Making Urban Forests Count: Quantifying and Crediting Stormwater Benefits

Learn how urban forests can play a role in stormwater management. This free webinar on **January 20** from 1 to 2:15pm will show you how to quantify the runoff and pollutant-reducing impacts of trees in the urban landscape. Presenters will review the available stormwater crediting systems for urban tree planting and will present a new crediting system that can be integrated into state and local compliance systems for stormwater management, Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs), and other water quality requirements. The presenters will share a case study example of how this has been formally adopted by state and federal agencies as part of the Chesapeake Bay TMDL, which covers 64,000 square miles across six states and DC. Grocery Stores are Going Green!

The average grocery store uses 1.5 million gallons of water each year. Grocery stores dispose of half a million pounds of food waste annually, nearly all of which goes to the landfill and use 660 lbs. of cleaning products containing 150 lbs. of hazardous chemicals. The New York State Pollution Prevention Institute (NYSP2I) and DEC teamed up to help grocers drive down their operating costs and reduce their environmental footprint. The Environmental Protection Agency has released the <u>Local Foods, Local Places Toolkit</u> which is meant to help communities interested in undertaking a similar process to develop their own plans for setting and achieving local food and revitalization goals. The toolkit was developed over the course of delivering the Local Foods, Local Places technical assistance and compiles best practices and lessons learned from the program. A facilitator, either from the community or hired from outside, could use this toolkit to help a community articulate its goals, engage stakeholders, and prioritize achievable actions to make progress.

NY-Sun Solar Guidebook and Technical Assistance for Local Governments

NYSERDA launched the NY-Sun Solar Guidebook for Local Governments which includes updates to the NYS Unified Solar Permit and guidance on the New York State fire code, along with other practical info to aid local officials. A Cup of Joe Fuels to Fuel the Bus

Waste coffee grounds will be used to help power some of London's buses. A biofuel created by blending oil extracted from coffee waste with diesel is to be added to the public transport fuel supply. Bio-bean, a technology firm, calculates that it would take just over 2.55 million cups of coffee to create enough biofuel to run a London bus for a year once the oil has been blended with diesel. Greening Park Infrastructure

Green infrastructure can help to maximize the environmental, economic, and social benefits of parks. By building strong partnerships, agencies can improve park lands and access to parks, better manage stormwater, increase community resiliency to shifting weather patterns, and provide funding to implement and maintain park enhancements that benefit the community. Case studies are included to illustrate the approaches presented in the guide. These real-life examples portray how partnerships between municipal stormwater agencies and parks departments have improved recreational resources in the community, enhanced environmental protection, and reduced risks and burdens.

Creating Safer Streets Around Schools: One Crosswalk at a time

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Niagara County's Creating Healthy Schools and Communities grant (CHSC), in partnership with GoBike Buffalo, the City of Niagara Falls Department of Community Development, and the Niagara Falls City School District, have partnered up to create safer crosswalks around schools in Niagara Falls. The program, called Complete Streets, seeks to make streets planned and maintained for safe and convenient travel for residents. Crosswalk painting projects have been completed at Niagara Street Elementary, Gaskill Preparatory, Cataract Elementary, LaSalle Preparatory, 72nd Street, and Maple Avenue Elementary Schools. Additionally, several more schools in Niagara Falls are scheduled to have vibrant crosswalks painted later this school year. Pedestrian safety is a concern in school zones and on school campuses everywhere. In neighborhood schools where the majority of students walk, bike or are driven to school, reducing driver speed in school zones is critical. When students can safely walk or bike to school, they are incorporating physical activity into their day and will be more focused and ready to learn. Walking and bicycling to school also helps reduce air pollution and traffic congestion around schools.

Harvesting the Energy of Footsteps

A research team installed a high-tech flooring prototype at the University of Wisconsin-Madison that harvests the energy of footsteps and converts them into electricity. The wood pulp that makes up the flooring is chemically treated to produce an electrostatic charge that turns these floors into renewable energy sources. More

In accordance with the Global Change Research Act of 1990, the USGCRP is required to conduct national climate assessments (NCA) at regular intervals. This recent report states that stronger evidence has emerged for "continuing, rapid, human-caused warming of the global atmosphere and ocean." Each chapter of the Report includes key findings based on the authors' expert judgment of the synthesis of the assessed literature. With each key finding, the CSSR provides its level of confidence ranging from "low" (inconclusive evidence, disagreement, or lack of opinions among experts) to "very high" (strong evidence, high consensus). <u>EPA Activity Book for Elementary Age Students</u>-How do you describe to students what the EPA does? This newest activity book for elementary age students to help introduce them to EPA. Kids can learn about the different ways the EPA works to protect our environment and our health. It's a simple, straightforward guide suitable for children of all ages.

<u>Botany Primer: Understanding Botany for Nature's Notebook</u>- designed to help observers make reliable plant observations for submission to the Nature's Notebook citizen and professional science program. It covers basic botany, phenology vocabulary and the USA-NPN's plant phenophases. It is also very appropriate for those interested in simply learning more about botanical terms and concepts, separate from participation in Nature's Notebook.

Solar Ovens & Design Critiques-In this unit, students design, build, and test solar ovens. They critique and refine their own oven, as well as their peers' designs. Students learn about how energy is transformed from solar radiation to heat and infrared radiation. They use an interactive simulation to extend the design process. They test their ovens using heat lamps, and use a budget to constrain their design. The budgeting activity helps students consider trade-offs in the design. They evaluate each material they use with regard to their goal. Students go through two iterations of designing, building, and testing. Between the two iterations, student groups critique each other's ovens. During the second iteration, students engage in self-critique of their ovens prior to re-design.

Conservation Connect is a web-based video series produced by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, National Conservation Training Center (NCTC). Our goal is to connect a new generation of conservationists, ages 8-16, with the great outdoors, wildlife species, and conservation careers. Remember the 4 R's: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Repair

Greetings friends:

Here we are again, entering a New Year. At last we can take a moment and exhale from participating in the hustle and bustle of the holiday season.

Recently I noticed that most of the customers who were shopping at our local grocery store were bringing their own canvas or cloth bags to put their items in. I know that many of you have cut back on the use of plastic but it remains an issue in this country.

There are still major problems with the plastic debris in the "Great Pacific Garbage Patch" which has killed millions of birds and other marine animals. Check it out online and you will see the mountains of plastic that have accumulated. One popular claim is that the size of the patch is twice that of the state of Texas - half a million square miles.

Although this does not provide the ultimate solution I am sharing this list of 23 ways to reduce our plastic consumption:

- 1. Compost your trash to reduce your use of plastic bags.
- 2. Do not use trash can liners just tip your rubbish into the bin.
- 3. Take reusable cloth bags to the stores with you. If you have a car, keep your grocery bags in it and remember to bring them into the store with you! Also, carry them for all your purchases, from electronics to clothing.
- 4. Stop buying sodas, juices, and all other plastic-bottled beverages and opt for glass where possible.
- 5. Carry your own thermal mug and ask coffee retailers to fill it for you rather than taking a disposable cup. Bring your own coffee mug to work with you.
- 6. When ordering pizza, say no to the little plastic "table" in the middle of the pizza box.

- 7. Avoid buying foods packaged in plastic. Buy loose fruit and vegetables. Buy from bulk bins as often as possible. These foods include rice and other grains, pasta, beans (learning how to cook dried beans is an important part of plastic-free living). Seeds, nuts, all kinds of flour, baking soda and other dry baking ingredients, cereal and granola, pretzels and chips, some candy, tofu, oils, nut butters, olives, and herbs, are several of the items that you can buy.
- 8. Make your own bread or buy fresh bread from bakeries that package it in paper or no bags.
- 9. Clean your home with baking soda and vinegar instead of using cleaning products packaged in plastic.
- 10. Buy laundry detergent in boxes, not liquid in plastic containers.
- 11. Buy cheese and meat from your local delicatessen and have it wrapped in paper.
- 12. Use bar soap to wash your dishes and yourself.
- 13. Use scented candles or incense instead of artificial air fresheners.
- 14. Buy milk in paper cartons or glass, rather than plastic bottles.
- 15. Buy toilet paper that is wrapped in paper, not plastic.
- 16. Don't wrap left-over foods in plastic use aluminum or wax paper instead.
- 17. Give your pets cloth-based toys, like catnip mice and soft balls.
- 18. Buy cloth diapers instead of disposables.
- 19. Stuff delicate postal packages with old newspapers or junk mail instead of bubble wrap.
- 20. Use rechargeable batteries to avoid buying batteries packaged in plastic.
- 21. Say "no" to plastic produce bags. They are generally unnecessary.
- 22. Shop at your local farmers market.
- 23. Farmers markets are a great place to buy fresh, local produce without plastic, as long as you remember to bring your own bags.
