Compost Pumpkin Options

This year's pumpkin collection is scheduled for 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. **Nov. 1 through 3** at several Erie County locations. Collection containers will be available in the parking lots of the Buffalo and Erie County Botanical Gardens, 2655 South Park Ave; The English Gardener, 4000 Harlem Road, Snyder; Erie County Compost Site, 11581 Walden Ave., Alden (this site only is also open Nov. 8 to 10); Groundwork Market Garden, 1698 Genesee St.; Lavocat's Family Greenhouse and Nursery, 8411 County Road, Clarence; Providence Farm Collective, 5701 Burton Road, Orchard Park; and Tripi's Landscaping, 3812 South Park Ave., Blasdell. From 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on **Nov. 2**, Amherst will host a pumpkin drop off at both the Highway Department at 1301 N. Forest Road and behind Williamsville Village Hall, 5565 Main St. Pumpkins, jack-o-lanterns and gourds, including those that may already be decaying or rotting, will be accepted at all drop-off locations. Pumpkins should not be bleached or painted, and have candles or lanterns removed. No corn stalks or hay bales will be accepted. Grassroots Gardens WNY is taking applications now for people who want to create new community gardens or school gardens in 2025. Currently Grassroots Gardens WNY is considering only community gardens and school gardens located in the cities of Buffalo or Niagara Falls, NY. However, if you are a school in one of their nearby suburbs, Grassroots Gardens WNY may be able to support you in 2025. Priority is given to gardens in neighborhoods lacking grocery stores, green spaces, and other access to healthy food. In order to start a new garden through their network, you must have a minimum of five committed community members for five years willing to care for the garden, and have identified a private lot with landowner consent or a publicly-owned city lot. STAMP Updates and Indigenous Solidarity

STAMP is the Science, Technology and Advanced Manufacturing Park, a development in Genesse County created to encourage businesses with green energy and smart solutions. From its initial plans, several companies have stepped away from building at the commercial site. The STAMP facility has been controversial due to its need for infrastructure and impact on sensitive wetlands and on the border of the federally recognized Tonawanda Seneca Nation. A recent analysis suggests that the project will require up to 6 million gallons of water per day. Currently, the entire county uses 6-8 million gallons per day without this facility. There is now interest in locating at STAMP by an energy-intensive data center.

Peanut Line Trail Feasibility Study

The Peanut Line corridor was named as a priority corridor in Bike Buffalo Niagara, the Bike Buffalo Niagara: Regional Bike Master Plan in 2020, as both a recreational amenity and regional connectivity between the Clarence Pathway and Ellicott Creek Trails. To explore the potential for a future trail connection along the corridor, the Greater Buffalo-Niagara Regional Transportation Council (GBNRTC) is conducting a feasibility study for the Peanut Line in coordination with the Town of Amherst. Phase 1B Contract for West Valley Cleanup Awarded

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) Office of Environmental Management (EM) awarded the West Valley Demonstration Project (WVDP) Phase 1B Contract to West Valley Cleanup Alliance LLC (WVCA) with work to be performed at the WVDP in western New York. The contract includes requirements for meaningful work to be performed by small business. Work to be performed under the new WVDP Phase 1B contract will include, but not be limited to, the demolition of remaining near- and below-grade components of the Main Plant Process Building; additional facility deactivation and demolition; contaminated soils remediation and disposition; waste management and legacy waste disposition; safeguards and security; environmental monitoring; surveillance and maintenance; and program support activities.

For more than 30 years, EM has remained focused on addressing the environmental legacy of nuclear weapons development and nuclear energy research that helped end World War II, win the Cold War and position the United States as a leader in clean nuclear energy. Collectively, EM is delivering results that are protecting the environment, supporting communities and enabling a concerted focus on safely completing the mission sooner and more efficiently. Funding for Private Landowners to Grow the Forests of the Future

The purpose of this grant program is to support the regeneration of forests so they may continue to deliver vital services such as mitigating climate change, protecting air and water quality, and supporting the economy. Young forests in New York face many challenges today that did not exist a century ago, the most significant being wide-spread damage caused by increased white-tailed deer populations and competition from invasive vegetation. Active management of the land is essential to ensure the survival of young trees and allow forests to become established or renew themselves, but this can be overwhelming and expensive. Through Regenerate NY, landowners can apply for financial assistance for projects on their land that support the establishment and renewal of healthy forests. This is a cost share reimbursement program, so all costs must be incurred by the landowner or fiscal sponsor before they can be reimbursed. Web-Based Map of Accessible Recreation Features Now Available

DEC recently launched an Accessible Recreation Destinations Map designed to showcase wheelchair-accessible features at education centers, campgrounds and day use areas, Wildlife Management Areas, state forests, and waterway access sites. The Accessible Recreation Destinations Map displays 266 destinations across New York State with wheelchair accessible outdoor recreation opportunities.

Concrete Made with Coffee: a Buzz in Australia

"Coffee concrete," which contains biochar made from spent coffee grounds as a replacement for river sand, has been used in a major infrastructure project in Pakenham, Australia. Researchers say the novel material for the project has diverted 140,000 coffees worth of grounds from reaching a landfill while saving more than 3 metric tons of sand. Read more.

Funding for Clean Energy Business Interns

NYSERDA has revised <u>PON 4000</u>: the <u>New York State Clean Energy Internship Program</u>, which provides funding to eligible clean energy businesses, organizations, and local municipalities to hire interns to perform meaningful work in the clean energy sector. Both clean energy businesses and intern candidates can apply to participate in the program. Accepted businesses will select, interview, and hire interns, and NYSERDA provides reimbursement on a percentage of the interns' wages.

Municipal Zoning Ordinance Resources on Community Composting

Natural Resources Defense Council and the Environmental Law Institute released a Model Municipal Zoning Ordinance on Community Composting. This is a template ordinance to help advance community composting by establishing it as an allowable use of land under a municipality's zoning code. Open Air Capture of Carbon Dioxide

Today's carbon capture technologies work well only for concentrated sources of carbon, such as power plant exhaust. The same methods cannot efficiently capture carbon dioxide from ambient air, where concentrations are hundreds of times lower than in flue gases. Yet direct air capture, or DAC, would reverse the rise of CO₂ levels, now 426 parts per million (ppm), 50% higher than levels before the Industrial Revolution. Without DAC, according to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, we won't reach humanity's goal of limiting warming to 1.5 °C (2.7 °F) above preexisting global averages.

Chemists at the University of California, Berkeley have developed a new type of absorbing material which could help get the world to negative emissions. The porous material, a covalent organic framework (COF), captures CO₂ from ambient air without degradation by water or other contaminants, one of the limitations of existing DAC technologies. The new material could be substituted easily into carbon capture systems already deployed or being piloted to remove CO₂ from refinery emissions and capture atmospheric CO₂ for storage underground. White Paper Release: The Circular Construction Economy in New York State and Beyond

Cornell University's Circular Construction Lab and Just Places Lab, and <u>CROWD</u> recently announced the publication of a white paper, "Constructing a Circular Economy in New York State: Deconstruction and Building Material Reuse."

The white paper envisions a transition from a linear construction economy based on a take-make-dispose model, to a circular construction economy focused on reduction, reuse, and recycling. It provides an analysis of the current linear construction economy, recommendations for how New York State can reduce waste from the built environment, and the potential benefits including increased revenue, green jobs, and reduction of greenhouse gas emissions. EV Charging Funding Assistance

Charge Ready NY 2.0 (PON 5367) is an incentive program that provides \$4,000 per charging port installed at a public facility within a DAC and \$2,000 per charging port installed at a workplace or MUD location upon completion of the installation of charging equipment and the provision of appropriate documentation. An additional incentive of \$500 per port may be awarded for eligible Level 2 charging equipment installed at a workplace or MUD location within a DAC. Equipment Owners at workplace or MUD locations may choose to participate in a bonus program to receive additional incentives. Public and private (for-profit and not-for-profit) entities may participate in the Program. Free Access to Parks, Campgrounds, and More for Veterans and Gold Star Families

New York State veterans and Gold Star Families will have free access to New York State parks, campgrounds, day use areas, historic sites and recreations through the expansion of the Lifetime Liberty Pass Program. A disability rating is no longer required, and all Veterans and certain Gold Star Family members who are residents of New York State are now eligible for this pass. Apply for the pass.

Help Prevent Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease from Harming New York's Rabbits and Hares

Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) is a fatal virus that affects rabbits and hares. A new strain, RHDV2, jumped to wild rabbits and hares in 2020 in the southwestern U.S., where it spread to six states within four months. The virus can infect wild rabbits and hares in addition to domestic rabbits. RHDV2 is extremely hardy, easily transmitted, and highly lethal to rabbits and hares. It does not infect humans or other animals like dogs or cats. RHDV2 spreads easily through direct contact between rabbits or contact with contaminated environments or objects. The most likely routes of introduction to New York are through transported domestic rabbits, internationally imported rabbit products, or people who travel to outbreak areas in the Southwest. Buffalo Zoo's Ongoing Amphibian Conservation

Along with the Puerto Rican Crested Toad Conservancy (PRCTC), the Buffalo Zoo oversaw breeding toads that produced over 200 tadpoles this year, the 40th year that the zoo has participated. Those tadpoles have since made it to Puerto Rico, where they will be acclimated in man-made ponds and monitored until they metamorphose and disperse. Puerto Rican crested toads are considered endangered and through projects with other partners, over 795,000 tadpoles have been released. The Puerto Rican crested toad became the first amphibian Species Survival Plan program under the Association of Zoos and Aquariums in 1984. That same year, the Buffalo Zoo was one of the first zoos to propagate the species. The Puerto Rican crested toad SSP program became the Puerto Rican Crested Toad Conservancy in 2021, and currently, 18 institutions participate in reintroduction efforts.

No Guts, No Glory

Are you a deer hunter or know someone who is? DEC is expanding our "Nonlead Ammunition for Eagle Conservation" project during the 2024-25 deer season. The biggest change for this season is that all licensed deer hunters are eligible anywhere in the state where hunting with a firearm is legal. Like last year, we are collecting data on scavenging rates and dynamics at gut piles of harvested deer including how long it takes for scavengers to find them, how long gut piles persist, and differences based on habitat and location. If you are a deer hunter or know deer hunters who would be willing to volunteer to assess "gut pile ecology" please sign up to participate.

Online Tool to View Earth's Changes

Google Earth Engine's new tool, <u>Dynamic World</u> was built in collaboration with the nonprofit <u>World Resources Institute</u>. Dynamic World pulls from satellite data to create detailed maps in near real-time. It gives users the ability to zoom in on the planet in 10-by-10 meter squares from satellite images collected every two to five days. Artificial intelligence is used to categorize each pixel into nine classes that range from bare ground to trees, crops, and buildings. The tool allows users to explore and track and monitor changes in these terrestrial ecosystems over time.

Get Ready for Plastic Free Lunch Day

From November 18 to November 22, 2024, schools can join the movement for any duration of the week to encourage reduced use of single-use plastics at lunch. Annually, school cafeterias provide well over 7 billion meals using single-use plastics. Plastic Free Lunch Day (PFLD) aims to inspire schools to ditch single-use plastics! Typically, local recycling facilities cannot process certain single-use plastics such as utensils and straws. The equipment in many recycling facilities cannot capture some of these plastic items, because the items are too small. As a result, small single-use plastics usually end up in landfills, waste combustion facilities, or can also end up as litter in the environment if the items are not properly disposed of. Plastic Free Lunch Day can be initiated at any time, but the week of November 18-22 serves as an eye opener for schools to recognize their environmental impact and work towards a positive change!

There are many ways to participate and promote plastic free initiatives:

- All schools that are preparing for PFLD and inspire action before October 1, 2024, can host a <u>free screening</u> of students' award-winning film, <u>Microplastic Madness!</u>

- Want to take things a step further? Another idea would be to look at all single-use and disposable items no matter what material they're made of and work towards reduction and reuse wherever possible.

Teacher's and Home-Schooling Resources

<u>NOAA's updated coral bleaching module</u>. New data visualization tools and an updated design make this resource more engaging than ever. With access to a range of historic and current data, you'll discover what's happening to coral reefs and how they're impacted by climate change. Perfect for sparking curiosity and building science skills!

<u>Crossword activity focused on endangered animals.</u> -Have students complete the puzzle and then read about one of the animals detailed in the puzzle to learn more about it.

<u>Effects of Climate Change on Agriculture</u> explores how changes in temperature, invasive species, and extreme weather events influenced by climate change will all impact growing food and raising livestock in North America. These lessons are great for 6th-12th grade students and follow Common Core State Standards.

"Invasive Shrimp: No Small Matter" introduces students to human impacts on ecosystems by discussing introduced versus invasive species, movement of aquatic species through global shipping channels, and methods scientists use to track species across the globe. Students will work in groups to track the movement of invasive Oriental grass shrimp (*Palaemon macrodactylus*) over time using the Global Biodiversity Information Facility (GBIF) database. Students will then use collection data to graph records by year and answer a series of questions.

<u>Biodiversity lesson plan</u> encourages students to explore biodiversity, including what it is, how human activities are putting it at risk, and what we can do to protect it. Students discover the wide array of organisms that populate our planet, research one of the almost one million species currently at risk, explore the diversity of life in their own backyard, and learn what they can do to lessen human impact on biodiversity. The lesson integrates STEM, English Language Arts, and Social and Emotional Learning.

Schoolyard Habitats® campaign and action cards allow students to learn about the habitat elements needed for wildlife to thrive while increasing native habitat and biodiversity. Plus, the school will gain an outdoor space for learning, support physical and mental well-being, and expand the community's green space. The new action cards provide the road map and resources for schools to complete the process from start to finish

<u>The Nature Conservancy: Nature Lab Virtual Field Trips</u>-These virtual labs from TNC include videos, teacher guides, and student activities for ages 9-15 on topics from Colombia's páramo ecosystem to the secret life of corals.

Tips for the Environment:

- Take "Charge" of Your Battery Disposal Remember, batteries do not go in home recycling bins when they are no longer usable. In New York, there are different options available for the safe and environmentally responsible management of end-of-life batteries depending on which category they fall under:
 - o **Single-use batteries** (examples: alkaline, zinc-carbon, button-cell, coin, lithium (Li))—may be accepted for recycling at retail and municipal locations on a voluntary basis. Use the <u>Call2Recycle</u> to find drop-off locations, making sure to check the box for "primary" batteries.
 - Rechargeable batteries (examples: Li-ion, Ni-Cd, Ni-MH)—under the NYS Rechargeable Battery Law, covered rechargeable batteries or battery packs weighing <25 lbs., can be returned to any retail location that sells rechargeable batteries or rechargeable battery containing products for recycling at no cost to the consumer. Visit the Call2Recycle locator website for acceptance locations.</p>
 - Lead-acid automotive batteries—under the <u>NYS Lead-acid Battery Recycling Law</u>, retailers and distributors of lead-acid batteries, must accept, free of charge, up to two used batteries per month from any individual, regardless of whether or not the individual purchases a new lead-acid battery.
- Stop Microfibers Pollution- One significant source of microplastics is from microfibers shed during clothes washing. Besides <u>installing an efficient microfiber filter</u>, there are quite a few things you can do to reduce microfiber pollution from washing: Choose more clothes made from natural fibers such as cotton, wool, or linen; Take good care of your clothes, mend them, and buy new clothes less often and wash your clothes at lower temperatures, and only when really necessary.. Researchers found that new clothing sheds more fibers than older.
