"Hazardous Cargo: Shipping Bakken Crude Oil by Rail"

The monthly WNY Drilling Defense meeting is hosting a presentation by Dr. Fred Millar on **December 4** at 6 p.m. at Crane Branch Library, 633 Elmwood Ave., Buffalo 14222. With very little public awareness and no study of environmental impacts, the oil industry is shipping crude oil from North Dakota across New York State and through the city of Buffalo via rail. Share your Voice in Buffalo's Bicycle Master Plan

Join GObike, the City of Buffalo and Alta Planning & Design on December 4 as they present the developing Buffalo Bicycle Master Plan for feedback and ideas. The meeting will consist of a 2-hour workshop from 6-8pm with a short video presentation by Alta and break-out group discussions with activities to develop ideas. The purpose of this meeting is to get the community together to elaborate on current findings, discuss the hierarchy of bicycle infrastructure needed (sharrows, protected bicycle lanes, cycletracks), and determine a priority of proposed action. This event will be held at 640 Ellicott St. (DIG Buffalo) and is free and open to the public.

2014 Christmas Bird Counts

The annual Christmas Bird Counts are an opportunity for thousands of volunteers to participate in an extensive citizen science project. From the new birders to the experts, all can contribute by helping to collect data on bird populations. Each count takes place in an established 15-mile wide diameter circle, and is organized by a count compiler. If your home is within the boundaries of a Christmas Bird Count circle, then you can stay at home and report the birds that visit your feeder on count day as long as you have made prior arrangement with the count compiler. Garden Walk 2015 Beautification Grants

Award amounts are based on the overall project cost and the projects are required to include matching funds from government, private contributions or volunteer sweat equity. Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU): Ecosystem Restoration through Interdisciplinary Exchange (ERIE)-REU at University at Buffalo

Applications are now being accepted for the summer 2015 Ecosystem Restoration through Interdisciplinary Exchange (ERIE) REU at the State University of New York at Buffalo (UB). The ERIE-REU, sponsored by the National Science Foundation, provides the opportunity for undergraduate students to conduct interdisciplinary faculty-mentored research on a diverse array of projects related to ecosystem restoration and engineering for sustainability. REU participants will receive a total of a \$5,000 stipend and on-campus housing in a newly constructed LEED-certified student complex. Participation is limited to U.S. citizens or permanent residents, and students must be enrolled as undergraduate students in a college program through Fall of the following year (graduating seniors are ineligible). Students from underrepresented groups or attending institutions lacking research facilities or opportunities are especially encouraged to apply. Big Building News from The Foundry

Bicycle-Pedestrian Transportation Projects Funded

Approximately \$70 million has been awarded to fund 68 bicycle, pedestrian and multi-use path transportation projects in New York. The projects, funded by the Federal Highway Administration and which leverage a total investment of \$103.7 million, will promote walking and biking, and boost tourism and economic development opportunities in dozens of communities across the state. A number of WNY projects were funded including \$1.6 million for the West Niagara River Trail. When the trail and other improvements are implemented, a bicycle rider will be able to follow an uninterrupted off road trail from Canalside in downtown Buffalo to Niagara Falls and beyond. DEC Releases Plan to Prevent Spread of the Hemlock Woolly Adelgid

The Hemlock Woolly Adelgid (HWA) is an invasive insect species which kills hemlock trees, including Eastern hemlock (*Tsuga canadensis*). It multiplies very rapidly, feeding on the infested tree, and usually causes death within five to 10 years. Through a partnership with the Nature Conservancy and Cornell Cooperative Extension, the Department of Environmental Conservation is taking action to prevent the spread of HWA into the Zoar Valley area. In September, Cornell scientist Mark Whitmore discovered a single tree infested by HWA (*Adelges tsugae*), in Deer Lick Conservation Area, property that is adjacent to Zoar Valley Multiple Use Area. This was the first HWA detection in western New York. DEC will use two systemic pesticides to treat the infested trees and approximately 600 trees around them, in an attempt to kill the pests and prevent HWA from spreading further into the Zoar Valley. The registered chemicals (dinotefuran and imidacloprid) will be applied by DEC certified pesticide applicators directly to the bark of the trees, where it will absorb into the vascular tissue. Dinotefuran moves rapidly through the tree, killing any adelgids that are feeding on it, while imidacloprid moves more slowly, protecting the tree from further attacks for five years or more. HWA has been known in parts of New York for over 20 years, but this is the first detection of the pest in the Zoar Valley.

<u>Getting the Picture: Our Changing Climate</u>-The adventures of scientist-photographer James Balog and the Chasing Ice team come to life in a newly released climate science education resource which provides a unique, interactive, multimedia experience for students and educators to learn about the latest climate science and witness real-world changes occurring around the world. This comprehensive educational resource is aligned with national educational standards, including NGSS, CCSS and Climate Literacy.

<u>SMILE: New STEM Activities for Educators</u> is an award-winning, free access collection of nearly 4,000 STEM education activities. Designed for seven to 12 year-old players, Habitat encourages care of virtual endangered animals while they earn points by completing real-life missions, like recycling or visiting a park or zoo.

<u>Brazil Habitats and Mask Making (5-7 years)</u>: Children can learn about the different habitats of Brazil and some of the animals that live there before making their own masks. There are six different species to choose from including the jaguar, capybara and dyeing poison frog.

Brazil and the Amazon - Wildlife Film Script Activity (7-11 years): Children will be introduced to the topics of Brazil and the Amazon before using fact sheets to research and write a script for their own wildlife film about an endangered species from the Amazon.

Grant and Scholarship Opportunities

<u>Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections</u> program helps cultural repositories plan and implement preservation strategies that pragmatically balance effectiveness, cost and environmental impact. Tips for the Environment:

- 1. Consider your snow/ice strategies- As we have been dealt an early reminder of Mother Nature's ability to bury some of our communities, it's time to review our strategies for keeping walkways and driveways safe. Almost every option has drawbacks. While shoveling is the most environmentally-friendly method, some of us can't keep up physically. So we turn to salts and other compounds that may have negative environmental effects. Check out the following for options as you weigh the pros/cons of getting traction: three tips, picklebrinebeet, multipletips.
- 2. Reuse and recycle your Tips for the Environment-we are probably all using CFL bulbs, recycling regularly and engaging in lots of earth-friendly behaviors. So let's reuse and recycle-you can check the list of tips from the first Enviro-News in January 2006 (check for any missed at <u>econews</u>). If you have tips to share, please send them to me to include.

December's Contribution by Lesley Haynes:

Remember the 4 R's: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Repair

As the Christmas season approaches and we are caught up in the hustle and bustle of activities, it is important to be thoughtful about energy saving purchases.

Christmas tree: A live tree certainly evokes the season with its pine-fresh smell. Consider buying a living Christmas tree with roots attached that you can plant later in your garden or donate to your local parks department. A cut tree can be recycled by shredding and used as mulch in the garden around evergreen shrubs and trees.

Holiday lights: consider seasonal light emitting diode, or LED, strings of lights. These can save up to 95 percent less energy than conventional bulbs, and they last seven times longer than traditional bulbs thereby resulting in lower power consumption.

Be financially responsible: Overspending during the holidays will not only increase your stress now, but will leave you feeling anxious for months afterward as you struggle to pay the bills. Step back from the excessive gift-giving and practice simplicity, creativity and basic human kindness.

Going green when planning gifts: When you give someone a "green gift" it means you went the extra distance. It also means that you have taken the time to consider the environment and have given a gift that shows something special about you. You will have created a ripple effect too significant to calculate.

Create a gift from scratch: Making a personal effort to create something is always appreciated. Be conscious of the materials you choose and create something to show that you care. Picture frames and mirrors are perennial favorites and people tend to keep them. Reprint a favorite family photo and have it framed. Compose a song, write a poem, or knit a scarf for the one you love. Make the wrapping part of the gift: a decorative canvas bag can hold gifts and be reused for grocery shopping.

Buy a thoughtful gift that adds a lasting element to someone's life. Houseplants or a live organic herb garden are wonderful gifts which live on and bring joy (and oxygen) into someone's home. Always try to buy local. Buy a calendar printed on 100% recycled paper with daily affirmations and uplifting quotes. These will remain with the person for a year at least, and can make a difference every day. Open a savings account or buy a stock for a child in your family and teach him/her how it grows.

Consider a stress-reducing present: Buy your best friend a gift certificate for a one-hour massage or a yoga lesson. Give gift coupons for a car wash or a movie. A subscription to the theater or gym is also an excellent alternative to packaged material gifts. A book, CD or DVD can make a fantastic present especially when the content is uplifting.

Give to a charity: Transfer your gift-giving energy towards buying toys for local children through <u>Toys for Tots</u>, or by donating items to your local food pantry. Buy cards that donate a portion of proceeds to a good cause like UNICEF.

Holiday Cards: The 2.6 billion non-recyclable holiday cards sold each year in the United Statescould fill a landfill the size of a football field 10 stories high. Buying cards printed on recycled paper could help reduce that pile. Does the holiday have you feeling depressed? Help others, not because you should, but because it is the best remedy to seasonal sadness. Find someone who is struggling more than you are, lend them a helping hand, and remember **Jesus is the reason for the season!**
