2023 Master Forest Owner Training

The CCE Master Forest Owner (MFO) volunteer program helps woodland owners learn about, manage, and enjoy their woods (www.CornellMFO.info). The MFO volunteers are trained by Cornell University Cooperative Extension to provide non-technical peer-to-peer support for woodlot owners through site visits to the owner's property. This campus-based program started in 1993 and is administered through 5 CCE educators who serve as regional directors. One of our goals is to ensure there are MFO volunteers in each county who can assist other woodland owners. To participate, you should own some wooded land, be able to participate in the 2023 online training from 6:30pm to 7:30pm for Tuesdays March 21 to May 2 (March 21, 28, April 4, 11, 18, 25, May 2). These one-hour discussions follow about three hours per week of online self-study. Volunteers should plan to attend a regional one-day field session in May-June on dates/locations TBD. The fee is \$35 per person and \$50 per couple which includes the full training and supplies and resources provided at the field session. Legislation to Allow Electronic Repairs.

The <u>Digital Fair Repair Act</u> is a new law that should make it easier for consumers to repair certain electronic devices, including laptops and smartphones, thereby saving money and reducing harmful e-waste. The law compels manufacturers doing business in the state to make repair parts, tools, and documentation, including schematics, available to the public, something companies had not been required to do in the past. It goes into effect on July 1, 2023. This should increase the availability of electronic device repair and bring down prices. Until now, independent repair businesses haven't always had the tools and information they needed to fix broken devices, forcing consumers to go back to the manufacturers for repairs or to just buy replacements. The new law is meant to increase competition for repair work—and let consumers fix their own gadgets if they feel technically capable. The law covers electronic devices purchased at retail, including devices popular with consumers like laptops, smartphones, and tablets. It does not apply to so-called white goods, an industry term that typically refers to big appliances like refrigerators and washing machines.

NY Climate Smart Community Awards in Western New York

Three awards were made recently under the New York Climate Smart Communities Program. The town of Amherst will receive \$2 million to replace an existing refrigeration system at the Northtown Center, western New York's premier ice sports facility. The existing chiller at the north-end ice plant will be replaced with a climate-friendly carbon dioxide chiller capable of servicing two ice rinks. Due to greater energy efficiency, the project expects greenhouse gas emissions reduction of 1,082 tons and energy savings of \$193,714 annually. City of Buffalo will receive \$140,000 to help develop a community climate action and adaptation plan that includes a community greenhouse gas inventory. The project will contribute to the city's application for designation as a silver-certified Climate Smart Community. The village of Lancaster will receive \$100,000 to produce a community greenhouse gas inventory covering emissions from both the village and town of Lancaster. In addition, the town and village will develop a joint climate action plan focused on the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions from municipal operations.

Household Hazardous Waste Dropoff

Erie County residents have the option of using the County's "Voucher Drop-off program" which enables residents to bring up to 50lbs. of eligible hazardous waste to the Hazman facility in Tonawanda at no cost. Australia-based scientists have devised an exciting new method for eliminating dangerous per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) known as "forever chemicals" from water. When a solution is added to contaminated water, it covers the contaminants and renders them magnetic, allowing them to be easily attracted and isolated. Techniques to clean contaminated waters are urgently needed to safeguard public and environmental health and this one shows promise. Greenhouse Gas Emissions Information for Decision Making: Free Book Download

"State of the Great Lakes" 2022 Report

The Governments of Canada and the United States are pleased to release the State of the Great Lakes 2022 reports, which provide an overview of the status and trends of the Great Lakes ecosystem. There has been tremendous progress to restore and protect the Great Lakes, including the reduction of toxic chemicals, and a reduction in the establishment of new non-indigenous aquatic species. However, some indicator assessments demonstrate that there are still significant challenges, including the impacts of nutrients, especially in Lake Erie and localized areas, and the impacts of invasive species. Climate change is already exacerbating some threats. The continued actions of many groups and individuals are contributing to further improvements in the Great Lakes. Overall, the Great Lakes are assessed by the State of the Great Lakes indicators as Fair and the trend is Unchanging.

Tax Credits for Energy Efficiency Upgrades Extended

As part of the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) of 2022, federal tax credits for energy efficient home upgrades have been extended for 2023. These include incentives for Geothermal Heat Pumps, Residential Wind Turbines, Solar Energy Systems, and Fuel Cells. DEC's Intent to Restrict Certain Neonicotinoid Pesticide Products

The Department of Environmental Conservation is restricting use of certain neonicotinoid (neonic) pesticide products effective January 1, 2023. Restricted use pesticides can only be used by a private or commercial certified applicator possessing NYS certification. Neonics affect the nerve cells of insects often causing paralysis and death of the insect and harm pollinators as well as the intended pest insects. Pesticide products containing imidacloprid, acetamiprid, and thiamethoxam that are labeled for foliar, outdoor use, and/or seed treatment will be reclassified as "restricted use" pesticides. This reclassification will ensure proper use by trained, licensed applicators and also require sales and use data of neonics to be annually reported to the DEC.

Farmland Protection Grants Available

The NYS Department of Agriculture is pleased to announce the availability of funds for the Round 18 Farmland Protection Implementation Grants (FPIG) Program – Conservation Easement Projects. The intent is to fund the implementation of certain farmland protection activities intended to maintain the economic viability of the State's agricultural industry and its supporting land base and to protect the environmental and landscape preservation values associated with agriculture. Grant applications will be accepted on a continuous basis. The RFA will remain open and awards will be made until such time as available funds are fully committed, or the RFA is closed.

Keys to Soil Taxonomy (13th Edition) Now Available Online

The Keys to Soil Taxonomy provides the taxonomic keys necessary for the classification of soils in a form that can be used easily in the field. Incentives on All-Electric Trucks in New York

The New York Truck Voucher Incentive Program (NYTVIP), offers rebates to reduce the cost of purchasing all-electric and alternative fuel trucks and buses for public, private, and non-profit fleets throughout New York State. Rebates are provided directly by truck and bus dealers and are taken off the purchase or lease price of the vehicles. Truck and bus fleets do not have to apply, they simply make sure that their dealer includes the rebate amount in their purchase. Make Cigarette Butts Part of Your Cleanups

Littered cigarette butts: besides ugly to look at, they are hazardous to our kids, pets, wildlife and gardens. Locally, data from the Great Lakes Watershed Cleanup conducted by Ocean Conservancy indicates that more than 300,000 cigarette butts (35.3% of all items recovered) were collected from the Great Lakes in 2019. When left in the environment, littered cigarette butts leach toxic chemicals, such as arsenic (used to kill rats) and lead, that may be carried as runoff to drains and end up polluting our rivers and lakes right here in Western New York. Because cigarette butts are primarily made of plastic filters that don't biodegrade, the butts that aren't eaten by wildlife simply pile up on shorelines or at the bottom of bodies of water. Starting December 31, 2022, the sale and distribution of food packaging with intentionally added per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) will be prohibited in New York State. The US-RIIS is a foundational dataset for invasive species models, risk assessment, and early detection/rapid response. It is an expert opinion-based all-taxa dataset with assertions at the species level and below, on non-native species established in the United States.

Buffalo Food Waste Diversion is Available Year-Round

Buffalo has tested and is launching year-round collection of food waste in an outdoor collection bin at Elmwood Avenue and Bidwell Parkway. Food scraps will be transported by Natural Upcycling to Buffalo River Compost. Since June 2019, over 1000 people have participated in the "Scrap it" program with six summer locations available for drop-off. New Platform can Track Carbon for Individual Trees

The new nonprofit, called <u>CTrees</u> (its motto: "see the forest and the trees"), uses artificial intelligence to analyze satellite and aerial data along with local data from inventories of trees. As trees grow, or when they're lost to logging or fires, CTrees can use new satellite images to keep a running estimate of the total carbon. The methods, based on two decades of science, "come close to the accuracy of the gold standard" of on-the-ground measurement, says Sassan Saatchi, a senior scientist at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, who is helping lead CTrees as a side project.

Technology to Convert CO2 and Plastic Waste to Sustainable Fuel

University of Cambridge researchers have built a prototype machine that transforms both CO2 and plastic waste into sustainable fuel and other valuable materials, using only energy from the sun. The reactor, which features two compartments built separately for greenhouse gases and plastic waste, uses a light absorber called perovskite and a chemical catalyst which can be altered and tuned depending on machine's output — is embedded into the light absorber. The machine is unique in its ability to work with multiple materials at once and may provide a model for solving some of our waste issues. Read more.

Hemlock Wooly Adelgid Management

Hemlock woolly adelgid (HWA, *Adelges tsugae*) is an aphidlike, soft-bodied insect, almost too small to see with the naked eye. Native to Asia, HWA was first reported in the eastern United States in the 1950s. It has since spread to 20 states and two Canadian provinces. HWA feed on tree sap by inserting their mouthparts at the base of the needles and removing plant fluids. Their feeding causes the needles to turn gray, die, and drop from the tree. Branch dieback progresses from the lower branches to the top of the tree. Severe infestations may bring about premature needle drop, reduced twig growth, dieback, and tree death. <u>Info and resources</u>.

Tips for the Environment:

- **Green your Wardrobe and Fashion** Choose companies that have ethical practices, promote fair trade and provide health and environmental product declarations on their website (transparency for all). Consider items made from organic cotton and hemp (free of pesticides), repurpose and reuse, seek out used clothing. Check out textile recycling and other tips.
