In partnership with the Western New York Coalition for Occupational Safety and Health (WNYCOSH), Clean Air Coalition is developing a report on toxic releases and worker accidents from the largest companies in the Town of Tonawanda. Are you a worker at a large facility in Tonawanda, are you a first responder or live near a Tonawanda industrial plant? If so, this session is for you. On **Tuesday February 12th** from 6-7:30pm at the Hearthstone Manor (333 Dick Rd. Depew, NY 14043), there will be presentations on OSHA violations from 2007-2010, toxic air emissions in the town and accidents at facilities. CAC and WNYCOSH reviewed government documents obtained through FOIA to drive the report. We need feedback from workers and first responders on whether the data provides an accurate description of their workplace. Great Backyard Bird Count

The Great Backyard Bird Count, **February 15-18, 2013**, is an annual 4-day event that engages bird watchers of all ages in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of where the birds are. Everyone is welcome--from beginning bird watchers to experts. It takes as little as 15 minutes on one day, or you can count for as long as you like each day of the event. It's free, fun, and easy—and it helps the birds. Participants tally the number of individual birds of each species they see during their count period. They enter these numbers on the GBBC website. As the count progresses, anyone with Internet access can explore what is being reported from their own towns or from anywhere in the world. Scientists use the GBBC information, along with observations from other citizen-science projects, such as the Christmas Bird Count, Project FeederWatch, and eBird, to get the “big picture” about what is happening to bird populations. Gulls at Niagara Falls-Our Regional Biodiversity Gem

Winter provides one of the world's greatest gatherings of gulls. More than 100,000 gulls arrive at the falls in mid-November during their annual migration. Because the Niagara River doesn't freeze, birds can feed on the fish from the river. According to the DEC, winter visitors can expect to see Bonaparte's gulls (45,000 at recent count), ring-billed gulls, herring gulls and great-backed gulls. Fifteen other species of gulls migrate to the falls from the far corners of North America and Europe. The entire 32-mile stretch of the Niagara River is designated as a Global Important Bird Area.

25C Tax Credit Extension for Homeowners

Tax credits to a home owner for an incremental energy efficiency improvement in the home (windows, insulation, etc.) were revived in a package of energy tax extenders in the "American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012". This 25C tax credit - which is capped at 10% of the product cost and a \$500 lifetime limit - is now extended through the end of 2013, and it has been made retroactive to include products installed in 2012. It had previously expired at the end of 2011. To claim the credit, homeowners need to enter the appropriate information about cost and measures installed when they file their tax return. They should also keep a copy of the product information and the verification from the manufacturer that the product is 25c eligible.
