Become a Citizen Scientist Through FrogWatch USA

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC), in partnership with Friends of Reinstein Woods, will train interested volunteers to help FrogWatch USA on **Tuesday, March 21** at 7 p.m. at [Reinstein Woods Nature Preserve](#). Community members can join an international team of citizen scientists by monitoring frog populations in the many wetlands throughout the preserve. The training is designed for people who are able to commit to monitoring at least one evening a week throughout the spring. Participants will learn to identify local frogs and toads by their mating calls and how to record data to be submitted to a national database. DEC Adopts New Freshwater Fishing Regulations

New freshwater fishing regulations go into effect April 1, 2017. The modifications to the sport fishing regulations are a result of a two-year process that included biological assessment, discussions with anglers, and a formal 45-day public comment period. Highlights of the new regulations include: Adjustments to existing walleye regulations in various waters throughout the state, including measures to protect spawning walleye and conservative minimum harvest size and creel limits in waters where managers are trying to establish self-sustaining populations of this popular sport fish; Allowing ice fishing in some waters and restricting the number or use of devices used for fishing through the ice in other waters to protect self-sustaining populations or limit fishing pressure; and Simplification of the black bass regulations in Lake Erie by compressing the three existing seasons into two while expanding opportunities to use live bait and harvest one large bass per day during a special season. DEC Programs Encourage Pharmacies to 'Take Back' Medicines

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) announced two new initiatives to encourage the proper management and disposal of products potentially harmful to public health and the environment. The Pharmaceutical Take-back Program is a \$1 million pilot program promoting the proper disposal of unwanted or unused prescription medicines that covers the costs of consumer drug collection boxes and disposal for two years. The State's second initiative, the Environmental Audit Incentive Program, offers incentives to pharmacies to better identify, manage, and properly dispose of certain materials currently regulated under the federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA), including some medicines, batteries, ignitable liquids, and lamps containing mercury. The 2016-17 State Budget included \$1 million through the Environmental Protection Fund for the statewide pilot take-back program, which will be used to cover the full cost of purchasing U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA)-compliant medication drop boxes, as well as the cost of pick up, transport, and destruction of all collected waste pharmaceuticals by a DEA-registered reverse distributor for a period of two years. Pharmacies that would like to participate in this program are encouraged to apply on-line at the [Pilot Pharmaceutical Take-back Program](#) web page on DEC's website. The deadline for applications is **May 1, 2017**.

Funding for Foam Recycling Programs

The Foam Recycling Coalition, part of the Foodservice Packaging Institute, seeks applicants looking to start or strengthen a post-consumer foam polystyrene recycling program. Both public and private organizations involved in managing residential curbside recycling programs or material recovery facilities are eligible to apply for funding. This initiative helps fund infrastructure for the collection, processing and marketing of products made from foam polystyrene. It targets post-consumer foam polystyrene products, which includes foodservice packaging (i.e., cups, plates, bowls, clamshells, cafeteria trays) and other types of packaging, such as egg cartons; meat trays; and protective packaging (used when shipping electronics and other fragile items). The FRC distributes up to \$50,000 for each grant. Grant amounts are determined on a case-by-case basis dependent upon equipment needs. Although no cash match is required, additional costs may be incurred by the grantee for related items such as site preparation, provision of conveying system, electrical infrastructure, freight and other installation costs. **Applications must be submitted by April 17, 2017 for priority consideration.** The FRC will announce grant recipients throughout the year. Governor Cuomo Rescues Geothermal Jobs

Governor Cuomo has set aside \$15 million over two years in geothermal heating and cooling rebates for New Yorkers. Geothermal installations use the constant temperature under the ground's frost line to renewably heat and cool homes and businesses without producing greenhouse gases on site. This industry is key to New York reaching its 40% greenhouse gas reduction goal by 2030 as more than a third of the State's greenhouse gases come from the heating sector. Over 1,000 New York jobs in the industry had been put at risk by the sunset of a 30% federal tax credit which faces dim prospects of renewal with federal energy policy now firmly controlled by fossil fuel interests. The funding will support geothermal installation rebates of \$6,000 for an average sized home. Geothermal is one of the least expensive ways to heat and cool, but the up-front costs of installing thermal exchange pipes below the frost line is a barrier for many businesses and homeowners. The rebates are set at a minimal level to stimulate the market for 2 years while longer term plans are put in motion. The long-term goal is to allow market mechanisms to absorb the up-front costs, leading to a widespread transition to renewable heating and cooling. The geothermal initiative fits well with Cuomo's commitment that 50% of New York's electricity will come from renewables by 2030. The combination of geothermal for heating and cooling and solar panels to generate electricity is the most direct path to eliminating carbon emissions from homes and businesses in New York.

Final Guidance on Consideration of Greenhouse Gas Emissions and the Effects of Climate Change

Under NEPA, Federal agencies are required to consider and disclose the potential effects of their actions and decisions on the environment. In many cases, Federal actions have the potential to contribute to climate change by producing greenhouse gas emissions or alternatively, be affected by many of the impacts of a changing climate, such as rising sea levels, extreme weather, drought and wildfires. A final guidance provides a level of predictability and certainty by outlining how Federal agencies can describe these impacts by quantifying greenhouse gas emissions when conducting NEPA reviews. This increased predictability and certainty will allow decision makers and the public to more fully understand the potential climate impacts of all proposed Federal actions, and in turn, assist agencies in comparing alternatives and considering measures to mitigate the impacts of climate change. <https://www.whitehouse.gov/the-press-office/2016/08/02/fact-sheet>

APHIS Comment Period: Interstate Movement of Plant Pests, Biocontrol Agents, and Soil

APHIS proposes to revise the regulations that govern the movement into and within the United States of plant pests, biological control agents, and soil, and is soliciting public comments until **April 19, 2017**. Regarding the regulation of plant pests, this proposed rule would clarify the risk-based criteria APHIS uses to determine if an organism is a plant pest and to evaluate and issue permits, revise the definition of a plant pest to include organisms of unknown risk if those organisms are similar to known plant pests and put in place a notice-based process to establish and maintain a list of pests exempted from standard permit requirements. The exempted list would include plant pests that are established throughout their geographical range in the United States; low risk; or commercially available and under purview of another Federal agency, such as the Environmental Protection Agency. As it relates to the regulation of biological control organisms, this proposed rule would establish criteria regarding the movement and release of certain biological control agents in the continental United States, and establish exemptions for certain biological control organisms similar to what is being proposed for widely prevalent, low-risk plant pests. \$3 Million Available to Municipalities for Zero-Emission Vehicles and Infrastructure

The Municipal ZEV rebate program will be administered by DEC through the [New York State Grants Gateway](#). Municipalities will be eligible for reimbursement of up to \$5,000 per vehicle for purchase or leasing of eligible clean vehicles, and up to \$250,000 per facility for installation of eligible Electric Vehicle Supply Equipment or hydrogen fuel cell infrastructure. DEC will accept applications for rebates on a first-come, first-served basis through **March 31, 2017**, or until the funds are exhausted. Applications will be evaluated according to the criteria outlined in the Request for Applications found in the Grants Gateway [Grant Opportunity Portal](#).

Protecting your Trees from Oak Wilt

Oak wilt, a deadly fungal disease for oak trees was discovered in six new locations in New York last year. This disease can be spread by beetles that are attracted to freshly cut or injured trees. Pruning in winter protects oaks from becoming infected. Trees pruned in winter respond more vigorously in the spring, putting out new growth. The oak wilt fungus clogs the trees' transport vessels, cutting off water and food from leaves and the rest of the tree. One way oak wilt spreads is when fungal spores hitch rides on insects. Sap beetles, one of the main culprits, are extremely attracted to fresh tree wounds. Pruning oaks during the growing season greatly increases the chances of insects infecting them with oak wilt.

The 4 R's – Reduce, Reuse, Recycle and Repair By Lesley Haynes

This month I am writing to the young people in the community. If a parent is reading this please share it with your children.

World Water Day is observed **on Saturday, March 22**. The day highlights the problems of millions of people around the world. Only one percent of the earth's water is available for human consumption and more than one billion people on earth find it difficult to access. Most of the water in many countries is contaminated with chemicals and human waste. In some parts of the world clean drinking water usually goes to the wealthier individuals. **World Water Day 2017** is drawing attention to this issue by putting pressure on local and federal governments to make changes.

Imagine a world with no water at all. You wouldn't be able to drink water, bathe, and swim and so on. Plants, animals, birds and ocean life would also get sick and die after drinking polluted water.

Did you know that children can make a very important difference towards water conservation? You can make a huge impact simply by starting at home and changing the way you, your family and friends use water.

Ways Children Can Help to Conserve Water:

- **In the bathroom:** When washing your hands, don't leave the water running. Wet your hands and turn the water off. Use soap and lather your hands well, then turn the water on to rinse. Next turn the water off completely and dry your hands.
- When you **brush your teeth** turn the faucet on to get your toothbrush and toothpaste wet - turn it off while brushing your teeth and then on again to rinse your mouth and toothbrush. By doing this you will save at least four gallons of water from slipping down the drain.
- A regular **shower** head uses as much as 7 gallons of water every minute. Installing a low-flow showerhead cuts water use in half. If you take a five-minute shower using this type of showerhead, you will save hundreds of gallons.
- A **leaking toilet** can waste between 300 and 600 gallons of water per month depending on the severity of the leaks. Encourage your parents to put several drops of food coloring into the water tank top. Wait about 30 minutes without flushing. If you see the food coloring in the toilet bowl that means there is a leak and the toilet needs repair. Fixing it can save about 600 gallons of water each month!
- Do you like a drink of cold water now and then? Rather than running the kitchen faucet for several minutes to get cold water, keep a container of cold water in the refrigerator at all times. This also keeps plastic bottles out of the waste stream.
- If the family car needs to be washed encourage your parents to take it to a carwash that uses recycled water.

Tell your friends what you're doing and urge them to do the same. **Going green** is a simple way to reduce the environmental impact and save money. Doing this as a family is easy and every little bit is a step to help save the earth.

Give some thought to **World Water Day** and, if you can, please take time for you and your family to watch '*The Story of Bottled Water*' an 8 minute online video about the bottled water phenomenon.

Ask your teacher if you can share this information with your classmates so that they can participate in World Water Day activities.
