Environmental Bond Act Draft Guidelines for Green Building Projects at State Facilities

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) released for public review and comment draft eligibility guidelines to implement funding under the Clean Water, Clean Air and Green Jobs Environmental Bond Act of 2022 (Bond Act). The proposed guidelines allocate funding for costs associated with green building projects that increase energy efficiency or the use or siting of renewable energy on State-owned buildings. The full eligibility guidelines are available in the Environmental Notice Bulletin. EPA Seeks Community Input on Cleanup Plan for Eighteen Mile Creek Superfund Site in Niagara County

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is inviting the public to comment on its proposed cleanup plan to address contaminated creek sediment and floodplain soil along a portion of the Eighteen Mile Creek Superfund site in Niagara County. The 30-day public comment period runs from July 19 to August 19, 2024. EPA will host a public meeting at **Newfane Townhall located at 2737 Main Street, Newfane, New York on August 1, 2024, at 6:00 p.m.** to discuss the cleanup plan. Draft 30x30 Conservation Strategy Released for Public Review

DEC and the Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation (OPRHP) have announced the release of a proposed strategy document for implementing New York's commitment to support the national goal of conserving 30 percent of U.S. lands and waters by 2030. The draft New York State 30x30 Methodology and Strategies (PDF) document is available for public comment until Aug. 30, 2024, and outlines a comprehensive framework to achieve the directive in the 30x30 legislation signed by Governor Kathy Hochul in December 2022. Buffalo River Area of Concern Plan for Public Review

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) and Buffalo Niagara Waterkeeper (BNW) have updated the public about ongoing efforts to restore natural resources in the Buffalo River Area of Concern (AOC) and the proposed removal of the Fish Tumors and Other Deformities Beneficial Use Impairment (BUI). Public comments on a draft report, which details the completed actions and assessments supporting the BUI removal, is available for public review at the Buffalo Niagara Waterkeeper website. Comments on the draft report and proposed BUI removal may be made through BNW's website, until Aug. 19, 2024.

Proposed Regulations to Protect Freshwater Wetlands

The public is invited to comment on proposed regulations to protect freshwater wetlands. The <u>draft regulations</u> are now available for public comment until September 19 and would safeguard an estimated one million additional acres of unprotected wetland habitat by expanding the number of wetlands regulated by DEC. Virtual public hearings are scheduled September 10 at 1 p.m. and 6 p.m. An in-person public hearing is scheduled September 12 at 1 p.m. at the DEC office at 625 Broadway, Albany, NY. Look Out for Giant Hogweed

Giant hogweed plants are beginning to bloom across many parts of the state, making it a prime time to spot this harmful invasive species. Giant hogweed is a large, flowering plant from Eurasia with sap that can cause painful burns and scarring. Adult giant hogweed plants tend to be 7-14 feet tall with an umbrella-shaped cluster of white flowers up to 2.5 feet wide. The stem is green with purple splotches and coarse white hairs, and leaves are large (up to 5 feet across), incised, and deeply lobed. The most common lookalike found in NY is our native cow parsnip, which flowers earlier and does not have the purple splotches on the stem (but can also cause burns). You can <u>find more identification tips, including a table of other lookalikes,</u> on our website. If you think you have found giant hogweed: Report your sighting to DEC by emailing photos and location information to <u>ghogweed@dec.ny.gov</u> or by calling (845) 256-3111. DEC staff will help you identify whether the plant is giant hogweed and provide you with information about giant hogweed control methods and DEC's control program.

STAMP Permit Terminated, but Fight Continues

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has recently rescinded the permit that would allow construction of the sewage pipeline for the WNY STAMP project. This project would impact the Tonawanda Seneca Nation and their homelands and the Iroquois National Wildlife Refuge! PUSH Buffalo Green Job Training Facility Opens

PUSH Buffalo has opened a new job-training facility on Buffalo's West Side, designed to prepare local residents from minority communities for clean-energy jobs. Funded primarily by state grants, the nonprofit's Sustainability Workforce Training Center represents the first "green" job training center in Western New York. It advances both PUSH's goals to meet climate and energy standards, as well as state efforts to promote a "green economy" and workforce, according to a state press release announcing the opening. It will focus on helping members of the Black, Indigenous and other "disadvantaged" or "underserved" communities to develop the skills needed to gain new jobs in green-energy professions, the group said. It will teach sustainable building practices to create quality affordable housing. The \$2.5 million project includes flexible classrooms, office and meeting spaces, a solar array and a geothermal heating and cooling system. That enables the building to generate as much energy as it uses while also providing a "learning laboratory" for training in renewable energy skills. Trainees will learn about clean-heat, solar and other renewable energy technologies and energy-efficiency upgrades.

Disconnects with Federal Crop Policies and Climate Change Adaptation

Farmers in the US face significant challenges in adapting to climate change because federal crop insurance policies do not support regenerative farming practices. These practices, which include interspersing different crops and using cover crops, can reduce greenhouse gas emissions but are not covered by traditional insurance. The USDA has introduced some reforms, but participation in alternative programs remains low. Advocacy groups are calling for legislative changes to make crop insurance more accommodating to climate-smart farming. Read more.

DEC recently launched an <u>Accessible Recreation Destinations Map</u> designed to showcase wheelchair-accessible features at education centers, campgrounds and day use areas, Wildlife Management Areas, state forests, and waterway access sites. Spotted Lanternfly and Tree-of-Heaven Surveyors Needed

New York State is seeking volunteers like you to look for spotted lanternfly and tree-of-heaven in your area. You can supplement NYS efforts to prevent negative impacts from invasive species by knowing what to look for and how to report observations to New York's official invasive species database, iMapInvasives. What does it take? Pick a location to go to and survey 2-3 times throughout 2024 (once in Spring, Summer, and Fall); check for spotted lanternfly and tree-of-heaven; and report your findings to iMapInvasives. NYSERDA has revised <u>PON 4000</u>: the <u>New York State Clean Energy Internship Program</u>, which provides funding to eligible clean energy businesses, organizations, and local municipalities to hire interns to perform meaningful work in the clean energy sector. Both clean energy businesses and intern candidates can apply to participate in the program. Accepted businesses will select, interview, and hire interns, and NYSERDA provides reimbursement on a percentage of the interns' wages.

Municipal Zero-emission Vehicle (ZEV) Rebate Program—Applications Now Open

The next round of DEC's Municipal Zero-emission Vehicle (ZEV) Rebate Program will provide \$750,000 to municipalities for the purchase or lease of zero-emission light- and medium-duty fleet vehicles. These municipal zero-emission vehicles will help New York achieve the greenhouse gas emission reduction requirements as part of the State's Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (Climate Act). A total of \$750,000 is available from DEC for municipalities to apply for funding on a first-come, first-served basis on a rolling basis through Sept. 27, 2024, or until funds are exhausted, whichever occurs first.

More details can be found in the Request for Applications (RFA) posted on the DEC website. Applications are available through the NYS Statewide Financial System Grants Management System.

Beech Leaf Disease

This <u>article</u> discusses the cause of beech leaf disease (BLD), the lifecycle of this nematode (*Litylenchus crenatae ssp. mccannii*), the symptoms of BLD, and treatments. In spring (May-June), there are few nematodes in diseased leaves, their numbers increase over the summer (July-August) and reach peak numbers in late summer through early fall (September-November). As the numbers build up within the leaves, nematodes will migrate from the infected leaves into to the newly forming buds. Once nematodes reach the new bud, nematodes will feed on the bud tissues, which causes cell enlargement of the bud scale cells and negatively affects the overall architecture of the developing young leaves by increasing their number of cell layers. This damages the next generation of leaves and repeated damage will kill infected beech.

Mercury in Cosmetic and Personal Care Products Law

The Mercury in Cosmetic and Personal Care Products Law took effect on June 1, 2023 making it illegal to sell or offer for sale any cosmetic or personal care product containing mercury, other than in trace amounts. Manufacturers might add mercury to cosmetic and personal care products to reduce the appearance of dark spots and blemishes, and to lighten skin. However, mercury has a high absorption rate that can quickly damage skin and organs. According to the FDA, mercury is readily absorbed through the skin from topical applications and accumulates in the body, giving rise to numerous adverse health effects. If you see a mercury-containing cosmetic or personal care product being sold (or available for purchase) in New York, you can file a complaint, just submit the electronic complaint form.

Farm to School Grant Awardees

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) announced it is awarding a record-breaking \$14.3 million in Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 Patrick Leahy Farm to School Grants. This year's 154 grantees are planning some amazing projects across the country to benefit 1.9 million children with several Western New York recipients getting funds to establish their partnerships. Hamburg Central School District will work with program partners to initiate new agricultural education programming that will complement the existing farm to school program. The Salamanca City Central School District will establish a garden in which indigenous/medicinal plantings and produce will be planted. The garden will be established to not only benefit the Food Services Program by providing fresh fruits and vegetables but will also serve as a learning space for the district students. The Olean City School District will implement a new curriculum that will be embedded beginning in pre-kindergarten through grade 12 and to include tower gardens, a greenhouse, and field trips to different types of farms. Also, a garden club, chef contest, agricultural science fair, and participation in the local farmers market will be implemented.

Littered cigarette butts: besides ugly to look at, they are hazardous to our kids, pets, wildlife and gardens. When left in the environment, littered cigarette butts <u>leach toxic chemicals</u>, such as arsenic (used to kill rats) and lead, that may be carried as runoff to drains and end up polluting our rivers and lakes right here in Western New York. Because cigarette butts are primarily made of plastic filters that don't biodegrade, the butts that aren't eaten by wildlife simply pile up on shorelines or at the bottom of bodies of water. Road Marker Technology Could Cool Cities by up to 20°C

Engineers are using retroreflector technology, based on prisms and reflective materials, to direct sunlight back into the sky and out of the urban environment. Equipping building walls and roadways with these retroreflective materials could reduce urban temperatures by up to 20°C, they report in the journal *Nature Cities*. It should also notably improve air temperatures and human skin temperatures.

Types of Electric Vehicle Charging

Are you thinking about getting an electric vehicle but don't understand the charging options and times? There are several ways to charge depending on location and outlet voltage. For home charging: with Level 1 you plug into your standard 120V outlet, but charging is slower; level 2 uses a 240V outlet (similar to an electric dryer) and full charge is between 4-6 hours. For public charging: level 2 uses 240V chargers and can be found at shopping centers, schools, etc., while level 3 uses 480V and allows fast charging in 30 minutes-these chargers are most often found at thruway rest stops. Certain electric vehicles do have tax credits associated with their purchasing. Check out the list and info.

Resumption of Aircraft-Based Survey of Erie and Niagara Counties

The aerial radiological survey of Erie and Niagara counties was suspended last fall due to weather-related complications. Flights are expected to continue through this summer. This survey is being completed in partnership with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). This survey is being conducted by a single-engine, low-flying plane called the Airborne Spectral Photometric Environmental Collection Technology (ASPECT). The plane is equipped with a suite of sensors for measuring potential radiation sources. The various sensors on the plane generate data to help assess the presence of material at ground level that could contain radiological material. Photographs of property will not be taken during the flyover. Western New York was a hub for the manufacturing of atomic weapon components during World War II and other industries using or producing radiologic materials. This aerial survey is being performed out of an abundance of caution to provide the most current and scientific information to complement a similar aerial radiological survey of the region that was previously conducted in 1984 that assessed the extent of potential use and distribution of biproducts and waste material containing radiological material.

P2I's Greenhouse Gas Emissions Courses

The New York State Pollution Prevention Institute (P2I) has released two climate change courses that are free and available for anyone to complete online at their own pace. The <u>Greenhouse Gas Basics Course</u> provides an overview of the fundamentals of Greenhouse Gases (GHGs) and explains how GHGs impact climate change. It describes how to quantify and compare GHG emissions and characterize Scope 1, 2, and 3 emissions. The course is designed for anyone that wants to understand the basics of GHGs, such as corporate leadership, sustainability professionals, and concerned citizens. The <u>Greenhouse Gas Emission Reduction Potential</u> (GHG ERP) Course is geared more towards businesses that want to quantify their GHG emissions. It explains how to <u>estimate</u> potential GHG reductions associated with a product, technology or system. This course was designed for technology start-up companies but may also be useful for anyone looking to reduce the carbon footprint of their business. P2I's Greenhouse Gas Emission courses were made possible through funding provided by the Environmental Protection Fund as administered by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation.

Pool Owners: Check for Asian Longhorned Beetles

DEC asks pool owners to check filters for the invasive Asian Longhorned Beetles (ALB) regularly, and submit a report if any are found. ALB attacks and kills maples, birches, willows, and other hardwoods. They emerge from infested trees in the late summer to find a new host. The beetles are 1.5 inches long, have long black-and-white antennae, and have black and white spots on their body. They should not be confused with the native white-spotted pine sawyer, which has a distinctive white spot on their back, below their head. No pool? You can still help! Be on the lookout for ALB exit holes, sawdust accumulating at the base of trees, oozing sap, or pits in bark. If found: Email photos to the Forest Health Program; or Mail insects to DEC's Forest Health Diagnostics Lab for identification.

Climate Impacts of Plastics

According to a recent report published by United Nations Partner GRID-Arendal, "between 3.8 and 4.5 percent of global greenhouse gas emissions" are emitted throughout the lifecycle of plastics (2024, p. 3). This report, *Climate Impacts of Plastics*, focuses on the opportunity posed by UNEA Resolution 5/14 ("End plastic pollution: Towards an international legally binding instrument") to advance global efforts and accountability in addressing the climate impacts of plastics. Free Access to Parks, Campgrounds, and More for Veterans and Gold Star Families

New York State veterans and Gold Star Families will have free access to New York State parks, campgrounds, day use areas, historic sites and recreations through the expansion of the Lifetime Liberty Pass Program. A disability rating is no longer required, and all Veterans and certain Gold Star Family members who are residents of New York State are now eligible for this pass. Benefits include: Free vehicle entry to State Parks and DEC-operated campgrounds and day use areas, boat launch sites, historic sites, arboretums, and park preserves, Free greens fees at State Park-operated golf courses, Free swimming pool entrance to pools operated by State Parks and Discounted campsite and cabin rentals at State Parks- and DEC-operated campgrounds (applied at the time of check-in). Apply for the pass.

Help Prevent Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease from Harming New York's Rabbits and Hares

Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) is a fatal virus that affects rabbits and hares. A new strain, RHDV2, jumped to wild rabbits and hares in 2020 in the southwestern U.S., where it spread to six states within four months. The virus can infect wild rabbits and hares in addition to domestic rabbits. RHDV2 is extremely hardy, easily transmitted, and highly lethal to rabbits and hares. It does not infect humans or other animals like dogs or cats. RHDV2 spreads easily through direct contact between rabbits or contact with contaminated environments or objects. The most likely routes of introduction to New York are through transported domestic rabbits, internationally imported rabbit products, or people who travel to outbreak areas in the Southwest. Read the RHDV2 factsheet (PDF) to learn more about how it spreads, ways to prevent it, and what you can do to help.

Heat Pump Water Heaters

Replacing an inefficient water heater with a heat pump water heater represents a prime opportunity to cut home energy costs and greenhouse gas emissions. Water heaters may account for up to 20% of the energy consumption in an average household. By switching to an energy-efficient heat pump water heater, households can save hundreds of dollars. These heat pump water heaters are also eligible for New York State incentives and Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) tax credits. Read more.

Online Tool to View Earth's Changes

Google Earth Engine's new tool, <u>Dynamic World</u> was built in collaboration with the nonprofit <u>World Resources Institute</u>. Dynamic World pulls from satellite data to create detailed maps in near real-time. It gives users the ability to zoom in on the planet in 10-by-10 meter squares from satellite images collected every two to five days. Artificial intelligence is used to categorize each pixel into nine classes that range from bare ground to trees, crops, and buildings. The tool allows users to explore and track and monitor changes in these terrestrial ecosystems over time.

Statewide Greenhouse Gas Emissions Report

DEC's 2023 Statewide Greenhouse Gas Emissions Report describes statewide GHG emissions from 1990 to 2021, expressed in tons of carbon dioxide equivalents, from all sources in the state. This annual inventory tracks trends of greenhouse gas emissions as part of the State's ongoing implementation of the Climate Act and helps to measure progress in reducing GHG emissions across various economic sectors.
