Reinstein Woods Offers Summer Institute for Educators

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is accepting registrations for a Summer Teacher Institute to be held **July 28-29** at Reinstein Woods Environmental Education Center in Depew. The Institute is designed for educators of students in kindergarten to grade 8, and will run from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. each day. Teachers will learn effective techniques to enhance their teaching in math, English language arts, science and other subject areas. Hands-on activities that align with Common Core and New York State learning standards will cover topics such as invasive species, tree and plant identification, citizen science projects and bird-classroom connections. The training includes the Flying WILD curriculum that explores ideas for bird-related schoolyard enhancements, festivals and more.

The two-day program provides 12 hours of instruction for which in-service or continuing education credit may be available. Participants will receive written materials to enable them to transfer their new knowledge directly to their school. A materials fee of \$40 includes lunch on the second day. Public Comment on Sewage Pollution Right to Know Regulations

The public is invited to submit comments on regulations to implement the Sewage Pollution Right to Know Law from **June 17 - July 31** and can now sign up for NY-Alert to receive notice of sewage discharges. Under the Sewage Pollution Right to Know Law, publicly owned treatment works and publicly owned sewer systems are required to notify DEC within two hours of a sewage discharge. DEC will then make the information available to the general public and neighboring municipalities through the NY-Alert system. DEC partnered with the NYS Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services to enhance the electronic NY-Alert notification system so that reporting is free of charge to municipalities and the broadcasting of sewage spill alerts is rapidly available. NY-Alert is used by New York State agencies and municipalities for public safety messaging. Proposed State Wildlife Action Plan Now Available For Public Comment

The proposed State Wildlife Action Plan (SWAP) to protect rare and declining wildlife species is now available for public comment until Friday, July 17. The SWAP is a ten-year plan to protect rare and declining wildlife species that is being developed to update the 2005 Comprehensive Wildlife Conservation Strategy. The draft plan identifies 366 Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SGCN) in New York that need conservation actions to thrive. Such species include moose, least tern, northern diamond-backed terrapin, eastern spadefoot toad, lake sturgeon, barndoor skate, humpback whale, brook snaketail and barrens buckmoth. Of those 366, there are 167 species that are identified as high priority SGCN, including little brown bats, spruce grouse, Blanding's turtle, queen snake, American eel, sauger, winter flounder, horseshoe crab, dwarf wedgemussel and American bumblebee. An additional 113 species are seen as possibly needing conservation actions, including least weasel, mink frog, tiger shark, Scotia sallfly, and monarch butterfly. Surveys will help determine their current population status.

EPA Releases an Environmental Justice Screening and Mapping Tool

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) released EJSCREEN, an environmental justice screening and mapping tool that uses high resolution maps combined with demographic and environmental data to identify places with potentially elevated environmental burdens and vulnerable populations. EJSCREEN can help governments, academic institutions, local communities, and other stakeholders to highlight communities with greater risk of exposure to pollution based on 8 pollution and environmental indicators, including traffic proximity, particulate matter, and proximity to superfund sites. These indicators are combined with demographic data from the U.S. Census Bureau American Community 5-year Summary Survey enabling users to identify areas with minority or low-income populations who also face potential pollution issues. DEC Announces New Cazenovia Creek Wildlife Management Area

Lands along Cazenovia Creek in West Seneca, Erie County that were recently transferred to the State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) will provide additional recreation opportunities for people who enjoy fishing and other outdoor activities. DEC will designate the 127-acre tract as the Cazenovia Creek Wildlife Management Area (WMA) and open the property to public use later this year. The Cazenovia Creek WMA, located between East and West Road and Leydecker Road in West Seneca, will support a variety of native wildlife and also features several distinct floodplain habitats, as well as an upland forest located at the top of the creek ridge. People will be able to access trails throughout the parcel to view wildlife in the forest or fish the creek. Successful Treatment against White-Nose Syndrome for Bats

Seventy-five bats have been successfully treated for white-nose syndrome and released back into the wild. This fungus-caused disease is responsible for an estimated 5.7 million bat deaths. The bats released recently were successfully treated with a common bacterium that releases volatile organic compounds (VOC) with anti-fungal properties. The treatment discovery came from a lab investigating how ripening in bananas could be delayed by the VOC released by a bacterium (*Rhodococcus rhodochrous*). The researchers noted that the VOC released by the bacteria inhibited fungal growth. See more here.

Living Schoolyard Month DIY Lake Science App-Investigate freshwater ecosystems where you live with this new DIY Lake Science App from UC Berkeley's Lawrence Hall of Science, funded by the National Science Foundation. The field adventures include making a viewscope to look for underwater plants and animals and crafting a Secchi disc used in measuring water clarity. The app also includes indoor activities.

<u>Project Localize</u> is a customizable curriculum for students and teachers to explore sustainability locally while building knowledge and skills in research, math science, digital technologies, and art through project-based learning. The program provides mentoring for both students and teachers at key points in the learning experience. Students participate in field trips to visit local food producers as they employ journalistic practice in gathering the information for their artwork.

<u>Energy Research and Education Mapping Tool</u> is a free online mapping tool that allows users to map existing and potential energy resources in the 39 states in the eastern United States. Users can run site-suitability analyses for biomass, solar, water, wind, natural gas, geothermal, and nuclear power development, map existing energy resources and environmental characteristics that impact energy development, create a custom map of their region using an extensive database of mapping layers, and search over 2,000 related policies and incentives.

Essential Lens: Analyzing Photographs Across the Curriculum is a multidisciplinary professional development resource for middle and high school teachers about photography's role in documenting history, change and hidden worlds. Climate change, environmental issues, microbiology, earth and space science, and history are among the subjects investigated through photography.

<u>Raptors in the City</u> is a real-time, inquiry-based science and technology program that stars the peregrine falcon. The peregrine has recovered from near extinction and was removed from the List of Endangered Species in 1999. The online portion of Raptors in the City guides children through nesting season as they watch the still rare falcons live via cameras mounted on a skyscraper.

July's Contribution by Lesley Haynes: Remember the 4 R's: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Repair

Remember the 4 R's: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Repair

Chemicals play a major role in our everyday lives. They are part of what we eat, where we work, and how we live. Many toxic chemicals can be found in our soil, water, air, and bodies. This contamination is seriously affecting the health of humans and wildlife everywhere. Our schools, and places of work, can all be sites of hazardous chemical contamination and many toxic elements may be found in your own home.

This month I would like to make some suggestions about **going green** in the home. Many of us can remember that our grandmothers used home-mixed cleansers to get the job done.

Read the labels before you buy anything - Household products such as detergents, floor and furniture polish, paints, and various commercial cleaning products may contain hazardous chemicals such as ammonia, sulfuric and phosphoric acids, lye, chlorine and formaldehyde.

You can help protect children at home - Use natural products for cleaning agents such as baking soda, vinegar and used coffee grounds. These are safer to use and are also inexpensive.

Vinegar and baking soda can be used to clean almost anything. Mix a little warm water with either of these and you have an all-purpose cleaner. Baking soda not only removes unpleasant odors coming from your fridge, it also eliminates odors in your carpets or furniture. Just sprinkle on a little baking soda to soak up some of those odors and then vacuum it up.

Clean your indoor air naturally - Discontinue buying store-bought air fresheners and instead try boiling cinnamon, cloves, or any of your favorite herbs also keep the bugs away with an eco-friendly citronella candle instead of DEET.

Unclog your sink naturally in a matter of minutes without chemicals. Flush your drain with a pot of boiling hot water and allow all of the water to drain through completely. Pour ½ cup of baking soda down the drain, followed by ½ cup of vinegar. Cover the drain opening for 5 -10 minutes, uncover and flush the drain again with boiling hot water. This process will safely loosen up any grime that has built within the drain pipe.

Caution: Never mix ammonia and bleach! Mixing these chemicals creates a harmful gas that can be fatal.

Clean Cars - Use baking soda to clean your car lights, chrome, windows, tires, vinyl seats and floor mats without worrying about unwanted scratch marks. Use a baking soda solution of 1/4 cup baking soda in 1 quart of warm water. Apply with a sponge or soft cloth to remove road grime, tree sap, bugs and tar.

Remove Oil and Grease Stains - Use baking soda to clean up light-duty oil spills on your garage floor or in your driveway. Sprinkle baking soda on the spot and scrub with a wet brush.

Clean Corroded Batteries - Baking soda is a mild alkali and can be used to neutralize battery acid corrosion on cars. Be sure to disconnect the battery terminals before cleaning. Make a paste of 3 parts baking soda to 1 part water; apply with a damp cloth to scrub corrosion from the battery terminal. After cleaning and re-connecting the terminals, wipe them with petroleum jelly to prevent future corrosion. Please be careful when working around batteries-they contain a strong acid.

Coffee grounds can be used to mulch around acid loving plants in the garden to deter snails and slugs. Roses, azaleas, rhododendrons, evergreens and hydrangeas like coffee grounds for the natural acidity and nutrients they add to the soil. Also you can sprinkle coffee grounds around areas of ant infestation to deter them.
