Plentiful Partnership of Niagara- Gleaning Volunteers Needed

Plentiful Partnership of Niagara (PPN) is a collaborative effort among Cornell Cooperative Extension of Niagara County (CCE), the Food Bank of WNY, Niagara Community Action Program, Inc. (NICAP), Niagara County farmers, and area institutions. PPN aims to reduce food insecurity, alleviate hunger, keep Niagara County produce local, and connect local farmers to area distribution systems. PPN seeks volunteers for upcoming field and market gleans. Creating Healthy Places to Live, Work, and Play (CHP), a New York State Department of Health grant and CCE program, formed the foundation for PPN with an emphasis on access to healthy food. Each year, produce is left in the fields to waste or is discarded prematurely, either due to cosmetic imperfections or the absence of an alternative outlet. In Niagara County 99,935 pounds of produce, on average, go to waste each season (based on reporting from eight farms across the county). CHP is working to increase the local harvest and reduce waste, by working with area farmers and distributors, to better connect produce with those who need it. The food insecurity rate is 17.2% in Niagara County. PPN provides an opportunity to increase community consumption of local fruits and vegetables and reduce food insecurity. Over 150 totes (or 7,500 pounds) of produce have been collected since the onset of PPN, in April of 2014, and distributed to over 47,892 Niagara County residents. Please contact Margaret M. Spring has arrived in Buffalo and so have visitors from the south – migratory birds like hummingbirds, warblers, and other songbirds. Many of these migrants travel through Buffalo on their way from the Caribbean, Central and South America on their way to breeding grounds in the Arctic. Unfortunately, every year, thousands of warblers and other birds are killed as they migrate through our city. Artificial lights attract and confuse birds, leading to collisions with glass – killing hundreds of millions of birds each year in the U.S. You can help! Be part of the solution by identifying birds that are dead or injured due to collisions with buildings. If you see a dead or injured bird just text the word **BIRD** to the number **877-877** and answer the prompts. The information you provide will help us work with building owners to help prevent bird collisions with glass. Trees Save Lives and Clean Air

U.S. Forest Service scientists and collaborators calculated that trees are saving more than 850 human lives a year and preventing 670,000 incidences of acute respiratory symptoms. While trees' pollution removal equated to an average air quality improvement of less than 1 percent, the impacts of that improvement are substantial. Researchers valued the human health effects of the reduced air pollution at nearly \$7 billion every year in a study published recently in the journal Environmental Pollution. Monarch Butterfly Reproduction Favorable

According to Wild Ones, the Monarch Larva Monitoring Project (www.mlmp.org) data shows that monarchs are reproducing well so we should see a modest increase in the overwintering population this year. Monarch adult numbers were low this year and habitat destruction has been a problem in their overwintering locations in Mexico. Hydrofracking Health Risks

Concerned health professionals of WNY have compiled a report of issues related to hydrofracking which is available at http://concernedhealthny.org/wp-content/uploads/2014/07/CHPNY-Fracking-Compendium.pdf. The recently released report summarizes scientific and medical research on the risks associated with horizontal hydraulic fracturing for natural gas.

New funding to Accelerate Buffalo River Restoration

Nearly \$4.7 million is being provided to restore degraded shoreline and create natural habitat at seven sites along the river in the City of Buffalo. Shoreline restoration work by the Buffalo Niagara Riverkeeper complements water quality improvements managed by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) and is integrated with significant new economic development projects taking place along the river supported by Governor Cuomo's Buffalo Billion economic development program and other public and private investments.

The funding comes from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) under the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, a federal program that is cleaning up heavily polluted "Areas of Concern" and addressing other problems in the lakes. When fully implemented, the projects will restore nearly two miles of shoreline and more than 20 acres of habitat at seven sites on the lower Buffalo River.

WNY Coalition for Donated Goods

The WNY Coalition for Donated Goods (WNYCDG) is a consortium of local non-profit organizations including Salvation Army, Amvets, Goodwill, Hearts for the Homeless and the City Mission. The mission of WNYCDG is to educate the community on the environmental and economic benefits of recycling and donating goods and to provide easy access to donation opportunities. WNYCDG is supported and sponsored by the City of Buffalo and the County of Erie and partially funded by the State of New York. Coalition members are also uniting to differentiate themselves from the other collectors whose collected goods do not benefit the local community. Spray-on Solar Technology Advancing

A more efficient, affordable spray-on solar cell has been developed. The new technology uses a new material call perovskite. This calcium titanium oxide mineral can get as high as 19% efficiency, comparable to the 25% light-absorbing efficiency of the currently used silicon. Having spray technology could make solar production quicker and more affordable and would allow you to coat oddly-shaped objects or cars more easily.
