Reinstein Woods Offers Summer Institute for Educators

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC), in partnership with Friends of Reinstein Woods, is accepting registrations for a Summer Teacher Institute to be held **August 3-4** at Reinstein Woods Environmental Education Center in Depew. The Institute is designed for educators of students in pre-kindergarten to grade 12, and will run from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. each day. Teachers will learn effective techniques to enhance their teaching in math, English language arts, science and other subject areas. Hands-on activities that align with Common Core and New York State learning standards will cover topics such as invasive species, tree and plant identification, geocaching, citizen science projects and bird-classroom connections. The training includes the Flying WILD curriculum that explores ideas for bird-related schoolyard enhancements, festivals and more. The two-day program provides 12 hours of instruction for which in-service or continuing education credit may be available. Participants will receive written materials to enable them to transfer their new knowledge directly to their school. A materials fee of \$40 includes lunch on the second day. The Beyond Flowers Tour: Sustainability in Action will be held from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. **Saturday, Aug. 6**. New Bald Eagle Conservation Plan Developed for New York

NY Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) has announced a new, comprehensive conservation plan to manage New York's population of the bald eagle which describes the historic and current status, restoration efforts of the bald eagle in the state and provides guidelines for future management actions. The bald eagle, currently listed as a threatened species in New York, continues to make a remarkable recovery across the state. The Conservation Plan serves as a guide for landowners, resource managers, local government agencies, and other stakeholders to manage and perpetuate the bald eagle and its habitat in New York. It also informs the public of actions recommended to achieve the goal of a sustainable, healthy bald eagle population, including its essential habitat and the ecosystems it depends upon.

Avoiding human disturbance at bald eagle nests is important to protecting the species. Some bald eagles are very sensitive to human activity and disturbance, especially at nest sites. Motor traffic, approaching too close on foot, frequency of visits or nearby tree removal can result in nest failure, nest abandonment, or abandonment of the nesting territory altogether. Any repeated disturbance by humans is unlawful under the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act, the Migratory Bird Treaty Act and under the Environmental Conservation Law of New York. Motorized activity such as jet skis, motorized boats, vehicles, manned and unmanned aircraft (e.g. drones), ATVs and snowmobiles, as well as non-motorized activities, such as hiking, hunting, bird watching, camping, fishing, photography and paddling, should all take place outside a minimum 330-foot buffer zone unless birds have demonstrated a tolerance for these activities. Violations of the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act, as amended in 1972, increased civil penalties for violating provisions of the Act to a maximum fine of \$5,000 or one year imprisonment with \$10,000 or not more than two years in prison for a second conviction. Felony convictions carry a maximum fine of \$250,000 or two years of imprisonment. The fine doubles for an organization. Rewards are provided for information leading to arrest and conviction for violation of the Act. Violators may be subject to additional fines under New York State Environmental Conservation Law. Free Energy Audits for Small Businesses and Non-Profits

Small businesses and non-profits that have 10 full time employees or less and an average annual electric demand of less than 100 kW are eligible for a free energy audit through the NYSERDA Small Commercial Energy Efficiency Program (SCEEP). Following a site visit to assess your facility, you will receive a report showing identified energy savings measures, estimated energy savings, estimated cost savings, and the costs to install the measures. This info can help you make informed decisions about implementing energy efficiency improvements. NYSERDA SCEEP energy audits are provided in Western New York, the Genesee-Finger Lakes Region and the Southern Tier by C.J. Brown Energy. USDA Toolkit to Assess Economic Impact of Local Foods

This new USDA toolkit will help communities and businesses evaluate the economic benefits of investing in local food systems. It was developed by the Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) to help communities reliably evaluate the economic impact of investing in local and regional food systems. The Local Food System Toolkit provides detailed guidance in seven modules to measure and assess the expected economic impacts of local food investments. The toolkit can be downloaded as a PDF here.

New Long-Term Extension of Wind and Solar Tax Credits

The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2016 signed into law in December, 2015 re-enacts the production tax credit (PTC) and investment tax credit (ITC) for wind energy projects and modifies and extends the 30% ITC for solar energy projects. The Act generally provides a five-year extension, with a step-down in the amount of credit available depending on when construction of a project commences. For more info, read.

Phosphorus Reduction Targets of 40 percent to Improve Lake Erie Water Quality

Canada and the U.S. have adopted targets to reduce phosphorus entering affected areas of Lake Erie by 40 percent. The targets will minimize the extent of low oxygen "dead zones" in the central basin of Lake Erie; maintain algae growth at a level consistent with healthy aquatic ecosystems; and maintain algae biomass at levels that do not produce toxins that pose a threat to human or ecosystem health. Algae occur naturally in freshwater systems. They are essential to the aquatic food web and healthy ecosystems. However, too much algae, linked to high amounts of phosphorus, can lead to conditions that can harm human health and the environment. Since the 1990s, Lake Erie has seen an increase in algal growth that has compromised water quality and threatens the Lake Erie region's recreation-intensive economy. The targets were developed after extensive public input from a diversity of sectors. The 2015 harmful algal bloom in Lake Erie was recorded as the largest bloom this century.

Turkey Samples Needed

Cornell University is conducting a study on wild turkeys. If you find a dead turkey hen, poults, or an abandoned nest with eggs (even if broken), we are interested in looking at those samples. This study is looking for the presence of lymphoproliferative disease (LPDV), a viral disease, that may be impacting turkey populations. The disease is widespread in adult birds and may be inconsequential, but we need samples from eggs or young turkeys to see if they are carrying the virus as well. This is only a disease of wild turkeys and not a risk to humans. If you find a hen or poult (young-of-year) carcass(es) or abandoned nest, please call your nearest NYS Dept. of Environmental Conservation office to report the situation and arrange for pick-up. Pick up samples using a plastic bag. Seal or tie the bag closed. Keep samples chilled or frozen until pick-up. Power of Consumers

Poultry company Perdue Foods became the target of animal welfare organizations after an undercover investigation by Mercy For Animals (MFA) revealed illegal animal abuse at two of the company's contract farms. Almost 182,000 people signed a petition urging Perdue to adopt better animal welfare standards.

Like other companies facing consumer scrutiny, Perdue has responded and announced new animal welfare policies. The plan, developed with input from farmers, academics and leaders of animal welfare organizations, has been praised.

Anglers Need to Watch for Lake Sturgeon in the Great Lakes and Oneida Lake

DEC staff have received numerous reports of lake sturgeon (*Acipenser fulvescens*) caught by anglers targeting walleye. With ongoing restoration efforts, anglers need to be aware that Lake sturgeon are listed as a threatened species in New York, therefore, there is no open season for the fish and possession is prohibited. Anglers should not intentionally target these rare fish. If an angler catches a sturgeon, they should move to another area or change fishing gear to avoid catching another. Anglers who do unintentionally hook one should follow practices to ensure that the fish are returned to the water unharmed. Anglers are likely to encounter sturgeon during the spring when the fish gather to spawn on clean gravel or cobble shoals and in stream rapids. Sturgeon spawn in New York in May and June when water temperatures reach 55 to 64°F. Females release as many as 7,000 eggs per pound of fish. Male sturgeon become sexually mature between eight and twelve years of age and may live as long as 55 years. Females become sexually mature between 14 and 33 years of age and live as long as 80 to 150 years. New Farm Worker Protection Standard

The federal Environmental Program Agency (EPA) issued a new Worker Protection Standard (WPS) rule, which affects farms on which pesticides are used in the production of agricultural crops. A majority of the rule revisions will go into effect on January 2, 2017. Detailed information about these changes can be found on the EPA website athttps://www.epa.gov/pesticide-worker-safety/revisions-worker-protection-standard. DEC plans to have a number of outreach sessions this summer and autumn pertaining to the new requirements found in the WPS. These training sessions are intended for those who use pesticides at agricultural facilities growing crops, and for owners/managers of farms that are responsible for the use of pesticides at their facilities. Recertification credits will be available to those individuals certified to apply pesticides to agricultural crops. ECIDA Supports Net-Zero Commercial Building

The Eric County Industrial Development Agency plans to put a \$25 million "net-zero" manufacturing and commercial office building in Lackawanna that could start generating its own energy and hosting tenants in July 2018. The proposed project – codenamed "Z7+" because it seeks to exceed "zero net energy" and envisions seven opportunities for sustainability – is designed to produce as much energy onsite as it uses during the course of the year, and even exceed that amount to provide it back to the energy grid. It would use geothermal energy, solar panels, wind turbines and specific architectural features to meet goals of a healthy work environment, low-energy use, a sustainable carbon-neutral footprint, and little or no waste. Proposed New NYS Regulations to Prevent Contamination from Solid Waste Facilities

Governor Cuomo has announced proposed revisions to the state's solid waste regulations to increase protections for public health, safety, natural resources and the environment. The proposed changes include measures to regulate previously unregulated facilities such as mulch processing, activities, and waste streams within the state's existing solid waste management program. The proposed revisions also streamline and reduce regulatory burdens for entities while maintaining environmental protections. While not allowed in New York now, the proposed regulations specifically prohibit the use of high-volume hydraulic fracturing brine from use in New York State. In addition, the proposed regulations will update the regulations governing the transport of waste, local solid waste planning and state grants to provide better clarity to municipalities, regulated facilities and companies, and ensure the quick dispersal of funding to promote recycling and waste reduction. Web-based Tool to Assist Natural Area Managers in Invasives Management

The Invasive Plant Management Decision Analysis Tool (IPMDAT), developed by The Nature Conservancy, helps natural resource managers to determine if an invasive plant control project is likely to be successful and if it warrants an investment of their agency's or organizations resources. Grant and Scholarship Opportunities

Refugee Agricultural Partnership Program Grants-This U.S. Department of Health and Human Services program seeks to implement strategies that encourage the development of agricultural and food systems related services that will improve the livelihoods, physically and economically, of refugee families. These strategies work to provide sustainable or supplemental income, improved access to healthy foods and better nutrition, psychosocial development, and enhanced integration into communities by refugee families. The grant has \$50,000 to \$100,000 available per year for a period of 3 years. Deadline: **July 6, 2016.**

Proposals must address each of the following four areas: tribal climate and health curriculum development, refining the curriculum by conducting pilot trainings with select tribes, make curriculum available online, and conduct climate change and tribal health outreach. Water Assessments by Volunteer Evaluators (WAVE)- is a citizen-based water quality assessment developed by the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC). The purpose of WAVE is to enable citizen scientists to collect biological data for assessment of water quality on wadeable streams in NY State. Samples WAVE citizen scientists collect benthic macroinvertebrates from wadeable streams. To do so, participants submit sampling locations for review and attend a four-hour training session that provides hands-on experience with the required collection methods. Dried shells can be tossed on gravel driveways to fill holes, used in the bottom of plant pots or crushed and used in a garden. Other hard seeds and shells can also be used and we can reduce organic matter going to the landfill.
- 2. Purify your indoor air-While we spend more time outdoors in the summer, most of our time is spent indoors and the use of some cleaning supplies, air "fresheners", and other activities pollute our indoor air. Indoor plants can help filter our air and make our space more attractive. For recommended plants, check 15 houseplants and some other plants.
