Public Hearings on STAMP

On **Monday, February 3, 2025**, STAMP developer Genesee County Economic Development Center will host a series of public hearings on proposed incentives to each of the three investor groups currently applying to site a data center at STAMP. The Western New York Science and Technology Advanced Manufacturing Park (<u>STAMP</u>) project is a proposed 1,263-acre industrial "mega-site" located in Alabama, NY, next to the Tonawanda Seneca Nation, and surrounded by the Iroquois National Wildlife Refuge, Tonawanda Wildlife Management Area, and John White Wildlife Management Area.

If you're able to attend the hearing in person, please come express your comments. You can also tune in to the livestream. Snowy Owls & Lemmings: 35 Years of Predator-Prey Dynamics in the Arctic

Denver Holt, founder of the Owl Research Institute (ORI), will share insights from 35 years of dedicated snowy owl research in Utqiagvik /Barrow, Alaska on **February 7** at 121 Cooke Hall, UB North (<u>zoom</u> option). He will highlight the intricate relationship between snowy owls and their primary prey, the lemming, and explore the alarming declines both species have faced at that location over the recent decades. Holt will discuss the critical role of predator-prey dynamics in Arctic ecosystems, the potential causes of these population shifts, and why understanding these changes is essential for conservation efforts. This presentation offers a rare glimpse into the nuances of Arctic wildlife and the ongoing challenges they face. Bailey Ave Bus Rapid Transit Public Meetings

The community is encouraged to attend one of three public meetings sponsored by the Niagara Frontier Transportation Authority for the Bailey Ave Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Project. Meetings are **Feb. 6** (5-7pm at 2515 Bailey), **Feb. 8** (11am to 1pm at 2061 Bailey) and **Feb. 13** (5:30-7pm via zoom-register). The in-person open-house meetings will allow attendees to share their feedback on the overall project and intersection concepts. Under the plan, a bus rapid transit line will be built along Bailey Avenue in Buffalo from Main Street in the north to South Park Avenue in the south thanks to a \$102.7 million federal grant. The 7.5-mile route will feature dedicated bus lanes, an estimated 13 stations with waiting areas, improved signaling and safety features for bicyclists and pedestrians.

Tardigrades & Silkworms: Nature's Secret to Smarter Seed Coatings

Inspired by the silk produced by silkworms and by the tardigrades, also known as water bears - the microscopic animals that can survive the most extreme conditions - Ivu Biologics has developed a seed coating solution that extends the shelf-life of the microbe-embedded seed coatings, ultimately increasing crop yields, restoring soil health, reducing need for conventional fertilizers and pesticides while being biodegradable. National Strategy to Prevent Plastic Pollution

EPA published the "National Strategy to Prevent Plastic Pollution," part three in EPA's Series on Building a Circular Economy for All. In the strategy, EPA shares actions that governments, businesses, non-profits, and consumers can take to eliminate the release of plastic waste into the environment. EPA also outlines interventions across the entire plastic life cycle to reduce the U.S. contribution to plastic pollution. This final strategy incorporates public feedback and affirms EPA's commitment to eliminating the release of plastic waste into the environment by 2040.

Food Waste Methane Emissions Report

ReFED, a U.S.-based nonprofit working to catalyze the food system toward evidence-based action to stop wasting food, released a report on the methane impacts of food loss and waste in the U.S. with support from the Global Methane Hub. The report accompanies an update to ReFED's Impact Calculator, which has long calculated overall greenhouse gas emissions from food waste in different scenarios. ReFED also added new data and features to its Insights Engine. Access the full methane report from ReFED.

Seagull: Connecting people to the Great Lakes

The Great Lakes Observing System (GLOS) is a nonprofit that provides data science, policy, and management support to the U.S. and Canada. Last year, they released <u>Seagull</u>, a slick data platform that brings real-time weather and water data to users. Seagull offers live conditions, lake trend information, and forecast models.

Patagonia Launces Video: "Welcome to the Age of Cheap Crap"

The Shitthropocene is a mock anthropological view of humanity's consumption habits, turning a satirical (yet brutally honest) eye on how everything is turning to shit and why the impulse towards more might destroy us all. You might have noticed that a lot of things seem to suck right now. This <u>film</u> isn't about all the things that suck, but it is about consumption, which is both a cause and a symptom. For a bunch of reasons, pretty much everyone is making and buying too much stuff, which we are evolutionarily programmed to want.

Fungal Battery is Biodegradable

Researchers have 3D printed a small battery using fungi, cellulose and carbon which produces enough electricity for small sensors and it can tossed into compost to degrade once its work is done. The work appears in the journal <u>ACS Sustainable</u> <u>Chemistry & Engineering</u>. To make the battery, they mixed the fungal cells separately into cellulose-based inks, and added carbon particles to the inks to increase conductivity. Then they use the inks to 3D print a battery. The devices can be stored in a dried state. Putting them to use would simply require activating and growing the fungal cells inside the inks using water and simple sugars.

Road Salt: Problem, Solution and How to Get There

Road salt is an emerging pollutant in snow-belt regions. In this <u>recorded video</u>, Vicky Kelly from Cary Institute of Ecosystem Studies covers the history of road salt use, where we find salt in the environment today, some co-occurring issues related to road salt such as lead in water, and how to reduce road salt pollution without sacrificing safety.

Funding for Clean Energy Business Interns

NYSERDA has revised <u>PON 4000</u>: the <u>New York State Clean Energy Internship Program</u>, which provides funding to eligible clean energy businesses, organizations, and local municipalities to hire interns to perform meaningful work in the clean energy sector. Both clean energy businesses and intern candidates can apply to participate in the program. Accepted businesses will select, interview, and hire interns, and NYSERDA provides reimbursement on a percentage of the interns' wages.

EV Charging Funding Assistance

Charge Ready NY 2.0 (PON 5367) is an incentive program that provides \$4,000 per charging port installed at a public facility within a DAC and \$2,000 per charging port installed at a workplace or MUD location upon completion of the installation of charging equipment and the provision of appropriate documentation. An additional incentive of \$500 per port may be awarded for eligible Level 2 charging equipment installed at a workplace or MUD location within a DAC. Equipment Owners at workplace or MUD locations may choose to participate in a bonus program to receive additional incentives. Public and private (for-profit and not-for-profit) entities may participate in the Program. EPA Chemical Dashboard Available for Free Use

The CompTox Chemicals Dashboard (Dashboard), built and maintained by EPA researchers, is well-designed and suitable for scientists to use in their research. The Dashboard includes information on over 1.2 million chemicals from different domains, including physicochemical, environmental fate and transport (i.e., where chemicals go and how they get there), exposure, usage, *in vivo* (in a living organism) toxicity, and *in vitro* (outside of a living organism) bioassay data. The Dashboard provides an interface that allows for an interactive user experience and is easy to navigate, even for users without any programming experience.

Penn Dixie Receives Grant to Improve Park and Restore Ecosystem

Penn Dixie Fossil Park & Nature Reserve is thrilled to announce a new \$17,433 grant from the Great Lakes Commission (GLC) through Great Lakes Restoration Initiative in partnership with the United States Geological Survey (USGS). This funding supports the eradication of the invasive plant species Phragmites australis from the park through the Phragmites Adaptive Management Framework's (PAMF) Active Adaptive Management Program (AAMP).

The spread of *Phragmites australis*, an aquatic plant introduced to the U.S. from Europe, has posed significant challenges to native ecosystems across the country. Due to its rapid growth and dominance, it often outcompetes native plant species, disrupting the balance of otherwise thriving habitats. By removing this invasive species, Penn Dixie aims to dramatically enhance the biodiversity and health of its local ecosystem, a crucial development for the 54 acre park.

Potential Link between Glyphosate and Alzheimer's

A study published in the *Journal of Neuroinflammation* reveals that the commonly used weedkiller glyphosate can accelerate Alzheimer's Disease (AD)-like pathology and cause lasting brain inflammation. Research has shown links between environmental exposure to toxins – through air pollution, poor dietary balance and agricultural chemicals – with the onset of neurodegenerative disease. While the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) deems glyphosate safe for human exposure at current levels, the World Health Organization's International Agency for Research on Cancer classified it as "possibly carcinogenic to humans" in 2015. Beyond its potential link to cancer, recent research has highlighted glyphosate's effects on other parts of the body, including the brain. Glyphosate can cross the blood-brain barrier, a protective shield that typically prevents harmful substances from entering the brain.

Edible Coffee Cups Could Reduce Disposable Items

To help reduce the waste that is generated by soccer fans, Manchester City is serving hot drinks in <u>edible coffee cups</u> produced by BioBite as part of an effort to promote environmental sustainability and to minimize litter in general. The cups, which are vessels for hot beverages are made of wafer that remains crispy for at least half the duration of the game and leak-proof for up to 12 hours. To prevent the bottom of the edible cup from touching any questionable surfaces, the lower half of the cup is wrapped in a recycled paper label that can also be recycled again after the cup has been eaten. The wafer contains no sugar, wax, or artificial coatings, and is comprised of seven natural, vegan ingredients (mainly wheat flour, oat bran, and water). The cups taste like a thin cookie dunked in coffee and are only around 100 calories, but even if people prefer not to eat the cup, the club ensures that the cups can be disposed of as compostable waste stream.

Importance of Preserving Biodiversity: Nature's Solutions

As society looks for options to address forever chemicals, polar bears may hold one answer. Despite thermal insulation provided by blubber and fur layers and low Arctic temperatures, their fur is typically observed to be free of ice. A recent study investigated the anti-icing properties of polar bear fur which exhibits low ice adhesion strengths comparable to fluorocarbon-coated fibers, due to their hair grease. Chemicals found in their greasy hair may offer healthier alternatives for coatings. For more, https://www.science.org/doi/10.1126/sciadv.ads7321

Food from CO2: Future Technology

Chinese researchers have developed an innovative method to convert carbon dioxide (CO2) and electricity into single-cell protein (SCP). The bioprocess uses a dual-reactor system that integrates anaerobic and aerobic processes. In the first phase, microbial electrosynthesis (MES) is used to convert CO2 into acetate, an essential intermediate. This acetate is then fed into the second reactor, where aerobic bacteria from the genus *Alcaligenes* produce SCP. The system has proven to be highly efficient, yielding an impressive protein concentration of 74%, significantly surpassing conventional protein sources like fish meal and soybean. This high-quality protein can be used as an additive in animal feed, improving livestock health and productivity. The process has large implications for using carbon emissions as well as reducing food insecurity.

Environmental Value of Applying Compost

The EPA released a new report titled The Environmental Value of Applying Compost: Improving Soil Health for Stormwater Management, Contaminated Site Remediation, Ecosystem Restoration, Landscaping and Agriculture. The report synthesizes the published science on the benefits of compost use in various sectors and examines potential benefits of increasing use of compost at scales that better align with the volume of organic materials (e.g. food waste) available for composting. Calculator for Food Waste Methane Diversion

The EPA <u>Avoided Landfilled Food Waste Methane Emissions Calculator</u> is now available. The calculator can be used to estimate the methane emissions avoided per ton of food waste by diverting food waste from landfills over time. The calculator uses the same food waste and landfill characteristics as the 2023 <u>EPA report on methane emissions from landfilled food waste</u>, and also uses factors from EPA's Waste Reduction Model (WARM). Anyone can download and use the calculator, including state, Tribal and local governments, institutions, NGOs and private companies, and results may be useful for grant applications, program planning, and reporting.

Grant and Scholarship Opportunities

<u>Kids to Parks Day School Grants Program</u> awards under-resourced U.S. schools to help students discover and explore parks, historic sites, public lands, and waters. Title I, pre-K through 12 classrooms in the U.S. and its territories are eligible to apply for grants of up to \$1,000 for in-park experiences. Deadline: **February 7.**

<u>Zabar Scholarships</u>- Preservation League of New York State is pleased to offer academic scholarships to support the next generation of preservation leaders. Three \$2,500 scholarships will be awarded during the 2025 spring semester to students currently studying preservation or a related field. Deadline is **February 14, 2025.**

Proposed Ambient Water Quality Guidance Values for Phosphorus

DEC has announced the <u>release of draft water quality guidance values</u> to regulate phosphorus in New York State surface waters. Excess phosphorus can contribute to harmful algal blooms (HABs), lower dissolved oxygen levels, increased turbidity, and excessive growth of algae and aquatic plants. The draft guidance values are supplemented by draft updates to DEC's phosphorus permitting strategy and establish a process for prioritizing and reducing phosphorus loads from wastewater treatment plants. The TOGS are being released for a 60-day public comment period that **closes February 24**, **2025.** The full text of the draft TOGS documents and additional supporting information can be found on DEC's website.

USDA-FDA Requesting Information About Food Date Labeling

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and the U.S Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced a joint Request for Information (RFI) about food date labeling, which includes the usage of terms such as "Sell By," "Use By" and "Best By." The RFI seeks information on industry practices and preferences for date labeling, research results on consumer perceptions of date labeling, and any impact date labeling may have on food waste and grocery costs.

For example, questions in the RFI include which products contain date labels and what criteria are used to decided what phrase to use and what date to include. The RFI also asks questions about how consumers interpret date label information, including whether consumers are confused by this information – especially if they believe the dates determine whether food is safe when in fact, they indicate quality – or whether it has impacts on decisions made while grocery shopping or discarding food. Finally, there are questions that explore any relationship between date labels, food waste, and household expenses. **Commenters will have until March 5 to provide comments (extended deadline).** Further information on how to submit a comment can be found in the Federal Register.
