Zoar Valley Coalition Public Meeting

Join the Zoar Valley Coalition on **Tuesday, October 1** from 6:30 to 7:30pm at a public forum on the united effort to stop the logging of Zoar Valley by the NYS Dept. of Environmental Conservation and the CT/NY Audubon Society. The DEC has scheduled timber sales of hundreds of acres in Zoar Valley, and Audubon wants to clear mature forests there to establish nonforested areas for birds. 2024 NY ReLeaf Western NY Workshop

The 2024 ReLeaf Western NY Workshop will be held **Thursday, October 3**; 8:30 AM - 2:30 PM at Cazenovia Park, Buffalo, NY 14120. In this workshop, Mark Chisholm will discuss and demonstrate climbing, rigging, and ropework. He'll also cover tree physiology and the physics of working in trees. Wilderness First Aid Training

This Wilderness First Aid (WFA) course is designed for an individual or small group that travels beyond pavement and into the outdoors. The course consists of 16 hours of in-person training and hands-on practice scenarios. The training at The Park School over the course of three days, **October 4-6**, Friday, October 4: 6:00pm-10:00pm, Saturday, October 5: 9:00am-5:00pm and Sunday, October 6: 9:00am-12:00pm. WFA covers the most critical aspects of providing safety and first-aid in a wilderness setting. The resulting certification is valid for 2 years. Must be 18 or older. Register

Draft Regulation on Endangered Species for Public Comment

DEC recently released a draft regulation to protect certain endangered and threatened species. The rulemaking begins a multiphase process of updating New York State's list of animal species classified as endangered, threatened, or of special concern. The draft regulation addresses species of fish, a recently designated species of frog (Atlantic coast leopard frog), and species recently classified under the federal Endangered Species Act. DEC is holding two virtual public hearing sessions on **Thursday**, **October 10**, at 1 p.m. and at 6 p.m. The <u>draft regulation and details for the hearings and comment period</u> are available on DEC's website. New Yorkers are encouraged to comment on this draft regulation and help ensure the State's full regulatory protection is applied appropriately statewide. Comments will be accepted through 5 p.m. on October 18, 2024, and must be submitted in writing to rarefish@dec.ny.gov (subject: "Endangered Species").

DEC Seeking Feedback About Winter Rock Salt Use

DEC is encouraging participation in a new <u>survey to help better understand typical rock salt use by New Yorkers</u> and public awareness regarding the potential environmental and health impacts of salt overuse. Results of the survey will help DEC tailor future outreach and education to help reduce overuse of rock salt on roads, parking lots, and sidewalks. Survey will remain open until **November 1**. Peanut Line Trail Feasibility Study

The Peanut Line corridor was named as a priority corridor in Bike Buffalo Niagara, the Bike Buffalo Niagara: Regional Bike Master Plan in 2020, as both a recreational amenity and regional connectivity between the Clarence Pathway and Ellicott Creek Trails. To explore the potential for a future trail connection along the corridor, the Greater Buffalo-Niagara Regional Transportation Council (GBNRTC) is conducting a feasibility study for the Peanut Line in coordination with the Town of Amherst. "Crown Jewel"-Old Forests Documentary

Crown Jewels brings viewers to threatened forests in West Virginia, Wisconsin and Oregon, and follows those taking action to protect them. The film's release coincides with the U.S. Forest Service's consideration of a proposed national policy that could better protect old-growth forests. The Forest Service, part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, has prepared a draft plan for a proposed amendment that would update more than 120 land management plans for national forests nationwide. The proposed amendment could help the agency better conserve and steward old-growth forests in response to rapidly changing climate conditions and other threats. Funding for Private Landowners to Grow the Forests of the Future

The purpose of this grant program is to support the regeneration of forests so they may continue to deliver vital services such as mitigating climate change, protecting air and water quality, and supporting the economy. Young forests in New York face many challenges today that did not exist a century ago, the most significant being wide-spread damage caused by increased white-tailed deer populations and competition from invasive vegetation. Active management of the land is essential to ensure the survival of young trees and allow forests to become established or renew themselves, but this can be overwhelming and expensive. Through Regenerate NY, landowners can apply for financial assistance for projects on their land that support the establishment and renewal of healthy forests. This is a cost share reimbursement program, so all costs must be incurred by the landowner or fiscal sponsor before they can be reimbursed. Web-Based Map of Accessible Recreation Features Now Available

DEC recently launched an <u>Accessible Recreation Destinations Map</u> designed to showcase wheelchair-accessible features at education centers, campgrounds and day use areas, Wildlife Management Areas, state forests, and waterway access sites. The Accessible Recreation Destinations Map displays 266 destinations across New York State with wheelchair accessible outdoor recreation opportunities.

2024 I Bird NY Challenge Open Until November 1

The 2024 I BIRD NY Challenge is underway and open through November 1. Use your observation skills and join the annual Challenge by identifying any 10 bird species of your choosing in New York State. Funding for Clean Energy Business Interns

NYSERDA has revised <u>PON 4000: the New York State Clean Energy Internship Program</u>, which provides funding to eligible clean energy businesses, organizations, and local municipalities to hire interns to perform meaningful work in the clean energy sector. Both clean energy businesses and intern candidates can apply to participate in the program. Accepted businesses will select, interview, and hire interns, and NYSERDA provides reimbursement on a percentage of the interns' wages.

Municipal Zoning Ordinance Resources on Community Composting

Natural Resources Defense Council and the Environmental Law Institute released a Model Municipal Zoning Ordinance on Community Composting. This is a template ordinance to help advance community composting by establishing it as an allowable use of land under a municipality's zoning code. Beech Leaf Disease

This <u>article</u> discusses the cause of beech leaf disease (BLD), the lifecycle of this nematode (*Litylenchus crenatae ssp. mccannii*), the symptoms of BLD, and treatments. In spring (May-June), there are few nematodes in diseased leaves, their numbers increase over the summer (July-August) and reach peak numbers in late summer through early fall (September-November). As the numbers build up within the leaves, nematodes will migrate from the infected leaves into to the newly forming buds. Once nematodes reach the new bud, nematodes will feed on the bud tissues, which causes cell enlargement of the bud scale cells and negatively affects the overall architecture of the developing young leaves by increasing their number of cell layers. This damages the next generation of leaves and repeated damage will kill infected beech.

EV Charging Funding Assistance

Charge Ready NY 2.0 (PON 5367) is an incentive program that provides \$4,000 per charging port installed at a public facility within a DAC and \$2,000 per charging port installed at a workplace or MUD location upon completion of the installation of charging equipment and the provision of appropriate documentation. An additional incentive of \$500 per port may be awarded for eligible Level 2 charging equipment installed at a workplace or MUD location within a DAC. Equipment Owners at workplace or MUD locations may choose to participate in a bonus program to receive additional incentives. Public and private (for-profit and not-for-profit) entities may participate in the Program. Make Cigarette Butts Part of Your Cleanups

Littered cigarette butts: besides ugly to look at, they are hazardous to our kids, pets, wildlife and gardens. When left in the environment, littered cigarette butts <u>leach toxic chemicals</u>, such as arsenic (used to kill rats) and lead, that may be carried as runoff to drains and end up polluting our rivers and lakes right here in Western New York. Because cigarette butts are primarily made of plastic filters that don't biodegrade, the butts that aren't eaten by wildlife simply pile up on shorelines or at the bottom of bodies of water. Types of Electric Vehicle Charging

Are you thinking about getting an electric vehicle but don't understand the charging options and times? There are several ways to charge depending on location and outlet voltage. For home charging: with Level 1 you plug into your standard 120V outlet, but charging is slower; level 2 uses a 240V outlet (similar to an electric dryer) and full charge is between 4-6 hours. For public charging: level 2 uses 240V chargers and can be found at shopping centers, schools, etc., while level 3 uses 480V and allows fast charging in 30 minutes-these chargers are most often found at thruway rest stops. Certain electric vehicles do have tax credits associated with their purchasing. Check out the list and info.

Climate Impacts of Plastics

According to a recent report published by United Nations Partner GRID-Arendal, "between 3.8 and 4.5 percent of global greenhouse gas emissions" are emitted throughout the lifecycle of plastics (2024, p. 3). This report, *Climate Impacts of Plastics*, focuses on the opportunity posed by UNEA Resolution 5/14 ("End plastic pollution: Towards an international legally binding instrument") to advance global efforts and accountability in addressing the climate impacts of plastics. Free Access to Parks, Campgrounds, and More for Veterans and Gold Star Families

New York State veterans and Gold Star Families will have free access to New York State parks, campgrounds, day use areas, historic sites and recreations through the expansion of the Lifetime Liberty Pass Program. A disability rating is no longer required, and all Veterans and certain Gold Star Family members who are residents of New York State are now eligible for this pass. Apply for the pass.

Heat Pump Water Heaters

Replacing an inefficient water heater with a heat pump water heater represents a prime opportunity to cut home energy costs and greenhouse gas emissions. Water heaters may account for up to 20% of the energy consumption in an average household. By switching to an energy-efficient heat pump water heater, households can save hundreds of dollars. These heat pump water heaters are also eligible for New York State incentives and Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) tax credits. Read more.

Help Prevent Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease from Harming New York's Rabbits and Hares

Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) is a fatal virus that affects rabbits and hares. A new strain, RHDV2, jumped to wild rabbits and hares in 2020 in the southwestern U.S., where it spread to six states within four months. The virus can infect wild rabbits and hares in addition to domestic rabbits. RHDV2 is extremely hardy, easily transmitted, and highly lethal to rabbits and hares. It does not infect humans or other animals like dogs or cats. RHDV2 spreads easily through direct contact between rabbits or contact with contaminated environments or objects. The most likely routes of introduction to New York are through transported domestic rabbits, internationally imported rabbit products, or people who travel to outbreak areas in the Southwest. Online Tool to View Earth's Changes

Google Earth Engine's new tool, <u>Dynamic World</u> was built in collaboration with the nonprofit <u>World Resources Institute</u>. Dynamic World pulls from satellite data to create detailed maps in near real-time. It gives users the ability to zoom in on the planet in 10-by-10 meter squares from satellite images collected every two to five days. Artificial intelligence is used to categorize each pixel into nine classes that range from bare ground to trees, crops, and buildings. The tool allows users to explore and track and monitor changes in these terrestrial ecosystems over time.

<u>NOAA's updated coral bleaching module</u>. New data visualization tools and an updated design make this resource more engaging than ever. With access to a range of historic and current data, you'll discover what's happening to coral reefs and how they're impacted by climate change. Perfect for sparking curiosity and building science skills!

<u>Crossword activity focused on endangered animals.</u> -Have students complete the puzzle and then read about one of the animals detailed in the puzzle to learn more about it.

<u>Effects of Climate Change on Agriculture</u> explores how changes in temperature, invasive species, and extreme weather events influenced by climate change will all impact growing food and raising livestock in North America. These lessons are great for 6th-12th grade students and follow Common Core State Standards.

"Invasive Shrimp: No Small Matter" introduces students to human impacts on ecosystems by discussing introduced versus invasive species, movement of aquatic species through global shipping channels, and methods scientists use to track species across the globe. Students will work in groups to track the movement of invasive Oriental grass shrimp (*Palaemon macrodactylus*) over time using the Global Biodiversity Information Facility (GBIF) database. Tips for the Environment:

- Leave the leaves- fallen leaves contain nutrients for soil and can be used as mulch around plants. Think of all the fossil fuels used for blowing leaves into piles, putting them in plastic bags (which use fossil fuels) to take to the landfill.
- **Don't Flush your Contacts-** Up to 3.36 billion contacts clog wastewater treatment facilities each year. You might not think that something so small could be a problem, but those contacts become microplastics that contaminate our water. Ideally, recycle contact lenses, otherwise toss in trash for landfill to keep our waterways safe. Some optical offices accept lenses for recycling- check here.
