For Buffalo residents, to compost your holiday tree, remove all decorations and wires. Trees may be dropped off at Geiter Done of WNY, 383 Babcock Ave. (enter off Dorothy) Monday- Friday, 7:30am to 3:30pm. Curbside tree removal is available, but may not result in composting. Many Erie County municipalities have drop-off locations for trees-check with your town.

For Niagara County residents, drop off undecorated real trees at the Niagara County Fairgrounds in Lockport anytime, just follow the signs! Trees will be chipped and used for various projects around Niagara County. Some municipalities have their own pickups or drop-offs. You can also put it outside in your yard or woods for a great bird and small animal habitat.

## Rehabilitating Wildlife Classes 2024

Classes for those interested in preparing for a wildlife rehabilitator license exam and/or volunteering with AWARE will be offered at Starpoint Central School, 4363 Mapleton Road, Lockport, NY 14094. Cost: \$110.00. Registration will be through Starpoint Central School Community Education. Part 1 (Feb. 17 and 24 from 10am to 1pm) will focus on beginning rehabilitation of wild mammals. Included in the course is: NYS DEC licensing applications, testing and legal issues. Safety in handling, capture techniques, and transporting. Care of orphaned mammals, diseases of mammals, and more. Dealing with the public and information on special licensing for rabies vector species (RVS) will also be covered. Part 2 (March 2, 9 and 16 from 10am to 1pm) specifically focuses on the rehabilitation of birds. Included in this session is applying for USF&W permits, legal issues, species identification, handling and safety, bird anatomy and physiology. ## 30 x 30 Biodiversity Regional Discussion

The Western New York Environmental Alliance recently convened a discussion on the ambitiousness worldwide plan to preserve 30% of earth's ecologically productive land and waters by the year 2030. This plan has been adopted by the UN Biodiversity Conference and has become United States and New York state policy. Speakers from various groups discussed how their groups can actively support the 30 x 30 plan including prioritizing which lands should be preserved and or purchased, repurposing brownfields instead of building on virgin land, and maintaining ecological corridors for wildlife movement. Jay Burney, WNYEA Advocacy Chair, will spearhead the local 30 x 30 initiative by collaborating with interested individuals and organizations to develop an action plan. ## Draft Policy for Public Participation in Agency Decision-Making Processes

## DEC and NYSERDA Release Cap-and-Invest Pre-Proposal Outline AND Climate Affordability Study

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) and New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) announced the release of two key documents and a series of stakeholder meetings in the ongoing development of New York's Cap-and-Invest Program (NYCI), a program to reduce harmful climate-altering greenhouse gas emissions, improve public health, and help combat climate change while advancing environmental justice and investing in disadvantaged communities statewide. The agencies are holding virtual stakeholder meetings next month that include: Jan. 23, 3 to 4:30 p.m. – The Role of Cap-and-Invest; Jan. 25, 1 to 4 p.m. – Pre-Proposal Outline Overview; Jan. 26, 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. – Preliminary Analysis Overview. ## **Erie County Releases Community Climate Action Plan**

The Erie County Department of Environment and Planning ("ECDEP") has announced the release of the county's Community Climate Action Plan ("CCAP"), the product of a three-year collaborative process involving over 100 stakeholders. The CCAP will guide Erie County as it takes actions to reduce climate pollution and to protect the community from the impacts of a changing climate. The County already has a widely acclaimed climate action program for its government operations, which includes but is not limited to waste reduction initiatives, installation of heat pumps on County-owned buildings and the purchase of fleet electric vehicles. With this new community-wide plan, Erie County will broaden its efforts to focus more on community-facing actions.

The Community Climate Change Task Force, a committee of the Erie County Environmental Management Council, guided the development of the plan. Ten working groups, made up of county staff, community stakeholders, university researchers, utilities, and a local business organization developed each chapter. Chapters include: Agriculture & Food Systems, Climate Justice, Climate Resiliency, Commercial Energy Conservation & Renewable Energy, Communicating Progress, Consumption & Waste Reduction, Economic & Workforce Development, Housing & Neighborhood Resiliency, Nature Based Solutions, and Transportation.

County officials first presented the draft plan to the public last spring, followed by a three-month public comment period. The plan received more than 300 public comments with most commenters expressing support. Volunteer workgroups then worked with staff to consider every comment that was received. The plan will now be submitted to the Erie County Legislature for consideration and adoption. ## **Cutoff Date for Fertilizing Lawns is December 1**

If you plan to fertilize your lawn, remember that it is **against New York State law to fertilize lawns between December 1 and April 1 with phosphorus**. Some areas also have local laws about selling and using lawn fertilizers. Visit <u>DEC's Lawn Fertilizer webpage</u> for more information. The law does not apply to agricultural fertilizer or fertilizer for gardens. Before buying lawn fertilizer, check the bag for a set of three numbers showing the percentage of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. Buy a bag with a "0" in the middle. Lawn fertilizer can have unnecessary phosphorus that runs into waterbodies. Excess phosphorus in freshwater can cause algae overgrowth, with serious impacts to the environment and public health.

## **Electric School Bus Roadmap Released**

Governor Kathy Hochul today announced the State's first Electric School Bus Road Map, which outlines the initial pathway to 100% zero-emission school buses by 2035, and the first four elements of an Electric School Bus Guidebook to help schools and school bus operators through the process of incorporating zero-emission buses into their fleets. #### National Strategy for Reducing Food Waste and Recycling Organics

EPA, USDA, and FDA released the draft National Strategy for Reducing Food Loss and Waste and Recycling Organics. This strategy is part of EPA's series of strategies on building a more circular economy for all. The goal of the strategy is to prevent the loss and waste of food, where possible, increase recycling of food and other organic materials to support a more circular economy for all, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, save households and businesses money, and build cleaner, healthier communities. The actions detailed in this strategy will help the U.S. meet its national food loss and waste reduction goal to halve food loss and waste. They will also contribute to meeting the national recycling goal to achieve a 50% recycling rate by 2030 and to global achievement of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal Target 12.3. The EPA released a series of short videos highlighting the environmental, social and economic benefits of community composting. Check out the new community composting webpage and view the videos. A new MITRE-Gallup report on the State of Food Waste in America shares data and trends collected from over 9,000 households, including user-reported food waste measurements. One key finding of this report is that the average household wastes 6.2 cups of food in a typical week. View the full report.

## **DEC Releases Final New York State Solid Waste Management Plan**

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation announced the final 2023-2032 State Solid Waste Management Plan, a milestone in the State's ongoing efforts to ensure New York is at the forefront of rethinking waste. The <u>New York State</u> <u>Solid Waste Management Plan: Building the Circular Economy through Sustainable Materials Management</u> is a 10-year plan that describes actions to reduce the climate impact of solid waste and provides direction for New York's waste reduction, reuse, recycling, collection, transportation, and disposal investments, policies, and practices over the next decade.

As of December 23, 2021, all beekeepers in NYS are required to register with Ag and Markets and renew their registration annually regardless of whether you are selling nucleus colonies or queens or not. It only takes a few minutes to do, and then you will get notifications of any disease issues in your area. <u>Learn more</u>.

## **Heat Pumps: The Basics**

Heat pumps are safe, efficient, and versatile. They are an all-in-one heating and cooling system. Cold climate heat pumps are designed to efficiently operate in cold climates like New York State – while also doubling as a cooling system in the summer. Heat pumps are cleaner and more efficient than boilers and furnaces. They don't burn fossil fuels like oil, propane, and natural gas. Heat pumps use electricity to draw thermal energy from the environment. They move that energy indoors to heat your space or move it outdoors to cool your space. While there are three types of heat pumps —air source, ground source, and water source — ground source heat pumps (also known as geothermal) can serve the needs of a single building or be installed in a networked system. Not sure how ground source heat pumps work? This two-minute NYSERDA video explains how they take advantage of the earth's constant temperature (in New York State, that's around 50°F) to efficiently heat and cool buildings. Ground source heat pumps are high efficiency (provide 3-4 times the output for every unit of energy) and require minimal maintenance.

The WNY YBC organizes monthly events, sends a monthly email newsletter including the "Bird of the Month" feature and updates on club outings, and serves as a resource for the community to connect with family-friendly birding experiences. WNY YBC recognizes that birding is often a quiet and calm activity that doesn't always match the exuberance of young birders – thus they are creating a space where an enthusiastic joy in birds can take flight. The Tick App is a free app for your smartphone. The app contains information on ticks and asks you to log your daily activities to help researchers. You can even send pictures of your ticks for identification. The app allows people living in high-risk areas for Lyme disease to participate in a regional tick exposure and human behavior study.

#### 2023 Good News

Amid the bad news about climate change, 2023 had some shiny moments. Investments in clean energy outpaced those in fossil fuels, with \$1.70 invested in clean energy for ever \$1 in oil and gas. The Inflation Reduction Act and other efforts led to the creation of more than 170,000 clean energy jobs across 44 states. According to a 2023 LinkedIn report, the number of job postings requiring at least one sustainability-related skill grew 22.4% between 2022 and 2023. While electric vehicle sales may be slow, more than 1 million were sold in the U.S. in the first 11 months of 2023. We also set a record for the amount of electricity generated by renewables-25% for the first half of the year with more than 2 gigawatts of community solar installed in New York.

#### **Urban Agroforestry**

A <u>free, downloadable publication</u> provides guidance in designing planting systems for your community. Trees and other perennial crops can be integrated into any number of urban landscapes, including urban farms, backyards, public parks, roadsides, neighborhoods, and other underutilized or marginal spaces. With proper planning, design, and management, these systems can increase the economic, ecological, and community resilience of urban areas.

#### **Weather Patterns for Climate Prediction**

If you're curious how historical El Niño (or La Niña) conditions have affected weather patterns across the U.S., then check out the NOAA Physical Science Laboratory ENSO comparison maps. The map selector lets you see temperature, precipitation, and other climate anomalies by month for all historical events in a side-by-side map view. A composite image that combines all past event anomalies into a single map is also available. El Niño conditions are currently present in the equatorial Pacific Ocean, and the latest Climate Prediction Center outlook says there's an 80 percent chance El Niño will continue through the Northern Hemisphere spring (March-April 2024).

#### **Farmland Protection Grants Available**

The NYS Department of Agriculture is pleased to announce the availability of funds for the Round 18 Farmland Protection Implementation Grants (FPIG) Program – Conservation Easement Projects. The intent is to fund the implementation of certain farmland protection activities intended to maintain the economic viability of the State's agricultural industry and its supporting land base and to protect the environmental and landscape preservation values associated with agriculture. Grant applications will be accepted on a continuous basis. The RFA will remain open and awards will be made until such time as available funds are fully committed, or the RFA is closed.

## **EV Charging Funding Assistance**

Charge Ready NY 2.0 (PON 5367) is an incentive program that provides \$4,000 per charging port installed at a public facility within a DAC and \$2,000 per charging port installed at a workplace or MUD location upon completion of the installation of charging equipment and the provision of appropriate documentation. An additional incentive of \$500 per port may be awarded for eligible Level 2 charging equipment installed at a workplace or MUD location within a DAC. Equipment Owners at workplace or MUD locations may choose to participate in a bonus program to receive additional incentives. Public and private (for-profit and not-for-profit) entities may participate in the Program. Applicants can be the Equipment Owners or the Installers on behalf of the Equipment Owners. #### Cyanobacteria Concrete Blocks: Biocement

Portland cement, used in concrete, is a major source of carbon emissions due to the heating necessary for its process. Substitutes for this material have included using fly ash, a waste product from coal burning power plants. A new product, Bio-Block is created using cyanobacteria (blue-green algae) to bind the sand and stone together. The photosynthesis of the bacteria consumes carbon dioxide rather than emitting it. The company, Prometheus, is one of a growing number of companies working on biologically produced alternatives to Portland cement. Annually, four billion tons of cement is used worldwide to produce 30 billion tons of concrete, or four tons of concrete per person. If these companies can scale up production of biocements, it will dramatically impact global carbon dioxide emissions. Read more.

Littered cigarette butts: besides ugly to look at, they are hazardous to our kids, pets, wildlife and gardens. When left in the environment, littered cigarette butts <u>leach toxic chemicals</u>, such as arsenic (used to kill rats) and lead, that may be carried as runoff to drains and end up polluting our rivers and lakes right here in Western New York. Because cigarette butts are primarily made of plastic filters that don't biodegrade, the butts that aren't eaten by wildlife simply pile up on shorelines or at the bottom of bodies of water. A study examined the life cycle greenhouse gas emissions from electric cars and combustion engine cars globally. Their analysis showed that only battery electric and hydrogen fuel cell vehicles have the potential to achieve life-cycle GHG emissions reductions needed to meet Paris Agreement goals.

Another sign of climate change, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has released a new version of the Plant Hardiness Zone Map. While we can't grow coffee and bananas here, some parts of Western New York are in new zones reflecting our warming climate. Check it out here.

#### **New York Great Lakes Shore Viewer**

DEC's <u>Great Lakes Program</u> has launched the <u>New York Great Lakes Shore Viewer</u>, an interactive map that allows users to explore approximately 850 miles of New York's Great Lakes shorelines, including Lake Erie, the Niagara River, Lake Ontario, the St. Lawrence River, and many of the larger embayments. The viewer includes coastal oblique aerial imagery of the NY Great Lakes shorelines collected annually by citizen volunteers with the Civil Air Patrol – NY Wing in partnership with the DEC. Routinely updated and publicly accessible coastal oblique imagery is intended to support state resilience programs, promote ecosystem-based shoreline management, and assist with shoreline change monitoring.

## Additional \$25 Million Available for Local Municipalities to Drive Energy Initiatives

Funding is now available under the State's Clean Energy Communities Program for local municipalities to drive high-impact clean energy actions and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The program, which recognizes local clean energy leadership and provides implementation grants, helps reduce municipal energy use, lower costs, and offers additional support for projects located in disadvantaged communities. The <u>Clean Energy Communities Program</u> helps county, city, town, or village governments identify and implement high-impact actions that save energy and cut costs. By achieving Clean Energy Communities designation, participants qualify for grants for additional clean energy projects. With this additional funding, NYSERDA is expanding offerings to include more eligible project options and incentives as well as updating the program's point system for high impact actions. Each high-impact action is worth points that communities collect upon completion of the action. Grant levels will be based on the number of points earned as well as the community's size. In addition, awarded projects located in a New York State <u>disadvantaged community</u> can qualify for an additional 50 percent in funding for grants over \$5,000. Applications for the program will be accepted on a rolling basis through December 31, 2025, or until funds are exhausted, whichever is sooner. Grant applications will be accepted through an <u>online portal</u>.

## **Updated Excess Food Opportunities Map**

EPA's Excess Food Opportunities Map, first released in 2018, displays facility-specific information for potential generators and recipients of excess food in the industrial, commercial and institutional sectors, including estimates of excess food for most generators. The map is a useful resource allowing businesses, organizations, and governments to make connections and find opportunities to make the best use of their excess food. It can be used to inform waste management and food recovery decisions at the local level, as well as to identify potential sources of organic feedstocks, infrastructure gaps and alternatives to landfilling. #### Online Tool to View Earth's Changes

Google Earth Engine's new tool, <u>Dynamic World</u> was built in collaboration with the nonprofit <u>World Resources Institute</u>. Dynamic World pulls from satellite data to create detailed maps in near real-time. It gives users the ability to zoom in on the planet in 10-by-10 meter squares from satellite images collected every two to five days. Artificial intelligence is used to categorize each pixel into nine classes that range from bare ground to trees, crops, and buildings. The tool allows users to explore and track and monitor changes in these terrestrial ecosystems over time.

#### **Annual Rain Barrel Painting Contest for Schools**

To promote education on stormwater issues, Erie County Department of Environment and Planning is sponsoring their annual Rain Barrel Painting Contest. Classes will be provided with a 55 gallon syrup barrel that you will convert into a rain barrel and one rain barrel converter kit.
