Using Publicly Owned Vacant Land to Advance Sustainability and Equity in Buffalo, New York

In a new Partnership for the Public Good report, Sarah Wooton and Sam Magavern researched the more than 8,000 lots owned by the City of Buffalo. These vacant parcels are largely the result of historic discriminatory land policies, which encouraged white flight and left thousands of empty homes vulnerable to demolition. Examples from Buffalo and around the nation prove that vacant urban land can be repurposed for affordable housing, community gardens, urban farms, parks, playgrounds, trails, green infrastructure, public art, and other beneficial uses. The report gives an overview of vacant land in the City of Buffalo, potential reuse strategies, regulatory framework and planning, and the importance of community planning and decision making, including what community members have inputted thus far.

Enough is Enough: Building A Sustainable Economy in a World of Finite Resources

Legislation to Allow Electronic Repairs.

The <u>Digital Fair Repair Act</u> is a new law that should make it easier for consumers to repair certain electronic devices, including laptops and smartphones, thereby saving money and reducing harmful e-waste. The law compels manufacturers doing business in the state to make repair parts, tools, and documentation, including schematics, available to the public, something companies had not been required to do in the past. It goes into effect on July 1, 2023. This should increase the availability of electronic device repair and bring down prices. Until now, independent repair businesses haven't always had the tools and information they needed to fix broken devices, forcing consumers to go back to the manufacturers for repairs or to just buy replacements. The new law is meant to increase competition for repair work—and let consumers fix their own gadgets if they feel technically capable. The law covers electronic devices purchased at retail, including devices popular with consumers like laptops, smartphones, and tablets. It does not apply to so-called white goods, an industry term that typically refers to big appliances like refrigerators and washing machines.

NY Climate Smart Community Awards in Western New York

Three awards were made recently under the New York Climate Smart Communities Program. The town of Amherst will receive \$2 million to replace an existing refrigeration system at the Northtown Center, western New York's premier ice sports facility. The existing chiller at the north-end ice plant will be replaced with a climate-friendly carbon dioxide chiller capable of servicing two ice rinks. Due to greater energy efficiency, the project expects greenhouse gas emissions reduction of 1,082 tons and energy savings of \$193,714 annually. City of Buffalo will receive \$140,000 to help develop a community climate action and adaptation plan that includes a community greenhouse gas inventory. The project will contribute to the city's application for designation as a silver-certified Climate Smart Community. The village of Lancaster will receive \$100,000 to produce a community greenhouse gas inventory covering emissions from both the village and town of Lancaster. In addition, the town and village will develop a joint climate action plan focused on the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions from municipal operations.

Draft New York State Solid Waste Management Plan – Public Comment Period Now Open

To protect communities and mitigate the effects of climate change, the draft New York State Solid Waste Management Plan (Plan) builds upon sustained efforts to reduce waste and advance the state's transition to a circular economy, helping to change New Yorkers' understanding of waste and their relationship to it. This Plan is intended to guide actions over the next decade, from the beginning of 2023 to the end of 2032, and builds upon the State's 2010 Beyond Waste Plan. WNY PRISM Annual Report

Western New York Partnership for Invasive Species Management (WNY PRISM) has released their 2022 Annual Report. With your support, WNY PRISM surveyed 12,000 acres and 200 miles of trails and waterways and removed invasive species from 44 sites. Over 2,000 acres were treated using a combination of manual and chemical removal including the removal of 4,000 lbs. of water chestnut and 150 bags of terrestrial early detection species. The Watercraft Inspection Stewardship Program conducted 12,063 boat inspections working at 15 launches and intercepted 385 individual invasive organisms from launching and retrieving boats. WNYPRISM held 8 workshops, 9 Walk and Talks, gave 16 presentations and tabled at 15 partner events resulting in 3,983 direct contacts. And contrary to popular belief, beetles in the firefly family Lampyridae are found in every state and province except Hawaii and Nunavut. With Xerces' new Firefly Atlas, anyone can join and help collect observations that will allow Xerces and our conservation partners better protect the magic of fireflies, for generations to come. Starting this spring, conservation professionals and volunteers can join a new opportunity to study and protect a beloved group of insects that brings magic to the night: fireflies. Tax Credits for Energy Efficiency Upgrades Extended

As part of the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) of 2022, federal tax credits for energy efficient home upgrades have been extended for 2023. These include incentives for Geothermal Heat Pumps, Residential Wind Turbines, Solar Energy Systems, and Fuel Cells. DEC's Intent to Restrict Certain Neonicotinoid Pesticide Products

The Department of Environmental Conservation is restricting use of certain neonicotinoid (neonic) pesticide products effective January 1, 2023. Restricted use pesticides can only be used by a private or commercial certified applicator possessing NYS certification. Neonics affect the nerve cells of insects often causing paralysis and death of the insect and harm pollinators as well as the intended pest insects. Pesticide products containing imidacloprid, acetamiprid, and thiamethoxam that are labeled for foliar, outdoor use, and/or seed treatment will be reclassified as "restricted use" pesticides. This reclassification will ensure proper use by trained, licensed applicators and also require sales and use data of neonics to be annually reported to the DEC.

Farmland Protection Grants Available

The NYS Department of Agriculture is pleased to announce the availability of funds for the Round 18 Farmland Protection Implementation Grants (FPIG) Program – Conservation Easement Projects. The intent is to fund the implementation of certain farmland protection activities intended to maintain the economic viability of the State's agricultural industry and its supporting land base and to protect the environmental and landscape preservation values associated with agriculture. Grant applications will be accepted on a continuous basis. The RFA will remain open and awards will be made until such time as available funds are fully committed, or the RFA is closed.

Make Cigarette Butts Part of Your Cleanups

Littered cigarette butts: besides ugly to look at, they are hazardous to our kids, pets, wildlife and gardens. Locally, data from the Great Lakes Watershed Cleanup conducted by Ocean Conservancy indicates that more than 300,000 cigarette butts (35.3% of all items recovered) were collected from the Great Lakes in 2019. When left in the environment, littered cigarette butts leach toxic chemicals, such as arsenic (used to kill rats) and lead, that may be carried as runoff to drains and end up polluting our rivers and lakes right here in Western New York. Because cigarette butts are primarily made of plastic filters that don't biodegrade, the butts that aren't eaten by wildlife simply pile up on shorelines or at the bottom of bodies of water. In addition to fossil fuel use to generate these, washing of these items leads to the shedding of microplastics into our waterways. There are filters that can be placed on washing machines to trap some of these, but you can also extend the time between washings when able and choose natural fibers. Watch the video to learn more.

NYSERDA Green Jobs Green New York Energy Studies

Small businesses and not-for-profit organizations can receive an energy study to help them identify opportunities to make their buildings more energy efficient. The energy study is a valuable tool to understand how to reduce energy usage and costs in your facility, and it provides a "road map" to plan for improvements that can be made as budgets permit. It includes: a comprehensive walk through of the facility; site staff interviews; utility bill analysis; fuel neutral, unbiased evaluation of potential low-cost/no-cost and capital improvement energy efficiency upgrades; and a report that outlines potential energy and cost savings opportunities for your facility. 2022 Glyphosate Report Now Available Online

With the addition of paragraph 12 to Article 33-1301 of the New York State Environmental Conservation Law, the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is now required to post the amount and location of glyphosate applications made on state property by April 1st of each year. The <u>first glyphosate annual report</u> is now available on DEC's Pesticide webpage under "Hot Topics." The data was reported to DEC by state agencies, state departments, public benefit corporations, and their contractors that applied glyphosate on state property.

New Platform can Track Carbon for Individual Trees

The new nonprofit, called <u>CTrees</u> (its motto: "see the forest and the trees"), uses artificial intelligence to analyze satellite and aerial data along with local data from inventories of trees. As trees grow, or when they're lost to logging or fires, CTrees can use new satellite images to keep a running estimate of the total carbon. The methods, based on two decades of science, "come close to the accuracy of the gold standard" of on-the-ground measurement, says Sassan Saatchi, a senior scientist at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, who is helping lead CTrees as a side project.

Public Comments, Civic Engagement and Activism

**This section will share ways to engage and follow policy at the federal and state level. Voting is one action, but civic engagement requires us to share our views and desires with our elected officials.

Contact elected representatives today! You don't have to be an energy or climate expert to make a difference. <u>Get their contact info</u>. Then weigh in on the below!

Packaging Reduction and Recycling Infrastructure Act (often referred to as Extended Producer Responsibility or EPR) would require manufacturers to take responsibility for their products throughout their entire product life cycle, by bearing the cost of properly recycling their packaging and printed paper. Not only does this provide relief to taxpayers, but it also drives producers to minimize packaging materials, improve recyclability, and reduce the toxicity of their products.

NY HEAT Act-The purpose of the bill is to give the Public Service Commission the authority and direction needed to align gas utility regulation and gas system planning with the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (CLCPA) mandates. Overall, the bill removes the legal basis and subsidies driving the expansion of gas systems and requires the commission to adopt rules and develop a statewide gas service transition plan that is consistent with decreasing gas reliance and, where appropriate, decommissioning gas systems.

Better Bottle Bill-Seeks to expandthe returnable container deposit scheme to include more beverage containers. The expansion would include bottled noncarbonated beverages, noncarbonated juices that are less than 100% fruit or vegetable juice, coffee, tea, carbonated fruit beverages, wine, liquor, distilled spirit coolers, and cider. This bill also increases the bottle deposit to 10 cents per container.

Skin Products Disclosure-would require transparency in labeling and banning of some restricted substances.

<u>Birds and Bees Protection Act</u>-ban and prohibit certain uses of neonicotinoids, including on certain seed coatings by 2026 and for turf and ornamental uses by 2025.

- **Green Spring Cleaning** Check out the DEC <u>list</u> of cleaning alternatives including recipes for fabric softener, silver polisher and drain cleaners with many others.
- **Unblock your air vents and returns-** clear your desk, supplies, cabinets, crafts, books, and other items that may be covering it. A blocked air vent must work harder to heat or cool the room and return fresh air.
