Climate Emergency Resolution Petition: WNY Climate Youth Council Wants Signatures

The WNY Climate Youth Council, sponsored by the WNY Environmental Alliance and its Youth and Climate Justice Initiative, is a gathering of mostly high school students concerned about climate change, climate justice and species extinction. They have organized rallies in Buffalo in support of the international youth climate strike movement, the most recent at Niagara Square on Sept. 20 where more than 500 people gathered. They are urging the Buffalo Common Council and the Erie County Legislature to pass a Climate Emergency Resolution and join over 990 local governments in 18 countries to do so. In support of that effort, they are gathering signatures on a petition requesting a resolution. They have over 500 young people in various high schools across the region who have already signed. DEC Seeks Public Comments re: Endangered and Threatened Species List

DEC is proposing changes to its list of endangered and threatened species in New York. A threatened or endangered species is protected under New York State's Endangered Species Law and becomes a priority for monitoring and management programs. A permit is also required for projects likely to cause harm to these species. DEC is proposing to remove 19 species from the list and add 18 species. See the <u>draft changes to the state endangered and threatened species list</u> and where to send suggestions. We are encouraging the public to comment on the draft list before we develop a formal proposal to revise the list. Comments accepted through **January 24, 2020.**

Erie County and City of Buffalo Designated as New York Climate Smart Communities

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo announced a record number of new certified Climate Smart Communities which recognizes the leadership of local governments that have documented their accomplishments in reducing greenhouse gas emissions and adapting to climate change. The City of Buffalo and Erie County both received the designation for successfully meeting the bronze criteria. Buffalo Food Waste Diversion is Available Year-Round

The City has tested and is launching year-round collection of food waste in an outdoor collection bin at Elmwood Avenue and Bidwell Parkway. Food scraps will be transported by Natural Upcycling to Buffalo River Compost. Since June 2019, over 1000 people have participated in the "Scrap it" program with six summer locations available for drop-off. Acceptable materials are fruits and vegetable scraps, coffee grounds and filters, egg shells, tea bags and nuts. For more info, visit www.buffalorecycles.org.

WNY Land Conservancy Receives \$250,000 Toward Purchase of Mossy Point in Wales

The Western New York Land Conservancy has received three new donations totaling \$250,000 toward the purchase and protection of Mossy Point, a 222-acre property located in Wales, NY, along Hunters Creek near East Aurora. They have now raised \$1.35 million toward their goal of \$1.6 million. But they need to raise an additional \$250,000 by December 31, 2019 in order to purchase the property and save it for future generations. Donations include \$100,000 from Dr. Paul Rutledge, an ecologist and former Land Conservancy board member who now resides in Michigan. Paul was instrumental in the land protection projects done by the Land Conservancy during its first decade, including Kenneglenn, a preserve adjacent to Mossy Point. Current Land Conservancy board member Kathryn Lasher and her partner, Scott Bieler, president of West Herr Automotive Group, contributed gifts equaling \$100,000 and anonymous donor contributed \$100,000. Once purchased, Mossy Point will include walking, cross-country, and snowshoe trails. It will connect to the adjacent Kenneglenn Nature Preserve as well as the adjacent Hunters Creek County Park.

Buffalo Olmsted Parks Receives NYSDEC Grant to Fund Dead Ash Tree Removal

A NYSDEC Urban and Community Forestry Grant provided \$75,000 to remove large dead ash trees throughout the Buffalo Olmsted Park System. Due to the invasive emerald ash borer, many ash trees have died. Replantings will include a diverse mix of species to bolster resilience in the tree community in Buffalo.

'The Riverline': New Name for Buffalo's Former DL&W Corridor

The Western New York Land Conservancy unveiled "The Riverline," the new name for the DL&W Corridor project. The one-and-a-half-mile former rail corridor running from Canalside to the Buffalo River across from the new Tesla solar panel manufacturing facility at Riverbend is slated to become a new nature-centered public space. The Land Conservancy is transforming this corridor into an iconic, innovative, and inspiring nature trail and greenway as it crosses through the Old First Ward, Perry, and Valley neighborhoods. The Riverline name reflects elements of the project that community members identified as important to them: the connections this new nature trail and greenway will make through the neighborhoods it crosses and the influence the adjacent waterways have had on the land surrounding the project for centuries. Sections of the trail will have names that also reflect the heritage of the corridor and the natural elements that are reclaiming it after decades of human neglect. "The Del" is a nod to the elevated berms that run the corridor through Perry and the Old First Ward; "The Junctures" is where the trail navigates other existing and legacy rail infrastructure; and "The Basswoods" designates re-naturalized areas along the trail where native Basswood trees previously flourished and will soon rise again. The Land Conservancy also released a short video, produced by Paget Films, that captures the essence and magic of The Riverline.

Clean Heating and Cooling Communities

Clean Heating and Cooling Communities Campaign is aimed at getting groups of homes and businesses in New York State to install clean heating and cooling (CH&C) technologies. CH&C technologies like ground source heat pumps, air source heat pumps, solar heating and cooling, and biomass can help lower energy bills and reduce emissions of harmful greenhouse gases while making homes and businesses more comfortable. NYSERDA is supporting communities in implementing multi-year community-based outreach and education campaigns. The energy study includes: A comprehensive walk through of the facility; site staff interviews; utility bill analysis; fuel-neutral, unbiased evaluation of potential low-cost/no-cost and capital improvement energy efficiency upgrades; and a report that outlines potential energy and cost savings opportunities for your facility. Water Soluble Packaging: End of Shampoo Bottles?

For her master's thesis at the University of Arts in Berlin, Jonna Breitenhuber developed a bottle made from soap that can effectively serve as packaging for any liquid hygiene product on the market—and they are just as visually arresting as the best-designed plastic bottles. These bottles, which she calls <u>SOAPBOTTLE</u>, are made from a traditional piece of soap that's been hollowed out. The interior is lined with a water-insoluble layer, which prevents any liquids contained within it from dissolving the soap. On the top, there is a reusable metal closure to allow you to open the top and pour out your shampoo or shower gel. After a while, you'll just have little remnants of soap left, which she recommends using as hand soap, and it's entirely biodegradable. So unlike plastic, it will not result in any waste. Battery Breakthrough Proposed by Hydrogen Truck Maker

Nikola Motor reports that it has developed a new type of battery cell with double the energy density, only 40% of the weight and half the cost of current lithium-ion batteries used in Teslas and other consumer-market electric vehicles. The company is not providing many details for now, and public demonstrations won't happen for about 10 months. By avoiding using metals that add cost and weight to lithium-ion batteries, the cells will be exactly half the price per kilowatt hour. Cutting down on mining for cobalt and nickel would also improve the cell's overall environmental impact.

Waste Scanner to Identify Recyclable Items

A device is under development to scan items and let users know whether their local recycler will accept the item. The simple-to-use, handheld device is intended for use by waste organizations; the goal is to have the waste facility provide the device to each household. The device will help keep recyclable items out of the landfills and the oceans. Almost as bad as misdirected recyclable items are the materials that end up in the recycling bin where they don't belong. Report Cladophora on Shorelines

Help us understand and monitor *Cladophora*, a non-harmful green alga, by reporting observations along Lake Erie, Lake Ontario, Niagara River and St. Lawrence River Shorelines. Cladophora is a type of stringy (filamentous) algae that grows on rocks, wood, logs, and other hard underwater surfaces in freshwater ecosystems, including the Great Lakes basin. Food Donation and Scrap Laws and Regulations

In partnership with Harvard Food Law & Policy and Center for EcoTechnology, four legal facts sheets have been created to address common legal questions about food donation and food scraps diversion in New York State. These fact sheets should dispel some concerns about liability related to food donations and encourage more businesses to share surplus goods. Food waste is a major environmental issue, so keeping it out of landfills is important. These fact sheets explain both federal and New York State laws and regulations including: <u>Tax incentives for food donation</u>, <u>Liability protections</u> for food donors, Date labeling requirements for food packaging, Feeding food scraps to animals.

Pesticide-treated Seeds May be Responsible for Songbird Decline

A recent study suggested that seeds treated with neonicotinoid pesticides could be behind loss of songbirds. Eating even one or two seeds treated with neonicotinoid pesticides suppresses birds' appetite, causing weight loss that delays migration and potentially contributes to the steep decline in North American songbird populations, researchers reported in Science. Though eating a few seeds treated with neonics does not kill birds, it does cause an average loss of 9% to 17% in crucial body fat, and may render them unable breed. Read more here

Business Membership Program to Encourage Greener Commuting

Go Buffalo Niagara, a Transportation Management Association serving Erie and Niagara Counties, has launched a <u>business membership program</u> which encourages people to commute without a car. Once a business is signed up, its employees who choose to walk, carpool, bike, or take public transit to work will have access to myriad alternative transportation incentives, such as: discounted transit passes and preferred parking for carpools, guaranteed ride home which provides those who don't drive alone with a free ride home in case of emergencies, discounted memberships to GObike Buffalo and Reddy Bikeshare and monthly raffles for commuters who log their commute trips.

Municipality Rebates for Zero-emission Vehicles and Grants for ZEV Infrastructure

The 2019 round of DEC's municipal ZEV program is now open. Full details may be found in the Request for Applications (RFA) at http://www.dec.ny.gov/energy/109181.html. A total of \$500,000 will be distributed in this round on a first-come, first-served basis for clean vehicle rebates which include plug-in hybrid, all-electric, and hydrogen fuel cell vehicles. Applications for the Municipal Clean Vehicle Rebate Program on a rolling basis through 4:00 pm on July 24, 2020 or until funding is exhausted. A total of \$2,500,000 in grants will be distributed for infrastructure to municipalities that installed (or will install) hydrogen filling station components or electric vehicle supply equipment (EVSE) that is Level 2 or direct current fast charge (DCFC). DEC is accepting applications for the Municipal ZEV Infrastructure Grant Program on a rolling basis through 4:00 pm on May 29, 2020 or until funding is exhausted, whichever occurs first.

Nonprofit Funding for Green Energy

Sun Club is <u>accepting grant applications</u> from nonprofits that need green funding and clean energy expertise. By funding sustainable solutions for nonprofits, Sun Club helps them continue their mission while contributing to a cleaner environment.

Personal Plastics Calculator

Environmental footprint calculators have been used for a number of years as a measure of personal impact. Now there is a calculator that allows you to assess your plastic usage in a week or year. NYSERDA Farm Energy Audits

NYSERDA offers free energy audits to identify energy efficiency measures for eligible farms and on-farm producers, including but not limited to: dairies, orchards, greenhouses, vegetable growers, vineyards, grain dryers, and poultry/egg. Farms must be customers of a New York State investor-owned utility and contribute to the System Benefits Charge (SBC). Please check your farm's current electricity bills to determine if you pay SBC. Farms can request an energy audit through the Agriculture Energy Audit Program.

Indoor Solar Cells Designed

Swedish and Chinese scientists have developed organic solar cells that can convert ambient indoor light to electricity. While they won't generate lots of power, it should provide enough energy for many of our devices. As the internet of things expands, it is expected that we will need to have millions of products online, both in public spaces and in homes. Many of these will be the multitude of sensors to detect and measure moisture, particle concentrations, temperature and other parameters. For this reason, the demand for small and cheap sources of renewable energy is increasing rapidly, in order to reduce the need for frequent and expensive battery replacements. Organic solar cells are flexible and cheap to manufacture and their light-absorbing layer gives considerable flexibility in tuning the solar cells such that they are optimized for different light wavelengths. School Energy Benchmarking Services

The Pre-kindergarten through Grade 12 (P-12) Schools Initiative - Benchmarking Program is available to provide up to three years of free energy benchmarking services to eligible schools. Benchmarking is a mechanism to measure, track and assess a building's utility, greenhouse gas, cost and energy metrics over time or comparatively to other similar buildings. Benchmarking will help schools better understand their energy use, identify inefficiencies, maximize energy performance, and support financial planning and budgeting. To submit an application, schools are required to meet general eligibility requirements. The Presidential Environmental Youth Awards (PEYA) recognizes outstanding environmental stewardship projects from grades K-12, by promoting environmental awareness and encouraging community involvement. EPA will select up to two winners in each of EPA's 10 Regions – one regional winner for grades K-5, and one regional winner for grades 6-12. Winners will be invited to participate in an awards ceremony and poster session in Washington, D.C. in mid-2020, and projects will also be highlighted on EPA's website. All student projects must be sponsored by at least one adult over the age of 21. Deadline: **January 15, 2020**.

The Presidential Innovation Award for Environmental Educators (PIAEE) recognizes outstanding teachers for K-12 who employ innovative approaches to environmental education. Up to two teachers from each of EPA's 10 regions, from different states, will be selected to receive this award. Teachers will receive a Presidential plaque and an award of up to \$2,500 to be used to further professional development in environmental education. Winning teachers' local education agencies will also receive awards of up to \$2,500 to fund environmental educational activities and programs. Winners of next year's awards will be invited to participate in an awards ceremony and poster session in Washington, D.C. in mid-2020, and projects will also be highlighted on EPA's website. Deadline: January 15, 2020.

<u>Toshiba/NSTA ExploraVision science competition</u> encourages K-12 students to imagine what technology might be like in the future while experiencing scientific process and discovery in an engaging, hands-on way. Students can submit as individuals or as a class, group, or club. Free to enter. Deadline: **June 15, 2020**.

Grant and Scholarship Opportunities

<u>United Fresh Start Foundation Community Innovation Grants Program</u> increases children's access, selection, and consumption of fresh produce while they are outside of school. A total of \$50,000 will be awarded to a minimum of five projects. Eligible applicants include not-for-profit organizations, schools, universities, small businesses, and others. Deadline: **December 1, 2019.**

Northeast SARE Farmer Grants-Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Research & Education (SARE) funds grants for commercial producers who have an innovative idea they want to test using a field trial, on-farm demonstration, marketing initiative, or other technique. Projects should seek results other farmers can use, and all projects must have the potential to add to knowledge about effective sustainable practices. Deadline: **December 3, 2019.**

<u>Urban Forestry Projects</u>-Grants are available for tree planting, maintenance, tree inventory, community forest management plans and for educating those who care for public trees. Eligible applicants include municipalities, public benefit corporations, public authorities, soil and water conservation districts, community colleges, not-for-profit organizations and Indian nations or tribes. Tree inventories and community forest management plans require no match. Tree planting, maintenance and education projects have a 25 percent match requirement. Not-for-profit applicants are required to pre-qualify in the Grants Gateway system, so DEC recommends that applicants start the process well in advance of the grant application due date. Deadline: **December 4, 2019 at 2 p.m**.

Asphalt Art Grants for Cities- Cities with populations between 30,000 and 500,000 are welcome to apply. Only one application per city will be accepted. Each application's Project Team must include Lead Applicant: City agency responsible for advancing necessary permitting and oversight of the site and installation (e.g., Department of Transportation, Department of Public Works, or other appropriate agency) and Fiscal Agent: An organization with 501(c)3 nonprofit status that can receive the grant funds and be responsible for managing the distribution and procurement required. Deadline: **December 12.**

2020 Farm to School Grant Program Request for Applications (RFA). Farm to school programs support local communities through a variety of activities, including taste tests, farm visits, local purchasing, food and agriculture education, and farmer and producer training. A wide variety of entities are eligible to compete for funding through this grant opportunity. Schools and school districts, local agencies, Indian tribal organizations, small- to medium-sized agricultural producers or groups of small- to medium-sized agricultural producers, and non-profit organizations are eligible to apply for Planning and Implementation grants. State agencies may apply for a State Agency grant. Deadline: **December 13, 2019**.

<u>KidsGardening Youth Garden Grants</u> - The Youth Garden Grant supports school and youth educational garden projects that enhance the quality of life for students and their communities. 5 programs will receive awards valued at \$2360 and 20 programs will receive award valued at \$775. Deadline: **December 16**

<u>Margaret A. Davidson Graduate Fellowship</u>- new fellowship program for graduate students at the national estuarine research reserves. One two-year fellowship opportunity will be available at each of the 29 coastal sites. Through a research project, fellows will address a key coastal management question to help scientists and communities understand coastal challenges that may influence future policy and management. Deadline: **December 20**.

<u>New York Grant Program for School-Based Agricultural Education Programs</u> will provide local school-based agricultural education programs with grant awards to secure necessary resources. These resources may include curriculum development, professional development, program development, resource acquisitions, and program coordination. Deadline: **December 20, 2019.**

Regional Farm to School Institute Grant Request for Applications (RFA). This new grant focus for fiscal year 2020 will support the creation and dissemination of information on farm to school program development, and provide practitioner education and training, and ongoing school year coaching and technical assistance. Deadline: **December 27, 2019**.

<u>Katie's Krops Growers Grants</u> - Kids 9-16 can apply today to become a Katie's Krops Grower and help end hunger in their community. Grantees receive funding to start their garden in the form of a gift card to a garden supply store in their community and tons of planning resources. Deadline: **December 27**

2020 Environmental Education Grants Program- will award three to four grants in each of the agency's 10 regions. In addition to other environmental topics, the 2020 Environmental Education Grants Program will fund education-based projects pertaining to marine debris mitigation, food waste and loss reduction, and recycling. Funded projects will both increase public awareness on various environmental matters and enhance participants' abilities to make informed decisions on environmental issues prospectively. Deadline: Jan. 6, 2020

<u>Great Lakes Restoration Initiative: Cooperative Weed Management Areas</u>-The goal of this program is to detect, prevent, eradicate, and/or control invasive plant species to promote resiliency, watershed stability, and biological diversity. For more information and to apply, visit the <u>Forest Service's website</u>. Deadline: **January 10, 2020**.

Population and Ecosystem Dynamics Federal Funding Opportunity - The NMFS-Sea Grant Fellowship Program in Population and Ecosystem Dynamics expects to award at least three new Ph.D. Fellowships in 2020 to students who are interested in careers related to marine ecosystem and population dynamics, with a focus on modeling and managing systems of living marine resources. These fellowships can provide support for up to three years. The emphasis will be on the development and implementation of quantitative methods for assessing marine ecosystems, for assessing the status of fish, invertebrate, and other targeted species stocks and for assessing the status of marine mammals, seabirds, and other protected species. Deadline: **January 20, 2020.**

Marine Resource Economics Federal Funding Opportunity - The 2020 NMFS-Sea Grant Fellowship Program in Marine Resource Economics expects to award one new Ph.D. Fellowship each year to students who are interested in careers related to the development and implementation of quantitative methods for assessing the economics of the conservation and management of living marine resources. This fellowship can provide support for up to three years. Deadline: **January 20, 2020**.

Five Star and Urban Water Restoration Grant Program -The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) and the Wildlife Habitat Council are soliciting applications for the 2020 Five Star and Urban Water Restoration Program. The Five Star and Urban Waters program will award approximately \$1.5 million in grants nationwide to applicants who will develop community capacity to sustain local natural resources for future generations. The grant will provide modest financial assistance to diverse local partnerships focused on improving water quality, watersheds, and the species and habitats they support. Projects include a variety of ecological improvements, along with targeted community outreach, education and stewardship. Deadline: January 30.

New York State Wetlands Student Research Grant—to financially support candidates in producing and sharing independent research focusing on wetlands. The Forum wishes to advance the development of emerging wetland professionals and the collective knowledge of New York State's wetland resources. Applicants must be currently enrolled as either a matriculated graduate student or junior or senior at a recognized four-year accredited college or university, must be participating in an independent research project with a focus on wetland science/issues relevant to New York State. Class or group projects are not eligible for consideration. Candidate must have at least a cumulative 3.0 grade point average. Deadline: **February 15, 2020**.

John A. Knauss Marine Policy Fellowship Program-The Sea Grant fellowship provides a unique educational and professional experience to graduate students who have an interest in ocean, coastal and Great Lakes resources and in the national policy decisions affecting those resources. Named after one of Sea Grant's founders and former NOAA Administrator John A. Knauss, matches graduate students with "hosts" in the legislative and executive branch of government in the Washington, D.C. area, for a one year paid fellowship. Deadline: **February 21, 2020**.

<u>P-12 Schools: Green and Clean Energy Solutions Program</u> is to reduce energy use and assist with the conversion to carbon free energy solutions for schools serving Prekindergarten through Grade 12 students.NYSERDA will provide a cost-share of up to 75% of eligible **Energy Studies** and **Design** costs for eligible **Clean Heating and Cooling** and **Net Zero** projects. Schools categorized as <u>High Need</u> may qualify for 100% cost-sharing.

<u>The Pollination Project Grants</u> support organizations/groups that do not have any paid staff with initial grants of up to \$1,000. Successful grantees become eligible for larger impact grants of up to \$5,000 and other support. One grant is awarded every day. Deadline: **Rolling**

<u>The Kars4Kids Small Grant Program</u> is dedicated to supporting education, mentoring, and youth development programs around the country that help children develop into productive members of their community. Grants typically range from \$500-\$2,000. Deadline: **Rolling.**

Residential Curbside Recycling Cart Grant Program Request For Proposals- to advance recycling in communities across the United States by offering financial and technical assistance to support the implementation of cartbased curbside recycling. With the release of this Request For Proposals (RFP), The Partnership offers communities the chance to apply for funding to support the acquisition of recycling carts, with the goal of expanding access to cart based recycling collection by converting bin or bag-based curbside recycling collection programs to cart-based collection, or by supporting the implementation of new curbside cart-based collection. Deadline: **Rolling.**

<u>H20 for Life Mini-Grants</u> provide \$250-\$500 mini-grants for schools to organize projects that educate youth about the global water crisis and help them take action to provide water, sanitation and hygiene education (WASH) for global partner schools. **Deadline: Rolling**

<u>The Karma for Cara Foundation</u> is encouraging kids 18 and under to apply for funds between \$250 and \$1,000 to complete service projects in their communities. **Deadline: Rolling.**

Wells Fargo Clean Technology and Innovation Grant Program funds projects and programs related to research and development for new and emerging clean technologies by working with universities, colleges, research institutes and laboratories as well as entrepreneur incubator, accelerator and business plan competitions. If you would like to submit a topic for consideration provide a brief description (150 words or less).

Food Waste Grants - The New York State Pollution Prevention Institute (P2I) will operate the funding program, which will provide reimbursement to businesses that generate over one ton of food waste per week to offset the cost of select technologies and equipment that promise to reduce or divert that food waste from landfill or incineration. Eligible projects must reduce and/or divert wasted food at a New York State business including, but not limited to, supermarkets, restaurants, and hospitals. Monies from this program will help food scrap generators implement food waste reduction recommendations, purchase capital equipment used in food donation, and create, improve, and expand diversion efforts to on and off-site compost and anaerobic digestion facilities. Deadline: Rolling.

<u>Project Produce: Fruit and Veggie Grants for Schools</u>-designed to help increase kids' access to fresh fruits and vegetables and create experiential nutrition education when and where students make their food choices: in the cafeteria. The \$2,500 one-year grants support food costs to incorporate school-wide fruit and vegetable tastings into the school's nutrition program. Grants will be determined on an ongoing basis depending on available funding.

<u>Industrial Hemp Processing Grant Fund</u>-New York has also allocated up to \$5 million for grants for machinery and equipment required to process industrial hemp for commercialization. Grants may provide a minimum of \$50,000 and a maximum of \$500,000 for up to 50% of total project costs supporting capital investments. To be eligible, the facility must be located wholly in New York State which processes industrial hemp for commercialization.

<u>Toyota Every Day Capacity Building Grants</u>- Up to \$5000 for 25 Public Lands Friends' groups in each cycle. Projects that are needed and will help contribute to the long- term sustainability of the organization. Deadlines: **April 23 and other dates later in the year**.

<u>Cornell Douglas Foundation</u>- Its mission is to provide small grants to organizations which promote the vision of the foundation: advocating for environmental health and justice, encouraging stewardship of the environment, and furthering respect for sustainability of resources. **Deadline: Rolling.**

NIEHS Conference Grants-The mission of the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS) is to discover how the environment affects people in order to promote healthier lives. Conference grant applications have a direct relationship to advancing the mission of NIEHS. In order to be responsive, all conference grant proposals must focus on or clearly indicate relevance to advancing our understanding of the role of environment and/or gene-environment interactions in disease/dysfunction. **Deadline: Rolling.**

Youth Pollinator Gardens Grant- up to \$200, are available for projects that include educational materials on the vital role pollinators play in nature and youth involvement in planning and planting gardens providing nesting and food sources for pollinators. To apply for a grant, complete an NGC Grant Application, provide detailed information about the project, and submit your request to the NGC Youth Committee Chairman for approval.

<u>Saving Species</u>- We help local conservation groups purchase land for conservation and habitat restoration, and may consider projects for restoration of habitat on land that is within an existing protected area. We maximize our effectiveness by providing grants for the purchase and restoration of land that connects existing habitat fragments, or that prevents isolation of habitat that would otherwise continue due to habitat loss. **Deadline: Rolling.**

<u>Cedar Tree Foundation</u>- Letters of Inquiry Accepted at Any Time. Areas: Environmental Education, Environmental Health, Sustainable Agriculture.

<u>VolunTEEN Nation International Service Project Grants-</u> Students (ages 13-22) from the US going abroad to volunteer or study in a developing country are encouraged to apply for an international service-learning mini-grant. Grants are for up to \$300 to create a service project in a developing country while you are visiting that country. **Deadline: Rolling.**

KEEN Effect is committed to inspiring responsible outdoor participation to help preserve the places we all play. Through the KEEN Effect, \$10,000 grants are awarded to nonprofit organizations around the world who are dedicated to responsible outdoor participation. Projects must increase responsible outdoor participation as a way to work towards building a strong community. **Deadline: Ongoing.**

<u>Everyday Young Hero Award</u>-Everyday Young Heroes are young people, ages 5-25, who are improving their communities through service to others and making significant progress in achieving the UN's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Each week, YSA selects one young person to receive this honor and receive \$250 grants to continue and expand their project. **Deadline: Rolling**

<u>The Fruit Tree Planting Foundation</u> is dedicated to planting fruitful trees and plants to alleviate world hunger, combat global warming, strengthen communities, and improve the surrounding air, soil, and water. FTPF programs strategically donate orchards where the harvest will best serve communities for generations. **Deadline: Rolling**.

<u>Doris Duke Environment Program Grants</u>-For Nonprofits registered and working in the US. Permanent land protection (i.e., the acquisition of conservation easements or fee title interests to secure high-priority sites), management of lands already in protected status, and more. **Deadline: Rolling**.

<u>WalMart Community and Education Grants</u>. Rolling Deadline, but minimum 6 month lead time advised. 501 (c) (3) organizations, schools, religious organizations and government agencies for requests over \$250.
