Erie County and City of Buffalo Designated as New York Climate Smart Communities

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo announced a record number of new certified Climate Smart Communities which recognizes the leadership of local governments that have documented their accomplishments in reducing greenhouse gas emissions and adapting to climate change. The City of Buffalo and Erie County both received the designation for successfully meeting the bronze criteria. Photosynthetic Clothes: Future Growth?

Designer Roya Aghighi has created clothing made from algae that use carbon dioxide in photosynthesis. "Biogarmentry" are the proof of concept for a textile made with living, photosynthetic cells. *Chlamydomonas reinhardtii*, a type of single-cell green algae, are spun together with nano polymers to make the fabric. The resulting fabric feels like linen and is "the first non woven living and photosynthetic textile" to be created. Wearers would need to take care of their garment as they would a plant in order to keep them alive, rather than engaging in the environmentally destructive practice of making synthetic clothes and discarding them after a few uses. Biogarmentry is activated by being exposed to sunlight. Rather than wash their clothes, the owner would just need to spray them with water once a week. <u>Read more</u>

Biorecycling for PET plastic

A France-based startup Carbios has developed a process to take pulverized PET plastic waste (typical of plastic drink bottles and polyester clothing) to make new plastic identical in quality to the virgin material. The process uses enzymes which decompose the plastic into the material's basic building blocks, called monomers, which can then be separated, purified, and used to make new plastic. Measuring Food Waste and Loss and its Impacts

The Commission for Environmental Cooperation (CEC) issued a technical report and practical guide on food loss and waste measurement. "Why and How to Measure Food Loss and Waste: A Practical Guide" is an easy-to-use tool for businesses to apply in measuring the quantity of food wasted in their process activities. This new tool has the power to alter an organization's practices, reducing operational costs while also helping to reduce the environmental impacts of our food production system. The technical report, "Quantifying Food Loss and Waste and Its Impacts," that was released along with the guide, provides methods to quantify food loss and waste and food surplus across the supply chain, as well as tools to estimate the environmental, financial and social impacts of food loss and waste. Water Soluble Packaging: End of Shampoo Bottles?

For her master's thesis at the University of Arts in Berlin, Jonna Breitenhuber developed a bottle made from soap that can effectively serve as packaging for any liquid hygiene product on the market—and they are just as visually arresting as the best-designed plastic bottles. These bottles, which she calls <u>SOAPBOTTLE</u>, are made from a traditional piece of soap that's been hollowed out. The interior is lined with a water-insoluble layer, which prevents any liquids contained within it from dissolving the soap. On the top, there is a reusable metal closure to allow you to open the top and pour out your shampoo or shower gel. After a while, you'll just have little remnants of soap left, which she recommends using as hand soap, and it's entirely biodegradable. So unlike plastic, it will not result in any waste. Waste Scanner to Identify Recyclable Items

A device is under development to scan items and let users know whether their local recycler will accept the item. The simple-to-use, handheld device is intended for use by waste organizations; the goal is to have the waste facility provide the device to each household. The device will help keep recyclable items out of the landfills and the oceans. Almost as bad as misdirected recyclable items are the materials that end up in the recycling bin where they don't belong. Report Cladophora on Shorelines

Help us understand and monitor *Cladophora*, a non-harmful green alga, by reporting observations along Lake Erie, Lake Ontario, Niagara River and St. Lawrence River Shorelines. Cladophora is a type of stringy (filamentous) algae that grows on rocks, wood, logs, and other hard underwater surfaces in freshwater ecosystems, including the Great Lakes basin. Food Donation and Scrap Laws and Regulations

In partnership with Harvard Food Law & Policy and Center for EcoTechnology, four legal facts sheets have been created to address common legal questions about food donation and food scraps diversion in New York State. These fact sheets should dispel some concerns about liability related to food donations and encourage more businesses to share surplus goods. Food waste is a major environmental issue, so keeping it out of landfills is important. These fact sheets explain both federal and New York State laws and regulations including: <u>Tax incentives for food donation, Liability protections for food donors, Date labeling requirements for food packaging, Feeding food scraps to animals.</u>

DEC Launches Tool to Increase Transparency and Access to Data and Reports

DEC recently launched an interactive map that provides access to DEC documents and public data about New York's environment and outdoor recreation resources. This first-of-its-kind DEC mapping application generates results specific to locations across the state and includes 50 interactive data layers. Several information layers can be active at the same time, allowing users to see the many ways DEC is working to protect and enhance the state's environment and recreational opportunities. Pesticide-treated Seeds May be Responsible for Songbird Decline

A recent study suggested that seeds treated with neonicotinoid pesticides could be behind loss of songbirds. Eating even one or two seeds treated with neonicotinoid pesticides suppresses birds' appetite, causing weight loss that delays migration and potentially contributes to the steep decline in North American songbird populations, researchers reported in Science. Though eating a few seeds treated with neonics does not kill birds, it does cause an average loss of 9% to 17% in crucial body fat, and may render them unable breed, the American Bird Conservancy's Steve Holmer says. Business Membership Program to Encourage Greener Commuting

Go Buffalo Niagara, a Transportation Management Association serving Erie and Niagara Counties, has launched a <u>business membership program</u> which encourages people to commute without a car. Once a business is signed up, its employees who choose to walk, carpool, bike, or take public transit to work will have access to myriad alternative transportation incentives, such as: discounted transit passes and preferred parking for carpools, guaranteed ride home which provides those who don't drive alone with a free ride home in case of emergencies, discounted memberships to <u>GObike Buffalo</u> and <u>Reddy Bikeshare</u> and monthly raffles for commuters who log their commute trips.

Municipality Rebates for Zero-emission Vehicles and Grants for ZEV Infrastructure

The 2019 round of DEC's municipal ZEV program is now open. Full details may be found in the Request for Applications (RFA) at http://www.dec.ny.gov/energy/109181.html. A total of \$500,000 will be distributed in this round on a first-come, first-served basis for clean vehicle rebates which include plug-in hybrid, all-electric, and hydrogen fuel cell vehicles. Applications for the Municipal Clean Vehicle Rebate Program on a rolling basis through 4:00 pm on July 24, 2020 or until funding is exhausted, whichever occurs first. A total of \$2,500,000 in grants will be distributed for infrastructure to municipalities that installed (or will install) hydrogen filling station components or electric vehicle supply equipment (EVSE) that is Level 2 or direct current fast charge (DCFC). DEC is accepting applications for the Municipal ZEV Infrastructure Grant Program on a rolling basis through 4:00 pm on May 29, 2020 or until funding is exhausted, whichever occurs first.

Sumo Seaweed-fiber Diapers Offer Healthy and Sustainable Alternative

Luisa Kahlfeldt has won the Swiss James Dyson award for the design of a new diaper. Her reusable Sumo diapers are made entirely of a fabric called SeaCell, composed of seaweed and eucalyptus. The textile is antibacterial and antioxidant-rich, so it is beneficial for babies' skin. It's also sustainable to harvest and produce, giving it an advantage over the textiles used in most cloth diapers on the market. And since Kahlfeldt has fashioned it into a mono-material design, it is also more easily recycled, with no need to disassemble its components. Read more <u>here</u>

NYSERDA Farm Energy Audits

NYSERDA offers free energy audits to identify energy efficiency measures for eligible farms and on-farm producers, including but not limited to: dairies, orchards, greenhouses, vegetable growers, vineyards, grain dryers, and poultry/egg. Farms must be customers of a New York State investor-owned utility and contribute to the System Benefits Charge (SBC). Please check your farm's current electricity bills to determine if you pay SBC. Farms can request an energy audit through the Agriculture Energy Audit Program.

Indoor Solar Cells Designed

Swedish and Chinese scientists have developed organic solar cells that can convert ambient indoor light to electricity. While they won't generate lots of power, it should provide enough energy for many of our devices. As the internet of things expands, it is expected that we will need to have millions of products online, both in public spaces and in homes. Many of these will be the multitude of sensors to detect and measure moisture, particle concentrations, temperature and other parameters. For this reason, the demand for small and cheap sources of renewable energy is increasing rapidly, in order to reduce the need for frequent and expensive battery replacements. Organic solar cells are flexible and cheap to manufacture and their light-absorbing layer gives considerable flexibility in tuning the solar cells such that they are optimized for different light wavelengths. <u>Annie's Grants for Gardens</u> - provided to K-12 school gardens to help children start thinking more holistically about their food, their communities, and the planet. Grants of \$3,000 may be used to purchase any supplies for an edible garden. Deadline: **November 1.**

<u>FY 2019 HUD Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grant Program</u>- helps communities transform neighborhoods by redeveloping severely distressed public and/or HUD-assisted housing and catalyzing critical improvements in the neighborhood, including vacant property, housing, businesses, services and schools. Deadline: **November 4, 2019.**

<u>NOAA Marine Debris Grant Program</u>-Funding is available through the National Oceanic and Atmospheric (NOAA) Marine Debris Program to prevent the introduction of marine debris into the marine and coastal environment (including the Great Lakes). Letters of intent are requested by **November 5, 2019.**

<u>Green Schools Grant</u>- NYSAR³ established a grant program for public, private, and charter schools Grades K-12 in 2005 for the purpose of providing seed, or start-up money for recycling/waste reduction programs in public and private schools. This grant provides up to \$500 per school to rejuvenate existing programs or to develop new programs centered around the 3 R's (reduce, reuse, recycle). Awards will be made twice yearly; this is a competitive grant so imagination, ingenuity and initiative are valued. Deadline: **November 8**.

<u>New York Farm Viability Institute Grant</u>- This grant supports projects with clear relevance to New York's agriculture community, demonstrated producer support, and the ability to deliver farm-level economic impact over time. There is a particular interest in projects focused on new technologies, and soil-health management practices. Deadline: **November 12**.

<u>2020 Build it with KaBOOM! Playground Grants</u>-Build it with KaBOOM! Grants pair you with a dedicated funding partner to plan and build a brand-new playground. Along with extra support for your application, Deadline: **November 15**.

<u>United Fresh Start Foundation Community Innovation Grants Program</u> increases children's access, selection, and consumption of fresh produce while they are outside of school. A total of \$50,000 will be awarded to a minimum of five projects. Eligible applicants include not-for-profit organizations, schools, universities, small businesses, and others. Deadline: **December 1, 2019.**

<u>Northeast SARE Farmer Grants</u>-Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Research & Education (SARE) is accepting applications for grants for commercial producers who have an innovative idea they want to test using a field trial, on-farm demonstration, marketing initiative, or other technique. Projects should seek results other farmers can use, and all projects must have the potential to add to knowledge about effective sustainable practices. Deadline: **December 3, 2019.**

<u>Urban Forestry Projects</u>-Grants are available for tree planting, maintenance, tree inventory, community forest management plans and for educating those who care for public trees. Eligible applicants include municipalities, public benefit corporations, public authorities, soil and water conservation districts, community colleges, not-for-profit organizations and Indian nations or tribes. Tree inventories and community forest management plans require no match. Tree planting, maintenance and education projects have a 25 percent match requirement. Not-for-profit applicants are required to pre-qualify in the Grants Gateway system, so DEC recommends that applicants start the process well in advance of the grant application due date. Deadline: **December 4, 2019 at 2 p.m**.

<u>Asphalt Art Grants for Cities-</u> Cities with populations between 30,000 and 500,000 are welcome to apply. Only one application per city will be accepted. Each application's Project Team must include Lead Applicant: City agency responsible for advancing necessary permitting and oversight of the site and installation (e.g., Department of Transportation, Department of Public Works, or other appropriate agency) and Fiscal Agent: An organization with 501(c)3 nonprofit status that can receive the grant funds and be responsible for managing the distribution and procurement required. Deadline: **December 12.**

<u>2020 Farm to School Grant Program Request for Applications (RFA).</u> Farm to school programs support local communities through a variety of activities, including taste tests, farm visits, local purchasing, food and agriculture education, and farmer and producer training. A wide variety of entities are eligible to compete for funding through this grant opportunity. Schools and school districts, local agencies, Indian tribal organizations, small- to medium-sized agricultural producers or groups of small- to medium-sized agricultural producers, and non-profit organizations are eligible to apply for Planning and Implementation grants. State agencies may apply for a State Agency grant. Deadline: December 13, 2019.</u>

<u>KidsGardening Youth Garden Grants</u> - The Youth Garden Grant supports school and youth educational garden projects that enhance the quality of life for students and their communities. 5 programs will receive awards valued at \$2360 and 20 programs will receive award valued at \$775. Deadline: **December 16**

<u>Margaret A. Davidson Graduate Fellowship</u>- new fellowship program for graduate students at the national estuarine research reserves. One two-year fellowship opportunity will be available at each of the 29 coastal sites. Through a research project, fellows will address a key coastal management question to help scientists and communities understand coastal challenges that may influence future policy and management. Deadline: **December 20**.

Regional Farm to School Institute Grant Request for Applications (RFA). This new grant focus for fiscal year 2020 will support the creation and dissemination of information on farm to school program development, and provide practitioner education and training, and ongoing school year coaching and technical assistance. Deadline: **December 27, 2019**.

<u>Katie's Krops Growers Grants</u> - Kids 9-16 can apply today to become a Katie's Krops Grower and help end hunger in their community. Grantees receive funding to start their garden in the form of a gift card to a garden supply store in their community and tons of planning resources. Deadline: **December 27**

2020 Environmental Education Grants Program- will award three to four grants in each of the agency's 10 regions. In addition to other environmental topics, the 2020 Environmental Education Grants Program will fund educationbased projects pertaining to marine debris mitigation, food waste and loss reduction, and recycling. Funded projects will both increase public awareness on various environmental matters and enhance participants' abilities to make informed decisions on environmental issues prospectively. Deadline: Jan. 6, 2020

John A. Knauss Marine Policy Fellowship Program-The Sea Grant Knauss Fellowship provides a unique educational and professional experience to graduate students who have an interest in ocean, coastal and Great Lakes resources and in the national policy decisions affecting those resources. The Fellowship, named after one of Sea Grant's founders and former NOAA Administrator John A. Knauss, matches highly qualified graduate students with "hosts" in the legislative and executive branch of government located in the Washington, D.C. area, for a one year paid fellowship. Deadline: February 21, 2020.

<u>The Pollination Project Grants</u> support organizations/groups that do not have any paid staff with initial grants of up to \$1,000. Successful grantees become eligible for larger impact grants of up to \$5,000 and other support. One grant is awarded every day. Deadline: **Rolling**

<u>The Kars4Kids Small Grant Program</u> is dedicated to supporting education, mentoring, and youth development programs around the country that help children develop into productive members of their community. Grants typically range from \$500-\$2,000. Deadline: **Rolling.**

<u>Residential Curbside Recycling Cart Grant Program Request For Proposals</u>- The purpose of the Residential Curbside Recycling Cart Grant Program is to advance recycling in communities across the United States by offering financial and technical assistance to support the implementation of cartbased curbside recycling. With the release of this Request For Proposals (RFP), The Partnership offers communities the chance to apply for grant funding to support the acquisition of recycling carts, with the goal of expanding access to cart based recycling collection by converting bin or bag-based curbside recycling collection programs to cart-based collection, or by supporting the implementation of new curbside recycling programs using cart-based collection. Deadline: **Rolling.**

<u>H20 for Life Mini-Grants</u> provide \$250-\$500 mini-grants for schools to organize projects that educate youth about the global water crisis and help them take action to provide water, sanitation and hygiene education (WASH) for global partner schools. **Deadline: Rolling**

<u>The Karma for Cara Foundation</u> is encouraging kids 18 and under to apply for funds between \$250 and \$1,000 to complete service projects in their communities. **Deadline: Rolling.**

<u>Food Waste Grants</u> - The New York State <u>Pollution Prevention Institute</u> (P2I) will operate the funding program, which will provide reimbursement to businesses that generate over one ton of food waste per week to offset the cost of select technologies and equipment that promise to reduce or divert that food waste from landfill or incineration. Eligible projects must reduce and/or divert wasted food at a New York State business including, but not limited to, supermarkets, restaurants, and hospitals. Monies from this program will help food scrap generators implement food waste reduction recommendations, purchase capital equipment used in food donation, and create, improve, and expand diversion efforts to on and off-site compost and anaerobic digestion facilities. Deadline: **Rolling.**

<u>Wells Fargo Clean Technology and Innovation Grant Program</u> funds projects and programs related to research and development for new and emerging clean technologies by working with universities, colleges, research institutes and laboratories as well as entrepreneur incubator, accelerator and business plan competitions. If you would like to submit a topic for consideration provide a brief description (150 words or less).

<u>Project Produce: Fruit and Veggie Grants for Schools</u>-designed to help increase kids' access to fresh fruits and vegetables and create experiential nutrition education when and where students make their food choices: in the cafeteria. The \$2,500 one-year grants support food costs to incorporate school-wide fruit and vegetable tastings into the school's nutrition program. Grants will be determined on an ongoing basis depending on available funding.

<u>Industrial Hemp Processing Grant Fund</u>-New York has also allocated up to \$5 million for grants for machinery and equipment required to process industrial hemp for commercialization. Grants may provide a minimum of \$50,000 and a maximum of \$500,000 for up to 50% of total project costs supporting capital investments. To be eligible, the facility must be located wholly in New York State which processes industrial hemp for commercialization.

<u>Toyota Every Day Capacity Building Grants</u>- Up to \$5000 for 25 Public Lands Friends' groups in each cycle. Projects that are needed and will help contribute to the long- term sustainability of the organization. Deadlines: **April 23 and other dates later in the year**.

<u>Cornell Douglas Foundation</u>- Its mission is to provide small grants to organizations which promote the vision of the foundation: advocating for environmental health and justice, encouraging stewardship of the environment, and furthering respect for sustainability of resources. **Deadline: Rolling.**

Tips for the Environment:

1. Know your Plastic Bottles- RecycleRight NY is focusing on plastic bottles and jugs for November- the importance of emptying these containers before recycling, the value of recycling bottles and jugs, and having residents check with their hauler or municipality about specific rules for recycling plastic bottles and jugs-such as caps on or off and what other plastics are recycled in local programs. Check with your recycling provider for specifics of your program.

2. Leaf Me Alone: Why You Should Keep Your Leaves In Your Yard - As the leaves continue to fall, many of us will use our time or money to rid our lawns of leaves. Keeping our leaves nearby is a simpler, more environmentally-friendly solution, as leaves contain nutrients that are good for the soil. Mulch leaves in place, add shredded leaves to landscape as mulch, save for composting and place around your compost bin to insulate for the winter.
