2017 Riverwatch Citizen Science Report

Each year BNW's Riverwatch Volunteer Citizen Scientists collect water quality at numerous sites within the Niagara River Watershed. 2017 was our biggest year yet, with over 75 volunteers sampling over 80 sites from May to November. The efforts of these volunteers provide valuable baseline water quality data allowing us to track the health of local wateways and determine if restoration efforts are having a positive effect on water quality. Lake Monitoring Data Added to Web

The Division of Water has posted to DEC's website the 2016 reports for lakes sampled through the New York Citizens Statewide Lake Assessment Program (CSLAP), the volunteer lake monitoring program conducted by DEC and the New York Federation of Lake Associations. CSLAP provides data and information to lake residents, local communities, lake managers, and public agencies working together to understand and improve lake conditions. Trained CSLAP samplers have been instrumental in documenting harmful algal blooms, invasive species, and other environmental threats. These lake reports can be found on DEC's <u>Water Reports by Counties webpage</u>. More than 150 lakes across New York State were sampled through CSLAP in 2017, and summary reports for these lakes will be written before the start of the summer recreational season.

DEC Conducting River Otter Surveys Throughout New York

River otter (*Lontra canadensis*) surveys are underway throughout New York State. The survey period extends from the beginning of December until the end of March. DEC personnel conduct these surveys by walking along waterbodies looking for any sign of otter including tracks, scat, slides, and otter themselves! The photo shows DEC staff next to otter tracks and slides. The purpose of these surveys is to assess the current status of river otter in New York State, including within the recovery zone where otter were reintroduced in the late 1990s/early 2000s. DEC is also requesting that the <u>public report sightings of river otter</u>, as well as bobcat, fisher, and weasel in Upstate New York and beaver, gray fox, weasel, mink, coyote, and skunk on Long Island and New York City.

Grocery Stores are Going Green!

The average grocery store uses 1.5 million gallons of water each year. Grocery stores dispose of half a million pounds of food waste annually, nearly all of which goes to the landfill and use 660 lbs. of cleaning products containing 150 lbs. of hazardous chemicals. The New York State Pollution Prevention Institute (NYSP2I) and DEC teamed up to help grocers drive down their operating costs and reduce their environmental footprint. Prune your Oaks Now

Pruning oak trees now through the end of February can help protect the oaks from becoming infected with <u>oak wilt</u>, a fungal disease that can be deadly for oaks, according to the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. The disease is caused by the oak wilt fungus. One way oak wilt spreads is by the fungal spores hitching rides on insects. Sap beetles, one of the main culprits, are extremely attracted to fresh tree wounds. If you prune when the insects aren't active, it decreases the chances of the disease spreading. Oak wilt has been found in other parts of New York State. Learn to <u>identify the symptoms of oak wilt</u>, which include discoloration around the entire leaf edge and sudden loss of a substantial portion of leaves during the summer. First Round of Facilities Participating in State's Pilot Drug "Take-Back" Program

DEC has announced the first group of participants in the State's \$2 million <u>Pilot Pharmaceutical Take-back</u> <u>Program</u>. Participants include 80 retail pharmacies, hospitals, and long-term care facilities. Under the program, DEC will purchase medication collection boxes and pay for the disposal of waste pharmaceuticals collected by participating facilities for two years. Implementation of this pilot program will help improve water quality, protect public health by removing unused or expired medications from home medicine cabinets, and reduce potential adverse impacts to fish and aquatic organisms. Retail pharmacies, hospitals and long-term care facilities are encouraged to <u>apply for the second round</u> of the pilot program.

Want to increase your sustainability practices at Work?

We've all heard it before – "buy green products" – but what does that mean and how do I know if I am really purchasing an environmentally preferable product for my home or business? New York State agencies have taken a close look at what it means to buy truly green products and where to find them. They have developed criteria to purchase items that reduce harmful health and environmental impacts, minimize toxicity in packaging, and maximize recycled and renewable content. NYS Plastic Bag Task Force

Across New York, residents use 23 billion plastic bags annually. A significant number of these bags make their way into the environment causing litter and damaging wildlife, which can be seen within our waterways, along our streets and in our oceans and lakes. These bags do not biodegrade -- they persist for years. In March 2017, Governor Cuomo created the New York State Plastic Bag Task Force, chaired by DEC Commissioner Seggos. The group was tasked with developing a uniform and equitable statewide plan to address New York's plastic bag problem. The <u>final report (PDF)</u> is a thorough analysis of the impacts of single-use plastic bags and provides several options for legislation that could help develop a statewide solution to the problem

EJSCREEN is an environmental justice mapping and screening tool that provides Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) with a nationally consistent dataset and approach for combining environmental and demographic indicators. The Environmental Protection Agency has released the Local Foods, Local Places Toolkit which is meant to help communities interested in undertaking a similar process to develop their own plans for setting and achieving local food and revitalization goals. The toolkit was developed over the course of delivering the Local Foods, Local Places technical assistance and compiles best practices and lessons learned from the program. A facilitator, either from the community or hired from outside, could use this toolkit to help a community articulate its goals, engage stakeholders, and prioritize achievable actions to make progress.

New Snow Leopard Debuts at Buffalo Zoo

The Buffalo Zoo is excited to announce the addition of a new male snow leopard. With the new year off to a fast and cold start, what better time to announce the arrival of an animal that is right at home in these frigid January temperatures. The Buffalo Zoo's newest big cat, a male snow leopard, is adjusting well to his new habitat at the Zoo. Altai, a one-year-old male snow leopard, comes to the Buffalo Zoo from the Akron Zoo where he was one of three born on March 5, 2016. Named after the Altai Republic and Altai Mountain Range, he arrived in Buffalo in early October. After successful clearance of health quarantine, he began his introductions to his new habitat. He will share his habitat with the Zoo's two-year-old female snow leopard, Sabrina. The introduction of Altai to Sabrina is part of a breeding recommendation from the Association of Zoos and Aquariums' (AZA) Species Survival Plan (SSP) for snow leopards. There are an estimated 5,000 snow leopards left in the wild and approximately 600-700 in zoos around the world. For this reason, it is essential that zoos continue promoting and educating the public about conservation efforts in the wild.

Electronics Recycling: Avoid the TV Fine

The holidays are over and we're all charged up, trying to enjoy life to the fullest, save money, learn something new, and get organized! Out with the old and in with the new, even when it comes to TVs! Something that consistently gets overlooked is properly discarding old televisions. As new TVs are brought into homes, especially throughout the holiday season, residents need to get rid of their old ones. We can watch our shows and movies on bigger screens with more clarity and brighter colors than ever before, but there's still an estimated 6 billion pounds of old TVs in U.S households according to an analysis by the National Center for Electronics Recycling. Thinking about throwing out that old TV? Not so fast! Often people don't realize that it's illegal to dump their unwanted TVs and other electronics, or leave them on the curb. Curbside garbage collectors will no longer pick them up and if you don't want to pay a hefty \$100 fine, don't trash your e-scrap! Take it to a certified electronics recycler. Not only will you avoid fines, you'll be saving the environment and people! Old tube televisions called CRT TVs have a high concentration of lead and phosphors and heavy metals such as cadmium. The United States Environmental Protection Agency includes discarded CRT monitors in the "hazardous household waste" category. If electronics make their way into landfills, the toxic materials seep into the ground and water causing negative effects on the environment and the health of people including damage to the nervous system, kidneys, bones, reproductive and endocrine system, and cancer. E-waste represents 2% of America's trash in landfills, but equals 70% of overall toxic waste. Pick a certified e-recycler nearest you by visiting sustainableelectronics.org/recyclers. A new approach to rechargeable batteries

A type of battery first invented nearly 50 years ago could change the face of energy storage technologies, thanks to a new finding by researchers at MIT. The battery, based on electrodes made of sodium and nickel chloride and using a new type of metal mesh membrane, could be used for grid-scale installations to make intermittent power sources such as wind and solar capable of delivering reliable baseload electricity. Although the basic battery chemistry the team used, based on a liquid sodium electrode material, was first described in 1968, the concept never caught on as a practical approach because it required the use of a thin membrane to separate its molten components, and the only known material with the needed properties for that membrane was a brittle and fragile ceramic. These paper-thin membranes made the batteries too easily damaged in real-world operating conditions, so apart from a few specialized industrial applications, the system has never been widely implemented. With new materials available to serve as the thin membrane, there may be new opportunities for this battery design. This recent report states that stronger evidence has emerged for "continuing, rapid, human-caused warming of the global atmosphere and ocean." Each chapter of the Report includes key findings based on the authors' expert judgment of the synthesis of the assessed literature . With each key finding, the CSSR provides its level of confidence ranging from "low" (inconclusive evidence, disagreement, or lack of opinions among experts) to "very high" (strong evidence, high consensus). Fungi Could Help Repair Concrete?

Researchers at the State University of New York at Binghamton and Rutgers University are developing a selfhealing fungi concrete that could repair cracks in crumbling concrete. The *Trichoderma reesei* fungus would be mixed with concrete and remain dormant until cracks appear. When this fungus is mixed with concrete, it originally lies dormant -- until the first crack appears. "The fungal spores, together with nutrients, will be placed into the concrete matrix during the mixing process. When cracking occurs, water and oxygen will find their way in. With enough water and oxygen, the dormant fungal spores will germinate, grow and precipitate calcium carbonate to heal the cracks," as explained by Congrui Jin, Assistant Professor of Mechanical Engineering at Binghamton University. In addition, workshop participants are expected to produce a case study within six months of the workshop for our national, peer-reviewed case collection. Past workshops have included faculty from biology, chemistry, physics, astronomy, computer science, mathematics, geology, psychology, anthropology, nursing, science education, dentistry, engineering, medicine, and other science-related disciplines. They test their ovens using heat lamps, and use a budget to constrain their design. The budgeting activity helps students consider trade-offs in the design. They evaluate each material they use with regard to their goal. Students go through two iterations of designing, building, and testing. Between the two iterations, student groups critique each other's ovens. During the second iteration, students engage in self-critique of their ovens prior to re-design.

Remember the 4 R's: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Repair

Recycling:

Did you know that there are State Mandatory Take-Back Programs?

Some of the items required by law to be accepted by retailers or manufacturers are **car batteries, motor oil and auto tires.**

Car Batteries: To reduce the number of times that you have to replace your battery consider paying a little more for longer-life, lead-acid batteries or sealed gel-cell batteries. The acid is in semi-solid gel form, rather than liquid, so a cracked gel cell does not leak. They last twice as long, do not require the addition of sulfuric acid, and involve less maintenance because no corrosion forms on the terminals. A typical auto battery weighs 36 pounds and contains nearly 18 pounds of lead, a toxic metal, and one gallon of sulfuric acid, a corrosive liquid; all are materials of concern in lead-acid batteries. It is illegal in New York State to discard a car battery in the trash or on the street, so return it to the dealer.

Motor Oil: All service stations that change oil are required to accept up to five gallons of used motor oil per day, per person, at no charge. It is illegal to discard used motor oil or transmission fluid in the trash, on the ground, or into sewers. Used oil and oil filters can contain toxic substances that have negative consequences for local waterways. Improperly disposed motor oil from just one oil change can contaminate up to a million gallons of water.

Motor oil doesn't wear out - it just gets dirty. The oil you take to a collection center to be recycled can be made into rerefined lubricating oils that meet the same standards as virgin motor oil. The American Petroleum Institute (API) estimates that only 10 percent of the 400 million gallons of used oil generated annually are recycled. Consider installing synthetic oil, which, while more expensive than traditional lubricating oil, offers longer intervals between oil changes without compromising engine life. It also keeps your engine cleaner and reduces engine wear.

Auto Tires: dumped at the side of the road, in vacant lots, or along railroad tracks are unsightly and can provide a breeding site for mosquitoes. Extend the life of your tires by taking a few minutes each month to check the pressure and tread depth – this can reduce tire life by 50 percent. Buy retreaded tires. Retreading bonds new tread to the existing tire body using a process very similar to the manufacture of a new tire and the retread is 30 to 50 percent cheaper than a new tire. Two studies conducted by the American Retreaders Association (ARA) concluded that residual body strength in worn tires is at least equal to that of new tires, in some cases doubling the standards requirement of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) Federal Motor Vehicle Safety standard test, which applies to all new tires.

Recycle: when buying new tires, return your old ones to be recycled. Businesses that sell or install tires must take back tires of approximately the same size that they sell. Also, residents can drop off up to four passenger car tires at any NYC Department of Sanitation garage. These tires are collected by a contractor and taken to a facility where they are converted to electricity.

If you take these suggestions you will be lowering your auto upkeep costs and the recycling of batteries, motor oil and auto tires will help to keep the environment clean and free from contamination.
