Holiday Tree Drop Offs

Did you know that you can recycle your Christmas trees for composting or other uses? In Niagara County, undecorated real trees can be dropped off until January 13 in front of our office at Niagara County Soil and Water at 4487 Lake Ave. Lockport (County fairgrounds). City of Buffalo residents can drop off Christmas trees, branches, brush, leaves, and other yard waste Monday through Friday from 7:30 AM–3:30 PM. To ensure that your tree is composted, drop off at Geiter Done of WNY, 383 Babcock Ave. (enter off Dorothy). For other residents, check with your towns for collections with yard waste. You can also put the tree outside in your yard or woods for a great bird and small animal habitat.

2025 Explore Buffalo Winter History Course

Explore Buffalo is offering a history program over three nights (7pm on **January 23, 30, February 6**) that tracks the evolution of Niagara and Lafayette Squares, and the Court Street corridor from their original design in the Ellicott plan up to modern times. We will learn how Lafayette Square evolved from a park to Courthouse Square to a traffic circle to a roadway and back to being a square, and why it is called Lafayette Square. Nagara Square began as a big intersection, and before it assumed its McKinley Monument configuration, there were plans in 1874 for a Civil War arch designed by HH Richardson. In 1916, EB Green presented extensive plans to the City Council for a major complex of government and civic buildings on Niagara Square. Once a residential area, the mansions of Millard Fillmore, Sam Wilkeson and other prominent Buffalonians came down and were replaced by the Statler, City Hall and the buildings we know around Niagara Square today. National Strategy to Prevent Plastic Pollution

EPA published the "National Strategy to Prevent Plastic Pollution," part three in EPA's Series on Building a Circular Economy for All. In the strategy, EPA shares actions that governments, businesses, non-profits, and consumers can take to eliminate the release of plastic waste into the environment. EPA also outlines interventions across the entire plastic life cycle to reduce the U.S. contribution to plastic pollution. This final strategy incorporates public feedback and affirms EPA's commitment to eliminating the release of plastic waste into the environment by 2040.

Food Waste Methane Emissions Report

ReFED, a U.S.-based nonprofit working to catalyze the food system toward evidence-based action to stop wasting food, released a report on the methane impacts of food loss and waste in the U.S. with support from the Global Methane Hub. The report accompanies an update to ReFED's Impact Calculator, which has long calculated overall greenhouse gas emissions from food waste in different scenarios. Hemlock Wooly Adelgid Biocontrol Released at Rattlesnake Hill

DEC's Forest Health crew in region 8 assisted the New York State Hemlock Initiative in releasing 2,042 *Laricobius nigrinus* at Rattlesnake Hill Wildlife Management Area on October 23. *Laricobius nigrinus*, a species of beetle affectionately nicknamed "Little Lari", is a biological control predator of the invasive Hemlock Wooly Adelgid (HWA). Prior to their release, these predators underwent thorough laboratory testing to verify that they are highly unlikely to pose a threat to our environment. Let's hope that the beetles will successfully settle into their new home and begin to protect our hemlocks by feasting on HWA!

Web-Based Map of Accessible Recreation Features Now Available

DEC recently launched an <u>Accessible Recreation Destinations Map</u> designed to showcase wheelchair-accessible features at education centers, campgrounds and day use areas, Wildlife Management Areas, state forests, and waterway access sites. The Accessible Recreation Destinations Map displays 266 destinations across New York State with wheelchair accessible outdoor recreation opportunities.

Continued Temporary Closure at Great Baehre Swamp Wildlife Management Area

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) has temporarily closed the boardwalk at Great Baehre Swamp Wildlife Management Area (WMA), including the town of Amherst's Billy Wilson Park boardwalk in DEC Region 9 until early January. The entirety of the boardwalk—from the south along Hopkins Road to the Billy Wilson Park—will remain closed to public access during construction. The Great Baehre Swamp WMA comprises 27 acres of State land adjacent to the town of Amherst's Billy Wilson Park. DEC acquired the land in 1989 by DEC with funding provided by the Environmental Quality Bond Act of 1986. The town of Amherst, under a stewardship agreement, constructed a 1,300-foot boardwalk through the area, which connects state land to their neighboring park. Info about Great Baehre Swamp WMA.

Concrete Made with Coffee: a Buzz in Australia

"Coffee concrete," which contains biochar made from spent coffee grounds as a replacement for river sand, has been used in a major infrastructure project in Pakenham, Australia. Researchers say the novel material for the project has diverted 140,000 coffees worth of grounds from reaching a landfill while saving more than 3 metric tons of sand. Read <u>more</u>.

NYSERDA has revised <u>PON 4000</u>: the <u>New York State Clean Energy Internship Program</u>, which provides funding to eligible clean energy businesses, organizations, and local municipalities to hire interns to perform meaningful work in the clean energy sector. Both clean energy businesses and intern candidates can apply to participate in the program. Accepted businesses will select, interview, and hire interns, and NYSERDA provides reimbursement on a percentage of the interns' wages.

Open Air Capture of Carbon Dioxide

Today's carbon capture technologies work well only for concentrated sources of carbon, such as power plant exhaust. The same methods cannot efficiently capture carbon dioxide from ambient air, where concentrations are hundreds of times lower than in flue gases. Yet direct air capture, or DAC, would reverse the rise of CO₂ levels, now 426 parts per million (ppm), 50% higher than levels before the Industrial Revolution. Without DAC, according to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, we won't reach humanity's goal of limiting warming to 1.5 °C (2.7 °F) above preexisting global averages.

Chemists at the University of California, Berkeley have developed a new type of absorbing material which could help get the world to negative emissions. The porous material, a covalent organic framework (COF), captures CO_2 from ambient air without degradation by water or other contaminants, one of the limitations of existing DAC technologies. The new material could be substituted easily into carbon capture systems already deployed or being piloted to remove CO_2 from refinery emissions and capture atmospheric CO_2 for storage underground. White Paper Release: The Circular Construction Economy in New York State and Beyond

Cornell University's Circular Construction Lab and Just Places Lab, and <u>CROWD</u> recently announced the publication of a white paper, "Constructing a Circular Economy in New York State: Deconstruction and Building Material Reuse."

The white paper envisions a transition from a linear construction economy based on a take-make-dispose model, to a circular construction economy focused on reduction, reuse, and recycling. It provides an analysis of the current linear construction economy, recommendations for how New York State can reduce waste from the built environment, and the potential benefits including increased revenue, green jobs, and reduction of greenhouse gas emissions. Community Change Grant Awarded Locally

PUSH Buffalo, along with local community groups including CoNECT, Erie County Restorative Justice Coalition, Clean Air, the Community Foundation for Greater Buffalo, the University at Buffalo, Eat Off Art, and Silo City, have been granted a \$20 million Communities Change Grant by the Biden Administration and Environmental Protection Agency. Made possible by President Biden's Inflation Reduction Act, the Community Change Grants Program is the single largest investment in environmental and climate justice in history. These dollars will fund local, on-the-ground projects that reduce pollution, increase community climate resilience, and build community capacity.

Empire State Development Launches Small Business Environmental Support Office

Empire State Development (ESD) announced the opening of the new Small Business Environmental Support Office (SBESO), designed to help small businesses understand and comply with federal and state environmental regulations involving air, water, solid and hazardous waste, petroleum and chemical bulk storage, and other important environmental standards. EV Charging Funding Assistance

Charge Ready NY 2.0 (PON 5367) is an incentive program that provides \$4,000 per charging port installed at a public facility within a DAC and \$2,000 per charging port installed at a workplace or MUD location upon completion of the installation of charging equipment and the provision of appropriate documentation. An additional incentive of \$500 per port may be awarded for eligible Level 2 charging equipment installed at a workplace or MUD location within a DAC. Equipment Owners at workplace or MUD locations may choose to participate in a bonus program to receive additional incentives. Public and private (for-profit and not-for-profit) entities may participate in the Program. Buffalo Zoo's Ongoing Amphibian Conservation

Along with the Puerto Rican Crested Toad Conservancy (PRCTC), the Buffalo Zoo oversaw breeding toads that produced over 200 tadpoles this year, the 40th year that the zoo has participated. Those tadpoles have since made it to Puerto Rico, where they will be acclimated in man-made ponds and monitored until they metamorphose and disperse. Puerto Rican crested toads are considered endangered and through projects with other partners, over 795,000 tadpoles have been released. The Puerto Rican crested toad became the first amphibian Species Survival Plan program under the Association of Zoos and Aquariums in 1984. That same year, the Buffalo Zoo was one of the first zoos to propagate the species. The Puerto Rican crested toad SSP program became the Puerto Rican Crested Toad Conservancy in 2021, and currently, 18 institutions participate in reintroduction efforts.

\$4.5 Million in New Grant Funding to Establish Large Forests

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is offering \$4.5 million in funding through the Establishing Large Forests (ELF) Grant Program for private landowners to establish new forests, expanding on New York State's popular Regenerate NY Forestry Cost Share Grant Program to support the creation of new forests crucial for mitigating climate change, providing wildlife habitat, protecting air and water quality, and supplying timber, an important renewable resource. Private landowners (or their representatives) with five or more acres of unforested land in New York State may apply for a minimum of \$30,000 up to a maximum of \$750,000 to reimburse costs for establishing new forests. Eligible projects include but are not limited to preparing sites and planting trees and associated forest vegetation, removing competing or invasive vegetation interfering with seedling establishment and growth, and protecting new plantings from deer browse with fencing. Additional consideration will be given to applications with projects that cover large areas. Applications will be accepted until 3 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 7, 2025. Potential Link between Glyphosate and Alzheimer's

A study published in the <u>Journal of Neuroinflammation</u> reveals that the commonly used weedkiller glyphosate can accelerate Alzheimer's Disease (AD)-like pathology and cause lasting brain inflammation. Research has shown links between environmental exposure to toxins – through air pollution, poor dietary balance and agricultural chemicals – with the onset of neurodegenerative disease. While the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) deems glyphosate safe for human exposure at current levels, the World Health Organization's International Agency for Research on Cancer classified it as "possibly carcinogenic to humans" in 2015. Beyond its potential link to cancer, recent research has highlighted glyphosate's effects on other parts of the body, including the brain. Glyphosate can cross the blood-brain barrier, a protective shield that typically prevents harmful substances from entering the brain.

"Invasive Shrimp: No Small Matter" introduces students to human impacts on ecosystems by discussing introduced versus invasive species, movement of aquatic species through global shipping channels, and methods scientists use to track species across the globe. Students will work in groups to track the movement of invasive Oriental grass shrimp (*Palaemon macrodactylus*) over time using the Global Biodiversity Information Facility (GBIF) database. Draft Guidelines for Infrastructure Projects That Protect Drinking Water from Harmful Algal Blooms

DEC has released for public review and comment draft <u>eligibility guidelines to implement funding under the Clean Water, Clean Air and Green Jobs Environmental Bond Act of 2022 (Bond Act)</u>. The Water Quality Improvement Project (WQIP) grant program, and others where applicable, will make Bond Act funding available on a competitive basis to eligible entities to implement projects that reduce the adverse impacts of harmful algal blooms (HABs) on water quality and associated uses. Public comments on the draft guidelines will be accepted **until 5 p.m. Friday, January 10, 2025.**

DEC Seeks Input on Draft List of Species of Greatest Conservation Need

DEC is seeking public input on the draft list of Species of Greatest Conservation Need and associated species status assessments for use in updating New York's State Wildlife Action Plan for 2025-35. The State Wildlife Action Plan (SWAP) guides management actions for New York's Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SGCN) and is a requirement for New York to participate in the federally funded State and Tribal Wildlife Grants Program. SGCN are species native to and extant in New York that are currently experiencing threats likely to result in further decline of their populations in the state if conservation actions are not implemented within the next 10 years. Implementation of the SWAP aligns with and supports Goal 4 of New York's Great Lakes Action Agenda to conserve and restore native fish and wildlife and their habitats. The draft SGCN list and revised species status assessments are available to download from DEC's website. The public can also nominate a new SGCN, or propose a species be removed from the list. Anyone interested in providing data, updates, or other comments pertaining to the nomination of a new SGCN can download copies of a blank form from the website, populate one form per species, and send to nyswap2025@dec.ny.gov by Jan. 14, 2025. Please include "Draft SGCN List" in the subject line.

Public Comment: Landfill Emissions Regulations

As part of EPA's strategy to learn more about new and emerging technologies and alternative methodologies for regulating emissions from municipal solid waste landfills, EPA opened a non-regulatory docket to gather input on ways we can streamline, improve, and harmonize the current suite of emissions regulations that cover these sources. Please comment by **January 23, 2025.** EPA encourages all interested parties, including technology developers, landfill operators, communities with environmental justice concerns, environmental justice leaders, environmental groups, and state, local, and Tribal air agencies, to provide input and comments on the white papers in the non-regulatory docket. The Agency will provide a separate opportunity for public comment on any future proposed rulemaking(s) for municipal solid waste landfills through a formal comment period announced in the Federal Register. USDA-FDA Requesting Information About Food Date Labeling

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and the U.S Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced a joint Request for Information (RFI) about food date labeling, which includes the usage of terms such as "Sell By," "Use By" and "Best By." The RFI seeks information on industry practices and preferences for date labeling, research results on consumer perceptions of date labeling, and any impact date labeling may have on food waste and grocery costs. For example, questions in the RFI include which products contain date labels and what criteria are used to decided what phrase to use and what date to include. The RFI also asks questions about how consumers interpret date label information, including whether consumers are confused by this information — especially if they believe the dates determine whether food is safe when in fact, they indicate quality — or whether it has impacts on decisions made while grocery shopping or discarding food. Finally, there are questions that explore any relationship between date labels, food waste, and household expenses. Commenters will have until January 31 to provide comments responsive to one or more of the 13 questions posed. Further information on how to submit a comment can be found in the Federal Register.

Revised Project Scoring for Clean Water State Revolving Fund

The New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation (EFC) held a webinar on December 17 regarding proposed changes to the project scoring criteria for the Clean Water State Revolving Fund. The webinar recording is now available. Find the proposed criteria (PDF) on EFC's website. EFC is accepting public comments until 5 p.m. on February 18. Submit comments to General Counsel and Secretary to the Board Henrik Westin at cWSRFinfo@efc.ny.gov with "Regulation Comments" in the subject line.

Proposed Ambient Water Quality Guidance Values for Phosphorus

DEC has announced the <u>release of draft water quality guidance values</u> to regulate phosphorus in New York State surface waters. Excess phosphorus can contribute to harmful algal blooms (HABs), lower dissolved oxygen levels, increased turbidity, and excessive growth of algae and aquatic plants. The draft guidance values are supplemented by draft updates to DEC's phosphorus permitting strategy and establish a process for prioritizing and reducing phosphorus loads from wastewater treatment plants. The TOGS are being released for a 60-day public comment period that **closes February 24**, **2025.** The full text of the draft TOGS documents and additional supporting information can be found on DEC's website.

- Feed Wild Birds Responsibly- There are many natural sources of winter food for birds including birch catkins, spruce and fir cones, dried seed heads from native grasses and flowers, and lingering fruits on plants. Bird feeders can supplement these natural foods and may attract more birds to your yard. If you are drawing wild birds into your yard with feeders, try these tips to keep birds safe:
 - o providing nearby cover such as evergreen trees, native shrubs, or even discarded Christmas trees;
 - o placing feeders away from windows and making windowpanes bird-safe
 - o regularly cleaning feeders to avoid spreading disease;
 - o securely storing bird seed indoors;
 - o keeping cats indoors;
 - o feeding pets inside to avoid inadvertently attracting feral cats, rodents, or other wildlife; and
 - o taking down feeders in the spring to avoid bear conflicts.
