Buffalo Audubon Trip to Algonquin Park

Local NYS Birding Trail Additions

DEC recently announced the <u>addition of 12 new locations to the NYS Birding Trail</u>, bringing the total number of sites statewide to 344. The new additions provide visitors with unique experiences, from large preserves and nature centers with diverse habitats to urban oases steeped in history and teeming with wildlife. The newly added locations in the Greater Niagara are Amherst Veterans Canal Park (Erie County) and 8 sites in Buffalo: Cazenovia Park, Delaware Park, Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Centennial Park, Ship Canal Commons/Buffalo Lakeside Commerce Park, South Park (Buffalo Botanical Gardens), Unity Island, Broderick Park and Bird Island Pier.

DEC Launches New York Harmful Algal Blooms Notification and Reporting System

DEC and the NYS Department of Health have started the 2023 online New York Harmful Algal Bloom System (NYHABS) interactive map. DEC is asking the public and trained algal bloom samplers to send reports of HABs with photos electronically via a simple, mobile phone-friendly form. Once evaluated by DEC and DOH, reports are posted to the NYHABS page providing easy access to inform the public about HAB locations in New York. Most algae blooms are harmless. However, exposure to toxins and other substances from certain HABs can make people and animals sick. HABs have been monitored closely across New York State since 2012. DEC's Division of Water recently published an analysis of HABs titled: "Detections of cyanobacteria harmful algal blooms (cyanoHABs) in New York State, United States (2012–2020)."

American Climate Corps Launched

The White House has announced the launch of an American Climate Corps to provide education and training to more than 20,000 young people that will allow them develop the skills needed to fulfill jobs in the growing sectors associated with a clean energy economy. This is great news for advocates who had been hoping for such a program to be included in the bipartisan infrastructure bill that passed in the last congress. The new program--which will be coordinated across six federal agencies-aims to provide paid workforce training and service opportunities in conservation and restoration, community resilience, clean energy technology, and more. 'Clean. Drain. Dry.' Your Watercraft to Protect Waters from Aquatic Invasive Species

DEC reminds boaters to clean, drain, and dry their boats and trailers and disinfect their fishing gear before recreating in New York's waters to prevent the spread of harmful aquatic invasive species (AIS). Watercraft inspection stewards (boat stewards) are deploying across the state to educate and assist the public in cleaning equipment this season to prevent the introduction and spread of non-native plants and animals in New York waterbodies. PFAS: What Are They and Where Do They Come From?

PFAS (per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances) have made headlines this year, but not everyone understands the acronym and impact of these chemicals. PFAS are a group of chemicals which persist in the environment and have been detected in blood samples from most people tested. They are used in many manufacturing processes and have health implications for humans and wildlife. Say No to All Disposable Straws

Plastic straws have been avoided as contributors to our microplastics problem and for harming wildlife. "Eco-friendly" paper drinking straws have their problems too. A new study found that many contain synthetic chemicals known as poly- and perfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). PFAS were found in the majority of the straws tested and were most common in those made from paper and bamboo as reported by the study published in <u>Food Additives and Contaminants</u>.

As of December 23, 2021, all beekeepers in NYS are required to register with Ag and Markets and renew their registration annually regardless of whether you are selling nucleus colonies or queens or not. Heat Pumps: The Basics

Heat pumps are safe, efficient, and versatile. They are an all-in-one heating and cooling system. Cold climate heat pumps are designed to efficiently operate in cold climates like New York State – while also doubling as a cooling system in the summer. Heat pumps are cleaner and more efficient than boilers and furnaces. They don't burn fossil fuels like oil, propane, and natural gas. Heat pumps use electricity to draw thermal energy from the environment. They move that energy indoors to heat your space or move it outdoors to cool your space. While there are three types of heat pumps —air source, ground source, and water source — ground source heat pumps (also known as geothermal) can serve the needs of a single building or be installed in a networked system. Not sure how ground source heat pumps work? This two-minute NYSERDA video explains how they take advantage of the earth's constant temperature (in New York State, that's around 50°F) to efficiently heat and cool buildings. Ground source heat pumps are high efficiency (provide 3-4 times the output for every unit of energy) and require minimal maintenance.

Tick App: Info for you, Data for Science

<u>The Tick App</u> is a free app for your smartphone. The app contains information on ticks and asks you to log your daily activities to help researchers. You can even send pictures of your ticks for identification. Farmland Protection Grants Available

The NYS Department of Agriculture is pleased to announce the availability of funds for the Round 18 Farmland Protection Implementation Grants (FPIG) Program – Conservation Easement Projects. The intent is to fund the implementation of certain farmland protection activities intended to maintain the economic viability of the State's agricultural industry and its supporting land base and to protect the environmental and landscape preservation values associated with agriculture. Grant applications will be accepted on a continuous basis. The RFA will remain open and awards will be made until such time as available funds are fully committed, or the RFA is closed.

A New Exotic Pest in NY: The Elm Zigzag Sawfly

The elm zigzag sawfly (*Aproceros leucopoda*) is an insect that only eats elm leaves and can cause severe defoliation (leaf loss) that threatens tree health. They get their name from the easily recognizable "zigzag" feeding pattern larvae create as they chew through leaves. However, when most of the tree's leaves have been eaten, the zigzag pattern may not always be as clear because larvae will eat all the leaf tissue down to the vein. DEC and Partners Team Up to Knock Out Invasive Species

In early June, DEC partnered with staff from the Western New York Partnership for Regional Invasive Species

Management (WNY PRISM) to control invasive shrubs as part of a reforestation project on Tonawanda Wildlife Management

Area in Genesee and Niagara Counties. Invasive shrubs were treated with herbicide throughout 15-acres of old fields to reduce competition with native trees and shrubs. These small fields have been mowed for decades to keep them open but now we plan to return them to forest to reduce habitat fragmentation and increase young forest. An abundance of desirable native trees and shrubs are already establishing naturally in many areas and several hundred seedlings were also planted this spring. This was part of the WNY PRISM's Crew Assistance Program that works with partners on invasive species management projects.

Make Cigarette Butts Part of Your Cleanups

Littered cigarette butts: besides ugly to look at, they are hazardous to our kids, pets, wildlife and gardens. When left in the environment, littered cigarette butts <u>leach toxic chemicals</u>, such as arsenic (used to kill rats) and lead, that may be carried as runoff to drains and end up polluting our rivers and lakes right here in Western New York. Because cigarette butts are primarily made of plastic filters that don't biodegrade, the butts that aren't eaten by wildlife simply pile up on shorelines or at the bottom of bodies of water. EV Charging Funding Assistance

Charge Ready NY 2.0 (PON 5367) is an incentive program that provides \$4,000 per charging port installed at a public facility within a DAC and \$2,000 per charging port installed at a workplace or MUD location upon completion of the installation of charging equipment and the provision of appropriate documentation. An additional incentive of \$500 per port may be awarded for eligible Level 2 charging equipment installed at a workplace or MUD location within a DAC. Equipment Owners at workplace or MUD locations may choose to participate in a bonus program to receive additional incentives. Public and private (for-profit and not-for-profit) entities may participate in the Program. Applicants can be the Equipment Owners or the Installers on behalf of the Equipment Owners. New York Great Lakes Shore Viewer

DEC's <u>Great Lakes Program</u> has launched the <u>New York Great Lakes Shore Viewer</u>, an interactive map that allows users to explore approximately 850 miles of New York's Great Lakes shorelines, including Lake Erie, the Niagara River, Lake Ontario, the St. Lawrence River, and many of the larger embayments. The viewer includes coastal oblique aerial imagery of the NY Great Lakes shorelines collected annually by citizen volunteers with the Civil Air Patrol – NY Wing in partnership with the DEC. Routinely updated and publicly accessible coastal oblique imagery is intended to support state resilience programs, promote ecosystem-based shoreline management, and assist with shoreline change monitoring.

Purina Recycles Challenge: Pet Owners Do Your Part

The Purina Recycle challenge invites pet owners to film a "trick shot" of them banking a pet food can into the recycling bin and share on Instagram and/or TikTok with the hashtag #PurinaRecyclesChallenge. Updated Great Lakes Action Agenda

DEC has released an updated New York's Great Lakes Action Agenda (GLAA) 2023, a strategic, ecosystem-based action plan to guide restoration and conservation and foster sustainable, resilient communities in New York's Great Lakes region. The GLAA advances efforts to safeguard water quality, improve habitats for fish and wildlife, manage invasive species, promote sustainability, and enhance community resilience to climate change. The region spans more than 40 percent of New York State's land area and includes Lake Erie, the Niagara River, Lake Ontario, the St. Lawrence River, and contributing watersheds. The release of the updated GLAA coincides with the development of the fourth federal action plan for the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI), which will guide federal restoration and protection investments in the region through 2029. Since 2010, nearly \$270 million in GLRI funding has been secured for Great Lakes projects in New York State.

Managing New York Forests for Birds

EPA's Preventing Wasted Food in Your Community: A Social Marketing Toolkit is now available! The toolkit is a resource for states, territories, local governments, Tribes, and nongovernmental organizations who want to start behavior change campaigns to help prevent food waste in their communities. The toolkit includes a planning process that uses social marketing principles to ensure communities are tailoring the campaigns to their communities' needs. The toolkit is accompanied by food waste prevention campaign materials created by municipalities and organizations that are available for use and customization by any community.

Ultrasound Technique May Help Eliminate PFAS from Groundwater.

New research suggests that ultrasound may have potential in treating a group of harmful chemicals known as PFAS (per- and poly-fluoroalkyl substances) to eliminate them from contaminated groundwater. Exposure to these chemicals can cause cancer and other human health issues. Researchers at The Ohio State University have developed a technique that uses ultrasound which emits low-pitched pressure waves that compress and pull apart the solution creating pockets of vapor bubbles. The high temperatures within these tiny bubbles break down the stable carbon-fluorine bonds of PFAS. The method is costly and energy intensive, but may lead to new directions in treating water for these chemicals. Read more.

Updated Excess Food Opportunities Map

EPA's Excess Food Opportunities Map, first released in 2018, displays facility-specific information for potential generators and recipients of excess food in the industrial, commercial and institutional sectors, including estimates of excess food for most generators. The map is a useful resource allowing businesses, organizations, and governments to make connections and find opportunities to make the best use of their excess food. It can be used to inform waste management and food recovery decisions at the local level, as well as to identify potential sources of organic feedstocks, infrastructure gaps and alternatives to landfilling. Help Track Spotted Lanternfly

Spotted lanternfly (SLF) is an invasive pest that feeds on a variety of plants including grapes, hops and maple trees, posing a severe threat to New York State's forests and agriculture. SLF was first found in PA in 2014, and several populations have since been found in NY, including Buffalo as of September 2022. SLF's preferred host plant, tree-of-heaven (TOH), is already found in New York State. Help survey for SLF and TOH by picking a location, surveying it 2-3 times throughout 2023 and reporting your observations. Visit the NY iMapInvasives website to learn about the project and sign up for a grid on the map to monitor.

Online Tool to View Earth's Changes

Google Earth Engine's new tool, <u>Dynamic World</u> was built in collaboration with the nonprofit <u>World Resources Institute</u>. Dynamic World pulls from satellite data to create detailed maps in near real-time. It gives users the ability to zoom in on the planet in 10-by-10 meter squares from satellite images collected every two to five days. Artificial intelligence is used to categorize each pixel into nine classes that range from bare ground to trees, crops, and buildings. The tool allows users to explore and track and monitor changes in these terrestrial ecosystems over time.

Online Environmental Education Course

<u>\$14 billion National Clean Investment Fund</u> will provide grants to support two-to-three national clean financing institutions, enabling them to partner with the private sector to provide accessible, affordable financing for tens of thousands of clean technology projects nationwide. <u>USDA Weed Management</u>-USDA-FS-GLRI-CWMA23. The goal of this program is to detect, prevent, eradicate, and/or control invasive plant species to promote ecological resiliency, watershed stability, and biological diversity on Federal, State, other public or private lands in the Great Lakes Basin. Deadline: **October 23**.

<u>Community Food Projects</u> is a competitive grants program that is administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Institute of Food and Agriculture. Grants are intended to help eligible nonprofits, tribal organizations, and food program service providers in need of a one-time infusion of federal assistance for projects that promote self-sufficiency and food security in low-income communities; \$4,800,000 is available. <u>USDA Conservation Innovation Grants</u>-This year's funding priorities are forestry, habitat conservation and restoration for wildlife and invertebrates, managing agricultural lands to improve local water quality, energy conservation, economics, and strengthening conservation through indigenous knowledge. Strong consideration will be given to proposals that include historically underserved entities and individuals. Deadline: **October 30**.

On-Farm Trial Grants for USDA Conservation Innovation- to stimulate the adoption and evaluation of innovative conservation approaches in partnership with agricultural producers. Applications will be accepted for projects addressing at least one of the following priorities: irrigation management technologies; feed management and enteric methane reduction; grazing lands; nutrient management; and soil health demonstration trials. Deadline: **October 30**.

<u>Grants for Municipal Recycling Coordination and Education Projects</u>-NYSDEC is authorized to provide State assistance for Recycling Coordinator salaries and for public education programs conducted by municipalities. This funding helps expand local recycling programs and increase participation. Deadline: **October 31.**

<u>Community Action Fund</u>- support efforts that include community organizing, amplification of community voices, and utilize a wide variety of tactics imperative to shifting the political and financial systems that are impacting our communities. Areas of emphasis may include: climate justice and racial equity efforts, challenging the extractive industry, accelerating the just energy transition in Indigenous communities, healing justice work within the movement, and training the next generation of community organizers. Deadline: **October 31.**

<u>Toshiba America Foundation Education Grants</u>- awards grants to support innovative STEM educational programs. Middle school and high school teachers can apply for grants > than \$5,000. Deadline: **November 1, 2023**.

<u>Invasive Species Grant Program</u>-NYSDEC is providing funding designed to advance projects that target aquatic and terrestrial invasive species across the state. The grants will support efforts such as reconnecting rivers to their historic floodplains, outplanting corals to rebuild reefs, and building living shorelines that protect coasts from erosion and sea level rise. <u>Climate Ready Workforce for Coastal States, Tribes, and Territories Initiative</u> funding opportunity-NOAA envisions making between 10-20 awards to establish programs aimed at training people for and connecting them with good jobs related to climate resilience and assisting employers in developing a 21st century workforce that is climate literate, informed by climate resilience, and skilled at addressing consequent challenges. Grants to Cut Harmful Diesel Engine Emissions-EPA is soliciting applications nationwide for projects that significantly reduce diesel emissions and exposure, especially from fleets operating at goods movements facilities in areas designated as having poor air quality. Applicants may request funding to upgrade or replace older diesel-powered buses, trucks, marine engines, locomotives and nonroad equipment with newer, cleaner technologies. If you are tossing a lot of food, consider buying smaller amounts or freezing what you can before it needs to be thrown out. Here are some items that can be safely frozen.
- Look out for "greenwashing"-Businesses sometimes stretch their claims about their sustainability. Look beyond the product labels and research a company's practices and record. You can also use <u>Green America's</u> Green Pages to look for sustainable businesses.
