Great Backyard Bird Count

The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) is an annual four-day event nationwide that engages bird watchers of all ages in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of bird locations. This year's event is **February 14-17**. Everyone is invited to participate--from beginning bird watchers to experts. It takes as little as 15 minutes on one day, or you can count for as long as you like each day of the event. It's free, fun, and easy—and it helps the birds. Participants tally the number of individual birds of each species they see during their count period. They enter these numbers on the GBBC website: www.birdsource.org/gbbc. New participants must set up a free GBBC account to submit their checklists or use login information from an existing account for any other Cornell Lab citizen-science project. You'll only need to do this once to participate in all future GBBC events. Click "Submit Your Bird Checklist" at the top of this page. As the count progresses, anyone with Internet access can explore what is being reported. Participants may also send in photographs of the birds they see for the GBBC photo contest. A selection of images is posted in the online photo gallery.

WNY PRISM Funded-Invasive Species Partnerships Now Span New York

All regions of New York now have a partnership working to combat invasive species at the local and regional level. The recently finalized contract established the final of eight Partnerships for Regional Invasive Species Management (PRISM) in Western New York. Each PRISM is funded by the state Environmental Protection Fund (EPF) and has a full time coordinator. New York's PRISMs are regional private-public partnerships that have diverse memberships, including local and state governments, conservation and trade organizations, academia, landowner associations and interested citizens. The partnerships are focused on shared goals including education and outreach, developing and coordinating volunteer invasive species monitoring programs, and controlling select invasive species in priority locations. The program has an online go-to resource for information (www.nyis.info), an online invasive species database and GIS mapping system (www.nyimapinvasives.org) to track invasive species populations and management efforts in the state as well as support for statewide invasive species education and outreach, operated through the Cornell University Cooperative Extension Program.

Buffalo's Comprehensive Plan: A Foundation for the Green Code

The city's development framework begins with <u>Buffalo's Comprehensive Plan: Queen City in the 21st Century</u>. Built on an extensive body of expert research, public engagement, and input, the Comprehensive Plan is the master document for all development policy and related investment decisions in the city. When it was adopted in 2006, Queen City in the 21st Century became our first new Comprehensive Plan in more than 30 years. The Comprehensive Plan is guided by four fundamental principles: fix the basics, build on assets, implement smart growth and embrace sustainability. Queen City in the 21st Century specifically called for creation of a new zoning code to put many of its principles and strategies into action. The Green Code accomplishes that task in two parts. First, it translates the Comprehensive Plan principles into Buffalo's Land Use Plan, which establishes the vision for the city's physical development to 2032, Buffalo's bicentennial. Second, it creates a new Buffalo Zoning Ordinance, the "DNA" that determines what gets built and where in Buffalo. Waterfront transformation continues with signature projects such as Griffon Park in Niagara Falls to transition our region from a rust belt to a Great Lakes Region with a vibrant blue economy. Buffalo Niagara Riverkeeper secured over \$70,000 in funding from the US Department of Agriculture Forest Service to implement forested garden beds that will revitalize one of the most highly-used waterfront parks along the Niagara River. This work will complete the implementation of the City of Niagara Falls' master plan through the installation of 135 plants and over 1,200 plugs of ground cover in a project that will enhance the landscape for Griffon Park. This is part of WNY's blue economy with new jobs and resources for a local landscaping company, Beau Landscaping Enterprise Company that was hired for landscape construction. Community groups including Niagara Beautification Commission and LaSalle PRIDE have been working to revitalize the area for years. Investments in landscape enhancements for Griffon Park support their mission to make the community a vibrant, healthy and beautiful place for residents to live. Griffon Park showcases transformation for the LaSalle neighborhood in Niagara Falls and is a great success story for this brownfield. This waterfront park has gone from a landfill to a community asset for jogging, dogwalking, boating, fishing, and children's play areas for enjoyment by local residents. This park is a key component for the regional Niagara River Greenway system of parks that connect Lake Ontario to Lake Erie, showcasing an international waterfront resource.

Erie County Department of Environmental Planning Wins Award for Park Project

The Erie County Department of Environment & Planning (DEP) has been awarded the 2013 Environmental Project of the Year award from the WNY Branch of the American Public Works Association for its work on the Black Rock Canal Park Project. Formerly known as the Ontario Street Boat launch and Cornelius Creek Park, the new Black Rock Canal Park had been noted by the Park Steering Committee as an area needing improvements due to vandalism and an unsafe atmosphere after dark. Working in conjunction with Erie County, the committee raised the funds needed to complete a feasibility study and master plan for the park improvements, leading to a ribbon-cutting at the new Park in May 2013. Site features at the Park include a new roadway turnaround composed of permeable pavers and granite curbing; Erie County's first dog park, which includes a K-9 memorial monument dedicated to dogs that have served in law enforcement; and an avian theme with a bicycle path and increased green space. Numerous "green" features at the Park include LED light fixtures, solar compacting trash cans, bioswales to reduce runoff, and additional landscaping to help filter runoff. Battery Draws Electrical Power from Sugar

A sugar in the form of maltodextrin has been used to produce an enzymatic fuel cell with water as the main byproduct. Electron charges in the sugar are released in stages with the use of a low-cost biocatalyst. The "biobattery" is capable of storing ten times more energy than equivalently sized lithium ion batteries, such as those used in smartphone. These batteries would not only be cheaper, but refillable and biodegradable, significantly reducing the negative environmental impacts. Full Article here

McDonald's Committing to Sustainable Beef

McDonald's_announced that it will begin purchasing verified sustainable beef in 2016. As a large purchaser, their decision can help to transform the beef industry. While they aren't committing to a 100 percent goal, this announcement does indicate the company is considering the environmental and social impacts of their supply chain. The company's Sustainable Land Management Commitment, unveiled in 2011, requires suppliers to gradually source food and materials from sustainably managed land, although there are no specific timelines, and it is initially focusing on beef, poultry, fish, coffee, palm oil and packaging.

EPA Releases Climate Assessment Update to National Stormwater Calculator

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) released phase II of the National Stormwater Calculator and Climate Assessment Tool package. The updated calculator is a desktop application estimates the annual amount of stormwater runoff from a specific location. The calculator now includes changes in seasonal precipitation levels, the effects of more frequent high-intensity storms, and changes in evaporation rates based on validated climate change scenarios by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change. Users can enter any U.S. location and select different scenarios to learn how specific green infrastructure changes, including inexpensive changes such as rain barrels and rain gardens, can reduce stormwater runoff. Every year billions of gallons of raw sewage, trash, household chemicals, and urban runoff flow into our streams, rivers and lakes. Polluted stormwater runoff can adversely affect plants, animals, and people. It also negatively impacts our economy – from closed beaches to decreased fishing in polluted areas. Green infrastructure can reduce the damage caused by climate change by improving water quality in streams and rivers, protecting groundwater sources, and enhancing recreational activities. Using the calculator to choose the best green infrastructure options for an area is an innovative and efficient way to promote healthy waters and support sustainable communities.

Public Comments Sought for Boat Launch Regulations for Invasive Species Control

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is proposing new regulations to prevent the introduction and spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS) at DEC boat launches, DEC Commissioner Joe Martens announced. The proposed regulatory changes require boaters to remove all visible plants and animals from boats, trailers and associated equipment and to drain boats before launching at or leaving a DEC boat launch and waterway access.
