Plentiful Partnership of Niagara- Gleaning Volunteers Needed

Plentiful Partnership of Niagara (PPN) is a collaborative effort among Cornell Cooperative Extension of Niagara County (CCE), Food Bank of WNY, Niagara Community Action Program, Inc. (NICAP), Niagara County farmers, and area institutions. PPN aims to reduce food insecurity, alleviate hunger, keep Niagara County produce local, and connect local farmers to area distribution systems. PPN seeks volunteers for upcoming field and market gleans. In Niagara County 99,935 pounds of produce, on average, go to waste each season (based on reporting from eight farms across the county). The food insecurity rate is 17.2% in Niagara County. PPN provides an opportunity to increase community consumption of local fruits and vegetables and reduce food insecurity. GROW House

The University at Buffalo's entry to the 2014 US Department of Energy Solar Decathlon is the GROW House (Grow, Relax or Work house), demonstrating sustainable urban living. UB is one of 17 teams competing in the two-year contest and the final design will be on display in California in 2015. The students have worked on a design that allows residents of GRoW House to grow their own food, featuring a glass-enclosed solarium that provides ample light for plants during the growing season and passively heats the house in winter. The solarium can be continuously tuned to the appropriate conditions for growing and living. In the summer, operable cloth shades on the roof and southern façades shade and cool while vents or windows allow heat to escape. Design features on the east and west sides will protect the solarium from the low morning and evening sun. This is the first decathlon entry for UB. Aquarium of Niagara: New Home to Blind Rescued Harbor Seal Pup

The Aquarium of Niagara has adopted harbor seal 'Pup 2014', who was rescued off the coast of northern California when he was just days old, abandoned by his mother and unable to remain alone in the wild. The pup joins the Aquarium's collection of five other seals and sea lions, and will make his home in the Aquarium's outdoor pool with Sandy, another harbor seal. The male Pacific harbor seal was born blind, making it impossible for him to be re-released back into the wild. The highly trained staff of trainers has been working night and day to transition the pup into his new pool and new routine.

University at Buffalo's 2015 Stream Restoration Summer Workshops

Big Building News from The Foundry

The Foundry has received their first major grant. First Niagara's fund for supporting small businesses in and around the Buffalo Niagara Medical Campus has granted them \$100,000. The funds will be used to add twelve studio spaces upstairs and make other much-needed improvements. The expansion will allow for more collaborations, more businesses for our youth programs to learn from, and more educational opportunities for the community. The grant will also fund additional tool access for folks looking to start a business but unable to afford the investment in tools.

Garden Walk 2015 Beautification Grants

Applications for Marvin Lunenfeld Beautification Grants are now available from Garden Walk Buffalo, the largest garden walk in the nation. The grants, named for Marvin Lunenfeld, Garden Walk Buffalo's founder, have helped fund dozens of garden beautification projects across the West Side of Buffalo for a total of more than \$50,000 in the last several years. The 2015 grant application can be found here. Completed applications are due **Feb. 17, 2015** with funding awards announced in early spring 2015. Garden Walk Buffalo provides small grants not to exceed \$1,000. Award amounts are based on the overall project cost and the projects are required to include matching funds from government, private contributions or volunteer sweat equity. This calcium titanium oxide mineral can get as high as 19% efficiency, comparable to the 25% light-absorbing efficiency of the currently used silicon. October's Contribution:

Occasionally we read informative accounts of everyday items that have been harming our bodies for years. This month I am writing about the dry cleaning industry, which started in the 19th century. At that time volatile liquids such as gasoline and naphtha were used to clean clothing and linens. The clothing is washed with a chemical liquid and the flammability of those early solvents led to the use of even more 'improved' solvents.

Today eight out of 10 professional dry cleaners in the United States use the chemical perchloroethylene (commonly called perc) to clean clothes. Although perc is less flammable, it is still a dangerous chemical to have so prominently in our lives and is outlawed in many countries. This chemical is linked to a variety of health problems including nervous system disruptions, liver problems, cancer, headaches, nausea, and dizziness, and should not find its way into the environment, however, this country's dry cleaners use about 57 million pounds of perc each year, releasing about 12 million pounds of it into the air.

The federal government also considers perc a hazardous air pollutant that can pose health risks. California plans to phase out perc by 2023, with a ban on new perc equipment in effect soon. These changes are also being considered by several other states. So, based upon this information, I am making the following suggestions.

Dry Cleaning: Care for your clothes and the environment by using odorless, non-toxic and environmentally friendly solutions.

The simple alternative is to buy clothing and other fabric items that do not require dry cleaning, thus saving you money and protecting your health and the environment. Many clothes that are dry-cleaned could be washed by hand or in a washing machine's gentle cycle. Wool, cashmere, angora, and silk can be gently hand-washed with a mild soap in warm water

There is a rise in "green" dry cleaning businesses. Have a conversation with your regular dry cleaning company and see if they have made changes in their cleaning process. According to the local lists of dry cleaners in the Buffalo area only one does not use chemicals - Colvin Cleaners 2375 Elmwood Ave. Kenmore NY. If you know of others please let me know and I will mention them in my next article.

Laundry Products: Many conventional laundry products contain a range of chemicals that trigger skin and eye irritation, cause allergic reactions and asthma, damage the environment, and may have harmful long-term effects. Look for **natural** components in your green laundry products.

Alternatives to Bleach: Instead of chlorine bleach, try hydrogen peroxide, which breaks down into water and oxygen, or use sodium percarbonate by combining hydrogen peroxide with the nontoxic mineral sodium carbonate– they both brighten whites as effectively as chlorine. Chlorine irritates the lungs, eyes, and mucous membranes. Even at very low concentrations, bleach can cause respiratory disorders, asthma attacks, and even neurological and behavioral effects. A little splash on your skin lets you know immediately how toxic bleach can be.

Liquid fabric softeners: Keep it out of the wastewater stream by replacing it with a quarter-cup to a cup of white vinegar, which leaves your clothing soft and doesn't leave behind any odor.

The chemicals that give fabric softeners, and dryer sheets their "fresh" scent are synthesized from petroleum and can irritate skin, cause allergic reactions, trigger asthma, and harm the nervous system. Look for products that use natural essential oils and citrus oils.

Read the labels in detail and choose an environmentally friendly product. By making careful choices we can improve the quality of our lives and future generations.

November's Contribution by Lesley Haynes:

Thanksgiving reminds us to be thankful every day for the blessings in our lives. This year, as you plan your holiday meal, keep two words in mind: *organic* and *local*. These keywords will guarantee a healthier, more nutritious meal.

Going green on Thanksgiving does not have to be complicated. This celebration is an opportunity to get the whole family involved in a green lifestyle

Buying local ensures 1) that more of the money spent on food goes to the local farmer; 2) also keeps your dollars circulating in your own community; and 3) cuts down on the distance that food travels thus reducing the consumption of oil and carbon emissions nationwide.

Have you ever considered the distance that many vegetables may travel? **Read the label** –A bag of carrots transported to Buffalo NY from Los Angeles, CA, 2,537 miles away. Their transport uses a large amount of fuel which is polluting the air.

Traditional recipes typically rely on food that's in season; you will find everything you need in the way of butternut squash, sweet potatoes, yams, apples, pears, spices and a variety of greens that are all readily available at this time of year. The benefits of buying organic are obvious (no pesticides or herbicides).

Where do turkeys come from? They are indigenous to North America, but today's turkeys are deficient in one glaring way: they cannot reproduce and have been bred to produce the most meat at the least cost. Turkeys are now dependent on human intervention to fertilize their eggs. Heritage turkeys, in contrast, mate naturally, live outdoors and grow slowly. When buying your traditional turkey check your local farms. Make sure that no hormones or antibiotics have been pumped into the bird. Also, ask if it is range free, if the answer is yes then order a fresh turkey to be picked up close to the holiday. If you do not find a poultry farm then look for all-natural turkeys at local cooperative markets. You may also consider grilled whole salmon for a pescetarian meal or a vegetarian casserole for vegans and vegetarians.

Liven up your Thanksgiving gathering by adding a few decorative touches. Purchase a tablecloth and cloth napkins of a seasonal color, which can be washed and **reused** for years to come. By using china, silverware and glasses you do not have to dispose of paper plates and utensils thus **reducing** waste in landfills. Get the children to help decorate by collecting pine cones and acorns and put them in a clear glass bowl to make a beautiful centerpiece.

After you have enjoyed your meal and guests are relaxing in the living room try the following conversation starter. Think of different questions to ask each person. For example what does Thanksgiving means to them? What are they thankful for? What's their favorite memory or funny story about Thanksgiving? It is amazing what one can learn about people that we have known for years and children will learn more about their family traditions.

Just a thought: Don't assume that all of your friends and acquaintances have been invited to a Thanksgiving celebration. Holidays can be a very lonely time for many who do not live near family, or for whatever reason are estranged from them. If you are not sure, extend the invitation anyway. Many people are alone at this time of year.

Teach your children by example how to care for the environment by **reusing**, **recycling** and avoiding waste. Living a green existence is painless with the right perspective and attitude.
