Jessie E. Quinney Scholarship for Undergraduates</u> provides a grant to ensure that the Quinney's lifelong interest in natural resources will be carried on through the educational support of Quinney scholars. Application deadline: **January 15, 2019**.

<u>Captain Planet Foundation Grants</u>- supports programs that embrace STEM learning and empower youth to become local and global environmental change-makers. It is offering grants from \$500 to \$2,500 to educators (both K-12 classroom and informal) to help children and youth understand and appreciate our world through learning experiences that engage them in active, hands-on projects to improve the environment in their schools and communities. **Deadline: January 15**

2019 Coastal Management Fellowship Program-For the 2019 fellowship, applicants must complete a master's or other advanced degree at an accredited U.S. university between January 1, 2018, and July 31, 2019, to be eligible. A broad range of degrees are applicable to the fellowship because the projects are varied among the host organizations. This two-year opportunity offers a competitive salary, medical benefits, and travel and relocation expense reimbursement. Deadline: **Friday, January 18, 2019**.

New York State New Farmers Grant Fund provides grants to support beginning farmers who have chosen farming as a career and who materially and substantially participate in the production of an agricultural product on their farm. The grant fund will help farmers improve farm profitability through one or both of the following goals: expanding agricultural production, diversifying agricultural production, and/or extending the agricultural season; and/or advancing innovative techniques that increase sustainable agricultural production practices, such as organic farming, food safety, reduction of farm waste, and/or water use. Grants may provide a minimum of \$15,000 and a maximum of \$50,000 for up to 50% of total project costs. New York State farmers in their first 10 years of farming and with a minimum of \$10,000 in farm income may apply. Deadline: January 25, 2019.

Population and Ecosystem Dynamics Federal Funding Opportunity - NOAA-OAR-SG-2019-2005907

The NMFS-Sea Grant Fellowship Program in Population and Ecosystem Dynamics expects to award at least three new Ph.D. Fellowships in 2019 to students who are interested in careers related to marine ecosystem and population dynamics, with a focus on modeling and managing systems of living marine resources. These fellowships can provide support for up to three years. Emphasis will be on the development and implementation of quantitative methods for assessing marine ecosystems, for assessing status of fish, invertebrate, and other targeted species stocks and for assessing the status of marine mammals, seabirds, and other protected species. Deadline: **January 30**.

Marine Resource Economics Federal Funding Opportunity - NOAA-OAR-SG-2019-2005909. The 2019 NMFS-Sea Grant Fellowship Program in Marine Resource Economics expects to award one new Ph.D. Fellowship each year to students who are interested in careers related to the development and implementation of quantitative methods for assessing the economics of the conservation and management of living marine resources. This fellowship can provide support for up to three years. Deadline: **January 30**.

The Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration grant program seeks to develop community capacity to sustain local natural resources for future generations by providing modest financial assistance to diverse local partnerships focused on improving water quality, watersheds and the species and habitats they support. Potential projects include a variety of ecological improvements along with targeted community outreach, education and stewardship. Projects should also increase access to the benefits of nature, reduce the impact of environmental hazards and engage local communities, particularly underserved communities, in project planning, outreach and implementation. This program expects that applicants will represent a mixture of urban and rural communities. NFWF may use a mix of public and private funding sources to support any grant made through this program. Deadline: January 31.

<u>Healthy Watersheds Consortium</u>-The goal of the Healthy Watersheds Consortium Grant Program is to accelerate strategic protection of healthy, freshwater ecosystems and their watersheds. The primary focus for applicants should be protection and stewardship of land in the watershed, not restoration of degraded habitats or projects with a strictly water-quality improvement outcome. Deadline: **February 4, 2019**.

The Environmental Justice Small Grants (EJSG) program awards grants that support community-driven projects designed to engage, educate, and empower communities to better understand local environmental and public health issues and develop strategies for addressing those issues, building consensus in the community, and setting community priorities. The EJSG program will award approximately \$1.5 million nationwide for this competitive opportunity. EPA anticipates awarding approximately 50 grants (5 per EPA region) of up to \$30,000 each. These grants are for one-year projects. Deadline: **February 15, 2019.**

<u>Funding for Municipal Food Scraps Reduction, Food Donation, and Food Scraps Recycling</u>- to support municipal projects to reduce wasted food, donate wholesome food and recycle food scraps. Deadline: **March 1, 2019.**

<u>Learning to Give Mini-Grants for Service-Learning-</u>The Learning to Give mini-grants range from \$250 to \$500 with a simple application process and priority given to those who use social media to share their plans, discuss ideas, and reflect! Applications will be reviewed on the 22nd of each month until **March 22, 2019**.

<u>Food Waste Grants</u> - The New York State <u>Pollution Prevention Institute</u> (P2I) will operate the funding program, which will provide reimbursement to businesses that generate over one ton of food waste per week to offset the cost of select technologies and equipment that promise to reduce or divert that food waste from landfill or incineration. Eligible projects must reduce and/or divert wasted food at a New York State business including, but not limited to, supermarkets, restaurants, and hospitals. Monies from this program will help food scrap generators implement food waste reduction recommendations, purchase capital equipment used in food donation, and create, improve, and expand diversion efforts to on and off-site compost and anaerobic digestion facilities. Deadline: **Rolling.**

<u>Wells Fargo Clean Technology and Innovation Grant Program</u> funds projects and programs related to research and development for new and emerging clean technologies by working with universities, colleges, research institutes and laboratories as well as entrepreneur incubator, accelerator and business plan competitions. If you would like to submit a topic for consideration provide a brief description (150 words or less).

<u>Project Produce: Fruit and Veggie Grants for Schools</u>-designed to help increase kids' access to fresh fruits and vegetables and create experiential nutrition education when and where students make their food choices: in the cafeteria. The \$2,500 one-year grants support food costs to incorporate school-wide fruit and vegetable tastings into the school's nutrition program. Grants will be determined on an ongoing basis depending on available funding.

<u>Industrial Hemp Processing Grant Fund</u>-New York State has also allocated up to \$5 million for grants for machinery and equipment required to process industrial hemp for commercialization in New York. Grants may provide a minimum of \$50,000 and a maximum of \$500,000 for up to 50% of total project costs supporting capital investments. To be eligible, the facility must be located wholly in New York State which processes industrial hemp for commercialization.

<u>Toyota Every Day Capacity Building Grants</u>- Up to \$5000 for 25 Public Lands Friends' groups in each cycle. Projects that are needed and will help contribute to the long- term sustainability of the organization. Deadlines: **April 23 and other dates later in the year**.

<u>The Karma for Cara Foundation</u> is encouraging kids 18 and under to apply for funds between \$250 and \$1,000 to complete service projects in their communities. **Deadline: Rolling.**

NIEHS Conference Grants-The mission of the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS) is to discover how the environment affects people in order to promote healthier lives. The NIEHS Conference grant program is considered an integral part of the overall mission of the Institute; thus it is critical that all conference grant applications have a direct relationship to advancing the mission of NIEHS. In order to be responsive, all conference grant proposals must focus on or clearly indicate relevance to advancing our understanding of the role of environment and/or gene-environment interactions in disease/dysfunction. **Deadline: Rolling.**

Youth Pollinator Gardens Grant- up to \$200, are available for projects that include educational materials on the vital role pollinators play in nature and youth involvement in planning and planting gardens providing nesting and food sources for pollinators. Youth will learn the importance of providing appropriate food sources, nesting areas, shelter, and practicing sustainable gardening practices for pollinators by planning, planting, and maintaining these pollinator gardens. To apply for a grant, complete an NGC Grant Application, provide detailed information about the project, and submit your request to the NGC Youth Committee Chairman for approval.

<u>Cornell Douglas Foundation</u>- Its mission is to provide small grants to organizations which promote the vision of the foundation: advocating for environmental health and justice, encouraging stewardship of the environment, and furthering respect for sustainability of resources. **Deadline: Rolling.**

<u>Saving Species</u>- We help local conservation groups purchase land for conservation and habitat restoration, and may consider projects for restoration of habitat on land that is within an existing protected area. We maximize our effectiveness by providing grants for the purchase and restoration of land that connects existing habitat fragments, or that prevents isolation of habitat that would otherwise continue due to habitat loss. **Deadline: Rolling.**

<u>Cedar Tree Foundation</u>- Letters of Inquiry Accepted at Any Time. Areas: Environmental Education, Environmental Health, Sustainable Agriculture.

<u>VolunTEEN Nation International Service Project Grants-</u> Students (ages 13-22) from the US going abroad to volunteer or study in a developing country are encouraged to apply for an international service-learning mini-grant. Grants are for up to \$300 to create a service project in a developing country while you are visiting that country. **Deadline: Rolling.**

KEEN Effect is committed to inspiring responsible outdoor participation to help preserve the places we all play. Through the KEEN Effect, \$10,000 grants are awarded to nonprofit organizations around the world who are dedicated to responsible outdoor participation. Projects must increase responsible outdoor participation as a way to work towards building a strong community. **Deadline: Ongoing.**

Everyday Young Hero Award-Everyday Young Heroes are young people, ages 5-25, who are improving their communities through service to others and making significant progress in achieving the UN's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Each week, YSA selects one young person to receive this honor and receive \$250 grants to continue and expand their project. **Deadline: Rolling**

<u>The Fruit Tree Planting Foundation</u> is dedicated to planting fruitful trees and plants to alleviate world hunger, combat global warming, strengthen communities, and improve the surrounding air, soil, and water. FTPF programs strategically donate orchards where the harvest will best serve communities for generations. **Deadline: Rolling**.

Remember the 4 R's: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Repair

This is a column that Lesley contributed for December 2017 as a reminder of what we can do this time of year.

As we approach the Christmas season and are caught up in the hustle and bustle of activities, it is important to be thoughtful about energy saving purchases. I have mentioned most of these things before but feel that they may be worth repeating.

Plan to purchase a living Christmas tree with roots attached. Later you can plant it in your yard or donate it to your local parks department. If it's a cut tree, recycle it. Shred the live tree and use the mulch in the garden around evergreen shrubs and trees.

If purchasing new holiday lights, consider seasonal light emitting diode, or LED, strings of lights. These can use up to 95 percent less energy than conventional bulbs, and they last seven times longer. Using holiday lighting wisely can lower power consumption. Timers and photo cells can also help reduce power usage by turning the lights on at dusk and turning them off at a desired time. Avoid leaving lights on all night. More strings of lights means more energy used - try reducing the number this season. Tinsel can be used to amplify lighting.

Be financially responsible: Overspending during the holidays will not only increase your stress now, but will leave you feeling anxious for months afterward as you struggle to pay the bills. Step back from the excessive gift-giving and practice simplicity, creativity and basic human kindness

Going green is the way to go when planning gifts. - When you give someone a "green gift" it means you went the extra distance for someone and for everyone. It means you have taken the time to consider the environment. It also means you have given a gift that shows something about you - and that you have created a ripple effect whose final result is too significant to calculate.
